

Bear, Duck Ruckus Crucial Mix in PCC

United Press International Oregon and College of the Pacific, two of last week's more prominent upset victims, seek to get well on the road this Saturday while Stanford lugs a miserable 1-4 record into UCLA where the Indians are eagerly awaited by UCLA.

Coach Len Casanova's Ducks meet California at Berkeley in a game which might go a long way toward settling the Pacific Coast conference championship. Oregon took a 6-0 dumping from Washington State last week while California was squeezed

by fast-closing Southern California, 14-12.

The Bear's triumph, slender as it was, nudged them into first place in the dying league and gave Coach Pete Elliott an unheard-of record of three wins in a row. Last year his Bears lost nine out of 10. Oregon is a two-point favorite to make Elliott recall the old days.

College of Pacific's "prescription" calls first for a stop at Marquette where the Warriors have lost their last three games. COP's Dick Bass was just about done up in a sack last week as the Cincinnati Bearcats upended the Tigers 12-6.

Stanford heads into Los Angeles to play a UCLA team which unveiled a bunch of flanker backs out of its usual single wing while downing Washington 20-0. The Bruins may be extra hot in their five-game seniors completed their eligibility in that game.

The Indians are hurting worse than ever now that half-back Rick McMillen, who suffered a leg injury early in his team's 16-0 loss to the Air Force, is out of the lineup. UCLA is favored by 17 points.

Wood Back In USC Lineup

It will be Southern California against Washington State at Spokane in the day's regionally televised game. The Trojans were heartened by the return of quarterback Willie Wood, who was out for three games with injuries.

Coach Don Clark said he had looked good in his contact work. Jim Sutherland, the Cougar boss, claims his outfit appears to be in good shape. Bob Newman, their fine passer, is expected to go after seeing only brief service against the Ducks.

Oregon State, having a spotty campaign after pre-season raves, is favored by 10 points over the Huskies in their game at Portland.

San Jose State, 21-20 victors over favored Arizona (Tempe) State last Saturday, takes on Denver at the Spartan stadium Saturday night. Idaho is at luckless Arizona, Arizona State at Detroit and Fresno State at Los Angeles State in other games.

Birdie Tebbetts In Line to Run Braves Team

Milwaukee — (UPI) — George (Birdie) Tebbetts, who claims he's no longer "funny and facetious," is likely to be the next president of the Milwaukee Braves "within about two years."

The current president, Joseph Cairnes, made that prediction Thursday when he along with other members of the Braves' official family introduced Tebbetts to newsmen at a luncheon.

TV Takes Charge

Cairnes said Tebbetts, who now is executive vice president, will be running the club when Cairnes is in Florida heading a multi-million dollar real estate project backed by Braves' owner Lou Perini. "I may be gone 80 or 90 per cent of the time. When I'm gone, Birdie is in charge. And eventually, possibly two years, he may be the president of the ball club," Cairnes said.

Cairnes, General Manager John Quinn and Tebbetts went to great lengths to disprove any reports of discontent in the Braves' front office because of Tebbetts' giant stride from manager of the Cincinnati Redlegs to "their apparent" to the presidency of the Braves.

Pros Have Eyes On Bob Webb

New York—(UPI)—Bob Webb of St. Ambrose (Iowa) college won't make any major All-America teams this fall but don't be surprised if his name is called out early in the next National Football League draft.

Professional teams are always looking for quarterbacks who can throw a football. Webb fills this requirement. He has gained more yards by passing than any player in the history of small college football.

NCAA statistics showed today that Webb, in a four-year career which still has three games to go, has gained 4,731 yards on passes. He has broken the previous record of 4,278 aerial yards produced by Bob Heimerdinger of Northern Illinois State in 1948-51.

Webb gained 327 yards, all but one in the air, against Loras last week end and took over the small college total offense leadership with 1,198 yards. Webb, a senior from Gary, Ind., never has won an

individual title but his current figure is the second best total offense mark ever recorded for five games.
