

Candidate Parade

LARRY SHEEHAN

I am the Democratic candidate for Sheriff of Jackson County. I am 47 years old, married, and have resided in Rogue River more than 10 years. I am not a professional policeman, but a businessman with 20 years experience who believes in good and effective law enforcement. The duties of the sheriff's office do not require a professional policeman but a person with sound business experience who can secure qualified deputies to enforce our laws. Our present sheriff has not engaged in criminal investigation but has been the administrator of the office, relying on deputies for the particular work of each department. The sheriff's office originated in Anglo-Saxon England, when the sheriff was principally a tax collector. In our modern day, the duties of the sheriff as a tax collector are even more important. Our present sheriff stated early this year that the reason he was not running for re-election was because there should be a change in the administration. I agree with the sheriff. If you wish to retain the present administration, the present opponent. If you desire a change, then vote for Larry Sheehan. Some of the changes I will make if elected are: (1) Eliminate the expensive mileage arrangement for deputies' vehicles which in 1957 cost this county over \$19,000. If elected, I will investigate the procurement of county cars for the sheriff's department. (2) Keep the Sheriff's office open 24 hours a day for the service and protection of the public. (3) More efficient turnover of tax money to the county treasurer, so that this money can be immediately invested and earn interest for the county. (4) Work out a plan to insure safety for our children in all school zones. (5) Better cooperation with other law enforcement agencies. (6) Study possible work program for county prisoners. (7) Maintain a high standard of efficiency in jail facilities. (8) Cooperate with authorities and families to resolve juvenile problems. (9) Give kind and courteous treatment to every person. The above is only a portion of the changes that should be made or studied to bring about a more efficient sheriff's office. If elected, I will do my best to carry out such a program and be open to suggestion for other changes which benefit our county. I wish to thank the Mail Tribune for this opportunity to set out some of my views to the voters of this county.



JOE WALSH

Joe Walsh is the Republican candidate for the office of sheriff. He is a family man and has devoted the major portion of his adult life to police work and is the present chief criminal deputy under Sheriff Howard Cauli. He plans to embark on a constructive program which is an outgrowth of his training and experience in the varied responsibilities of the office which he seeks. He is highly regarded by all with whom he has come in contact and has shown a willingness to work the long and often times irregular hours the nature of the job demands. Drivers Licenses Suspended Listed

Salem - The department of motor vehicles has released names of 456 drivers whose licenses were ordered suspended during the period beginning Oct. 13 and ending Oct. 17. Length of suspension varies, depending on charges involved, recommendation of court, discretionary action by the department or requirements of Oregon law. The department said some of the licenses involving financial responsibility and court recommendations may have been reinstated after suspension was ordered. The department warned drivers that the penalty for driving while suspended is a jail sentence of no less than two days and up to six months, and there may be imposed a fine up to \$500. Under licensing procedures, this will also result in an additional year of suspension. Those suspended in Jackson county were:

Beavers Tune Up Passing Attack for Husky Scrap

Portland - (UPI) - The University of Washington Huskies, who claimed the "football championship of Oregon" despite a poor season in 1957, seek to snap a three-game losing streak here Saturday afternoon against in-and-out Oregon State. Washington defeated both Oregon and Oregon State, the PCC co-champions last season. But the Huskies are 10 to 12 point underdogs for Saturday's game. Oregon State, with full-back Nub Beamer and tackle Ted Bates back in the lineup, handily defeated Idaho last week to run its Pacific Coast Conference record to 2-1. The Beavers are still in the running for the Rose Bowl despite one-sided defeats by Southern California (21-0) and by non-conference Wyoming (28-0).

Coach Tommy Prothro has concentrated a lot on passing offense this week with five tailbacks all throwing the ball. Dainard Paulson, who looked good against Idaho, is expected to start in this key position. Grimm Mason, out of the last two games with injuries, also is ready to play again. Washington, which has been outweighted in the line in all its games so far, will give away only two pounds per man against the Beavers. The Huskies average 196 up front to 198 for the Oregon State starting forward wall. A crowd of around 25,000 is expected. Game time is 1:30 p.m. p.s.t. Oregon State will be trying to keep alive Prothro's record of not having lost a home game at Corvallis or Portland since he took over at Beaverville in 1955.

Oregon's Webfoots Head For California Scuffle

Eugene - (UPI) - Coach Len Casanova's Oregon Webfoots, hurt by injuries for the first time this season, flew to Berkeley, Calif., today where they seek their fifth straight victory over California, now leading the Pacific Coast conference. Casanova said regular guard Joe Schaffeld and regular tackle Jim Linden might miss all or part of the game on Saturday. Schaffeld was hurt and Linden had the flu. All-

American end candidate Ron Stover, who suffered a leg in injury against Washington State, is ready to start. Oregon, despite a 6-0 upset loss to Washington State, is a slight favorite. Casanova said he was confident the Webfoots would rebound from their poor showing of last week. "We've always been a good scrambling team and this has been our strongest point the last two years. I feel confident that if we scramble against California we can win." But Casanova was worried about Oregon's offense which so far this year has been below expectations. The 150 yards net rush and passing gained by Oregon last Saturday was a five-year low for the Webfoots. Even so, Casanova was expected to open with the same backfield that has started all four games this year. That would be Dave Grosz at quarterback, Willie West and Charlie Tourville at halfbacks and Marlan Holland at fullback.

Conley Places Full Attention On Basketball

Boston - (UPI) - Milwaukee Braves pitcher Gene Conley, who ignored the warnings of the baseball club against signing a basketball contract with the Boston Celtics, turned all his attention today to his new job.

The 6 foot 8 inch hurler had only a deaf ear for the rumbings in Milwaukee where Braves General Manager John Quinn commented that by playing basketball Conley would violate his baseball contract. "We have not given him permission to play basketball," Quinn said Thursday after he was informed that Conley had signed with the Celtics. He said any punitive action would be discussed "later." **Final Tuneup** Conley was slated for a final tuneup with the rest of the Boston club today before leaving for New York where the Celtics open their season against the Knickerbockers in Madison Square garden Saturday night. Celtics coach Red Auerbach said Thursday after Conley had signed his contract that he intended to use Conley as a "starter."

Conley played 39 games with the Celtics in the 1952-53 season, scoring 88 points and making 171 rebounds. He is especially valuable in the latter department.

Black Eighth Spurns Whites

Mike Barnes ran for five touchdowns yesterday as the McLoughlin Blacks won 45 to 6 from the McLoughlin Whites in Medford seventh grade intramural football. It was the third win with no defeats for the Blacks. Barnes tallied on a 70-yard punt return, a 65 yard kickoff run back and on 40, 25 and 15-yard romps from scrimmage. Jeff Monroe went five yards for one Black touchdown and Ben Freeman picked up a fumble and ran for the other. Pete Hinman and Bob Walker did the extra pointing. Rick Larson scored for the Whites on a 55-yard jaunt. Cliff Roberts stood out for the Whites both with his offensive and his defensive play.

Pro-Am Tussle At The Dalles

The Dalles - (UPI) - A new type of golf tournament for the Northwest will be held here Sunday and Monday with 29 two-man teams scheduled to take part in a 36-hole, \$1500 invitational pro-amateur event. The tournament will be played under the Scottish system called Chapman. In this both the pro and the amateur hit from the tee on each hole. In second shots the pro hits the amateur's ball and vice versa. Then a decision is made and one of the two balls is selected to be played out on the hole with players alternating the shots.

South Carolina Drubs Clemson

Columbia, S. C. - (UPI) - The South Carolina Gamecocks sent a battered and previously unbeaten Clemson team back to its mountain home today, smarting from a 26-6 drubbing at the hands of three line-ripping backs in the next-to-last "Big Thursday" football classic. The Gamecocks, underdogs with a 2-2 record this season, overcame a six point second period deficit Thursday with a 75-yard march from the ensuing kickoff to tie it at halftime, then riddled the Tiger line to spring the upset. Fullback John Saunders boomed 69 yards in 19 plays, while halfback Alex Hawkins charged and feinted for 57 yards in 12 tries and Quarterback Bobby Bunch registered 61 yards in 18 attempts many of them on roll outs.
