

Bears Humble Oregon 23 To 6

Berkeley, Calif. — (UPI) — Quarterback Joe Kapp climaxed a brilliant afternoon of football Saturday by racing 92 yards for a touchdown as he led California's underdog Bears to a 23-6 victory over Oregon.

Kapp broke loose for his clinching sprint late in the fourth period after the Ducks' Alden Kimbrough had dropped a fourth down pass from Dave Grosz in the end zone. Fourth Straight Win

Kapp was the man of the day throughout the afternoon of crunching line play which saw the Bears win their fourth straight game and to tighten their grip on first place in the race for the Rose Bowl.

Earlier in the contest, which saw Oregon completely dominate the first period, Kapp kept his team's first touchdown drive alive by gambling for yardage on the fourth down. Then in the fourth quarter he intercepted a pass by Southpaw Paul Grover to set up the Bears' second score.

With Oregon leading, 6-0, in the second period, Kapp marshalled a 62-yard drive which started to bog down on Cal's 42. But with half-back Jack Hart through the line for two yards, then passed to him for 37 more which put the ball on the Oregon two.

Two plays later Kapp fumbled the pass from center then hung on to it and crashed over from a half yard out for the score. Then he flipped a pass to Hart for the two point conversion.

Pass Intercepted

California scored twice more in the fourth period. Kapp intercepted Grover's pass on the Bear 18 and returned it to their 26. From there another sustained drive was launched with Kapp putting the ball on the Oregon nine after passing to Hart for 24.

Hart eventually scored from the two and took another pass from Kapp for another pair of points.

With little more than three minutes to play and California on its own eight, Kapp broke loose and raced down the sidelines for the third score.

The Ducks, who were favored by two points, scored in the second period when Sandy Fraser went over from the one to end a 51-yard push.

It marked the first California victory over Oregon since 1952. During the five-year drought, the Bears played the Ducks to a scoreless tie, then lost four in a row.

Buckeyes, Army Off Perfect List

Army and Ohio State, the nation's first and second-ranked college football teams, were knocked from the unbeaten and untied ranks today on another Saturday of spectacular form reversals.

Northwestern, the country's 10th-ranked team, also was bopped off the perfect-record list leaving only five major teams — Rutgers, Mississippi, Colorado, Texas and Louisiana State. Rutgers crushed Lehigh, 44-13, Mississippi beat Arkansas, 14-12, and Colorado rallied to beat Nebraska, 27-16.

Texas, the nation's third-ranked team, met Rice and fifth-ranked Louisiana State played Florida in Saturday night games.

Ties marred the records of both Army and Ohio State which went into their games as seven-point choices.

Pittsburgh, ranked 18th, spotted the first-ranked Cadets two touchdowns and came on to gain a 14-14 tie with the help of a two-point conversion play in the third period.

Ohio State rallied in the third period to gain a 7-7 tie with Wisconsin. The Badgers went ahead on the third play of the second half when Dale Hackbart sped 64 yards on a punt return. The Buckeyes, unbeaten since their first game in 1957, came back with a 65-yard drive climaxed by Bob White's one-yard plunge. Ohio State Coach Woody Hayes "played it safe" and got the tie on a one-point conversion kick.

Iowa, unbeaten but outced, rode to a brilliant 26-20 victory over Northwestern as Randy Duncan threw scoring passes of 18, 21 and 22 yards. In all Duncan completed 14 of 18 passes for a total of 174 yards as Iowa became the favorite for the Big Ten championship.

Third-ranked Auburn whipped Maryland, 20-7, seventh-ranked Mississippi topped Arkansas, eighth-ranked Oklahoma walloped Kansas State, 40-6, 13th-ranked Purdue defeated ninth-ranked Notre Dame, 29-22, in another important upset, Illinois downed 15th-ranked Michigan State, 16-0, and 17th-ranked Air Force Academy edged out Utah, 16-14.

Cleveland, Ohio — (UPI) — The Cleveland Browns announced Thursday that Mike McCormack, offensive tackle and co-captain, may be sidelined for the rest of the campaign because of a knee injury suffered against Pittsburgh last Sunday.

State High Court Suspends Lawyer

Salem — (UPI) — Robert M. McKechnie, Albany attorney, was suspended from practice by the Oregon Supreme Court Friday for a period of six months.

The suspension was recommended by the Board of Governors of the Oregon Bar.

McKechnie had pleaded guilty in United States District Court to a charge of willfully and knowingly failing to file personal income tax returns for the years of 1953 and 1954.

The Court said the punishment was not basically a disciplinary action but rather rested upon the "fundamental principle that conduct that exposes the profession and the courts to ridicule be curbed lest it lead to breaking down to the efficient administration of justice."

Memorial Books Placed on Shelves By Local Legion

In memory of four members Medford Post 15, the American Legion has placed several memorial volumes on the shelves of the Jackson County library. These honor the late Robert Floyd Kyle, Lloyd Allen Williamson, Dr. Carl G. Van Valzah, and Thomas G. Flynn.

Presented in memory of Thomas G. Flynn who served during World War I in the Army is "A New History of the United States," by William Miller. The book was selected because it illuminates the American past and future more brilliantly than any other book of this generation.

Three Volume History

Selected as especially fitting to memorialize three men who served their country during World War I in the Army, the Navy, and the Air Corps were the three volumes of Maj. Gen. J. F. C. Fuller's "Military History of the Western World."

The first volume, taking the history from the earliest times to the Battle of Lepanto, has been dedicated to Dr. Carl G. Van Valzah, who served in the Army. Volume Two, covering the defeat of the Spanish Armada, honors Robert Floyd Kyle, who served in the Navy. Lloyd Allen Williamson, who served in the Air Corps, is represented by Volume Three, carrying the chronicle up to the Battle of Leyte Gulf.

Stimulating Panorama

The work as a whole is one of insight, imagination, and power, a stimulating panorama of the past and a challenge to accepted patterns of thinking about the present.

In accordance with its tradition of presenting memorial volumes to the readers of Jackson county whenever a member dies, the Medford American Legion post has donated a total of 36 volumes to the public library.

So far as possible the families of those being honored are consulted for suggestions as to special interests and suitable selections to be made by the librarian. The family of each individual is also notified when the memorial book is to be placed on the library shelves and given the first opportunity to read it before it is generally circulated.
