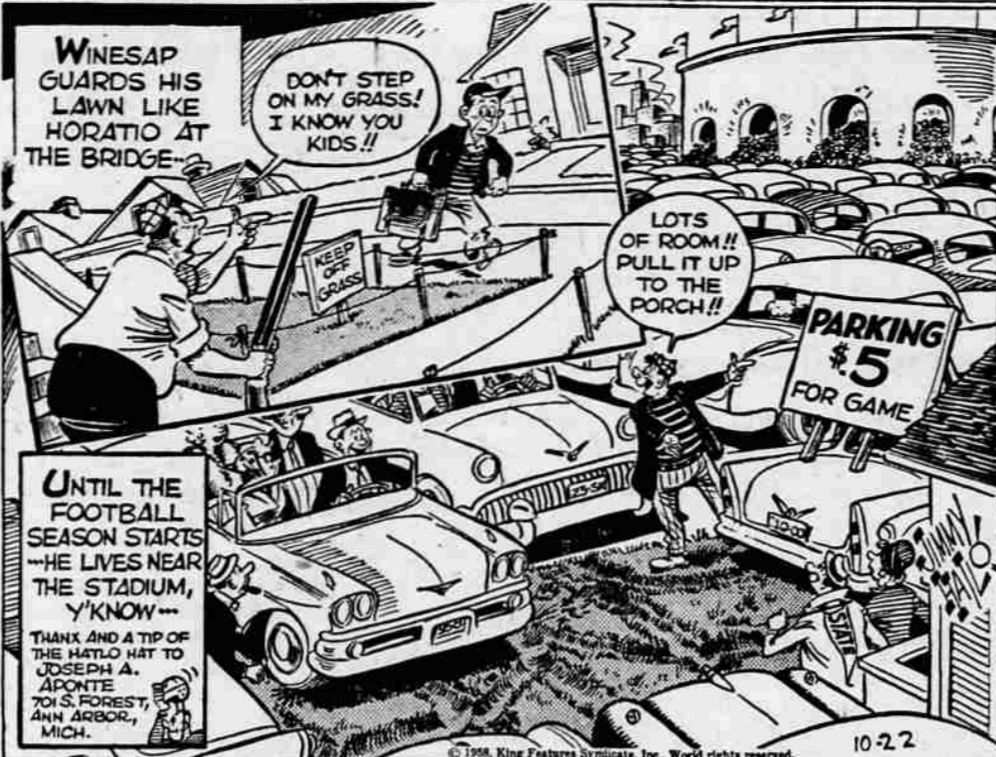

## Williams Expected To Win 6th Term in Michigan Election

Lansing, Mich. - (AP) - Gov. G. Mennen Williams is favored to win an unprecedented sixth term Nov. 4 in a Democratic tide that could weaken GOP control of the Michigan congressional delegation and the state Legislature.

That's how most observers are betting late in a dull campaign that just now is beginning to quicken for the first time since Democrats swept to their biggest primary landslide in state history on Aug. 5.

The GOP, however, claims its chances are getting better as outstate Republicans rally around a polio-crippled college professor and a legless war veteran.

**Tough GOP Foe**

Williams, whose stature as a presidential contender in 1960 will rise or fall Nov. 4,

faces one of his strongest opponents in a decade in Paul D. Bagwell, a hard-campaigning Michigan State University speech teacher with an enthusiastic following.

But Bagwell is bucking voter apathy, shakey financing, early campaign defeatism within his party, a Democratic trend, a powerful labor-political party coalition, and Williams himself, who has been campaigning 16 to 20 hours a day.

The same factors are against Sen. Charles E. Potter (R-Mich.), a double-amputee whose bid for a second term is jeopardized by Lt. Gov. Phillip A. Hart, a father of eight who often campaigns from a helicopter flown by his wife.

Both Williams and his protégé, Hart, have endorsement of Michigan's vote-disciplined United Auto Workers Union.

Williams has been forced to wage his first defensive campaign because Republicans charge his alliance with UAW President Walter P. Reuther is chasing industry and jobs out of Michigan.

Potter claims Hart is a captive of labor. Hart says Potter is captive of big business. Labor Issue Soft Peddled

The labor issue has been soft-peddled lately since there is relative peace in the auto industry, although both par-

ties still try to link the other with Teamsters President James R. Hoffa.

Williams counters the main GOP issue by charging Republicans with "smearing Michigan" and blaming economic woes on "the Eisenhower recession."

Williams, Bagwell, Potter and Hart clashed on these issues in a rare face-to-face meeting Saturday at a political workshop sponsored by the United Press International editors of Michigan.

A poll of 10 of the editors after the meeting resulted in a unanimous prediction of a Williams victory and an even split over the Potter-Hart race.

Democrats see their ticket winning by more than 300,000. Williams won by 290,000 in 1956. Republicans are silent, but see Hart trailing far behind Williams.

Republicans insist they have a chance. Bagwell says Williams is "running scared." Potter says Hart's appeal is overestimated and that Hart will trail far behind Williams.

State Elections Director Robert Montgomery expects only about 2,250,000 of the state's 3,500,000 registered voters to go to the polls.

## Is That So?

The fall migration of the dragonflies is less often seen than that of the monarch butterflies but it may be fully as impressive.

Instead of a shimmering dancing flight, theirs is swift and purposeful, as one would expect from one of the most ferocious insects in the world. Little is known about their migration, where it ends. But since great flights of them have been seen far at sea, and usually headed in a southerly direction, it is probable that those from this country are headed to South America.

These strange survivors from prehistoric times—some living species are identical with fossil forms—are lovers of the sun. They like nothing better than to stand motionless in the noonday air, then dart with appalling speed on a passing insect.

Their name is quite appropriate. Their large heads have enormous eyes and a mouth

equipped with jaws powerful enough to inflict a painful bite even on a man. Their tube-like bodies are equipped with short legs for holding their prey and long ones for catapulting themselves into the air. Unlike most insects, the dragonflies do not just suck the juices of their victims. Instead, they eat them shell and all.

Though his life begins in the air—he is conceived on the wing—and probably ends there also, most of his life cycle to adulthood takes place under water. The female lays her eggs either by dropping them into the water as she skims its surface or by burying them in the stems of underwater plants.

From the time the youngster emerges from the egg

he is hungry. As he grows into the nymphal period, in which his wings develop under the shell in which he is encased, he feeds relentlessly on tiny organisms. When he reaches the time to leave the water for the air, he sets out for land.

The transition is awkward. He crawls out onto the shore, moves slowly inland for a few yards to a suitable spot and sits there. Presently the hot sun dries off his shell. It splits open along the back and the flabby creature struggles out.

Gradually his wings swing outward to a position at right angles to his body that is hardening in the heat. They assume a lacy appearance. The body takes on a metallic gleam. Suddenly he is airborne.

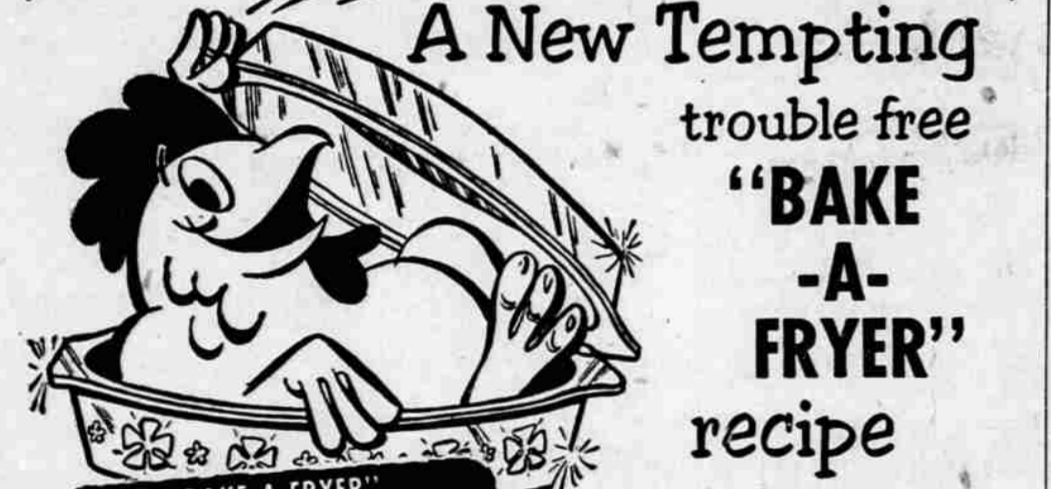
