

## Annual Scout Meeting Slated

## Officials Seek Cause of Blast

Uniontown, Pa. — Officials today sifted through the debris of a building in which nitroglycerine was manufactured in an effort to learn what may have touched off an explosion that killed four men and injured three others.

But there was little hope that a cause of the blast would be uncovered since the structure was reduced to rubble. The explosion occurred at 10:50 a.m. Tuesday in the gelatin cartridge plant building of the Liberty Powder Defense Corp., six miles north of here.

The dead were identified as Robert Trimbath, 49, Morrell, Pa., father of five children; Leonard McGee, 39, also of Morrell; Len Burns, 41, Uniontown, and John Holub, Dunbar, Pa.

John Morris, 48, Uniontown, and David Caffey, 30, Footdale, Pa., were admitted to Uniontown hospital. Morris suffered face cuts and Caffey is being treated for shock. A third worker received a face cut but was not hospitalized.

Impact of the explosion could be felt 10 miles away at the Connelville State hospital. Many windows in nearby Mt. Braddock were shattered by force of the blast.

## President Defends Administration Record in S. F.

San Francisco — President Eisenhower, in a "coffee hour" appearance before his speech here Tuesday, defended the record of his administration in answers to a wide variety of questions.

In his discussion with 24 Republican women the President said in answer to a question "I have taken no stand" on Proposition 13, the controversial measure on the California ballot which would ban union membership as a condition of employment.

**Up To Each State**  
"I want to straighten out the record," he said. "I speak from the national viewpoint. Section 14B of the Taft-Hartley act gives each state the right to decide this question. I have always supported Section 14B and I have always believed the States should determine what they want to do."

Eisenhower also gave these answers to questions:  
**Quemoy and Matsu** — "There is only one way for freedom to defend itself against a Communist dictatorship. We must stand by principle. And that principle is that we will not permit Communist territorial expansion by force."

**Without Foundation**  
Small business — "The charge that small business has been diverted by this administration is completely without foundation."

**Missiles** — The intercontinental ballistic missile program "was completely ignored" when the Democrats were in power.

**Tax relief** — His administration in 1954 pushed through the largest tax cut in history.

**Recession** — "I do not believe the federal government should try to control industry, ourselves and our economy. The function of government is to lead, give a helping hand when needed but not to do crazy things and plunge our children billions of dollars into debt."

## Instrument Gives Orchestra Sounds

Tokyo — A Japanese firm today unveiled an electronic instrument that can produce the sounds of a 24-piece orchestra.

The organ-like instrument, called the "Electone," uses 184 keys, 32 pedals, eight rhythm buttons and four rhythm pedals to produce the sounds of 24 percussion, brass, wood-wind and string instruments.

A total of 2,000 transistors and 15 microphone sound amplifying units went into the instrument.

It was displayed at Japan's week-long audio fair, which opened today at the National Athletic stadium in Tokyo. The Nippon Musical Instruments Mfg. company of Tokyo made the "Electone," which it plans to display at an audio fair in the United States in 1959.

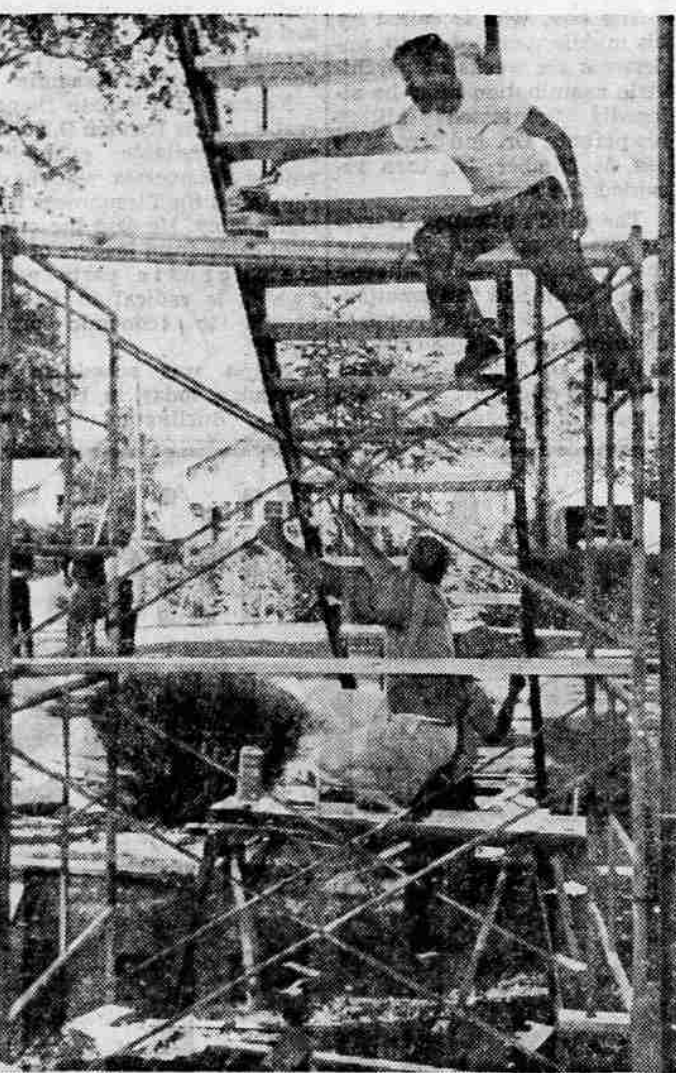
## Quotes From the News

## Cubans Reluctant To Free Americans

Havana — The rebels showed no sign today of willingness to yield to U. S. demands for the immediate release of two Americans kidnaped Monday from the Texas Company's Santiago oil refinery.

Kenneth D. Drewes, Joliet, Ill., and Charles R. Bennett (no U. S. address) were snatched along with seven Cubans.

"They were the first foreigners kidnaped by the rebels since June, when they made off with about 50 Americans. They were released only after protracted negotiations."

Ambassador Earl E. T. Smith has instructed the Santiago consulate to take a "firm stand" in demanding the release of the newly-kidnaped Americans without delay.

## Women's Cooking Rapped by Expert

Knoxville, Tenn. — The average American woman knows little about selecting food and preparing meals, according to culinary expert George L. Wanzel.

She shows poor taste in picking out meats and vegetables, Wanzel told members of the Tennessee Restaurant association, and uses too much hard fat in cooking.
