Appraisal Hike Protests Arouse Holmes, Hatfield

Portland — (UPI) — Both Oregon gubernatorial candidates yesterday expressed concern for property appraisal increases in Portland and Gov. Robert D. Holmes ordered the State Tax commission to make a complete investigation.

Sharp increases in some instances created a storm of protests in the Multnomah county assessor's office. It was, at first, considered too late for home owners to make an appeal in cases where they thought their appraisals and taxes had shot too high.

But Joe Hawkins, a long-time employee in the assessor's office and a Democratic candidate for assessor, said the law permitted appeals directly to the tax commission in cases where appraisals had gone up more than \$100 without notification to the taxpayer.

Later, an official of the assessor's office confirmed that about 20,000 parcels of property had been reappraised without notice. Presumably owners of those pieces of property are now entitled to an appeal if they feel their taxes are out of line.

Gov. Holmes asked for an investigation and a report from the tax commission. "Delays Unfair" Secretary of State Mark Hatfield, however, suggested that persons "who have been unjustly dealt with" make an immediate appeal without waiting for the tax commission's report. "Any delays would be unfair to the people concerned," he said.

Gov. Holmes said "I have no intention of interfering with local tax administration. However, if a material injustice in taxation exists, at a time when all local remedies have been exhausted, and a legal remedy does exist at the state level, I propose that such a remedy be made available to taxpayers immediately."

MEDICINE KIT — No sulphur pills or penicillin can be found in this doctor's kit owned by John Detweiler, Medford, because such things were known in the days when it was in use. The kit belonged to Detweiler's uncle, Dr. William M. Detweiler, who practiced medicine in Ohio 100 years ago. More than 150 bottles of pills and powders are contained in the kit, most of which are labeled with strange-sounding names such as "hamamelis virg" and "pulsatilla." There were also bottles of opium and morphium for use when the patient suffered pain. The box is made of wood with brass binding and has a rope handle. Strips of leather form compartments to hold the bottles in place (note size of kit compared to one-foot ruler). It is currently on display in the window of Western Thrift Store, 30 North Central ave., Medford.

Mother Charged With Murder Of Neighbor

Ontario — (UPI) — First degree murder charges were filed here yesterday against the 45-year-old mother of three children in connection with the knife slaying of a neighbor woman. Mrs. Bertha Baldwin was jailed without bail on the charge after acting Police Chief Jim Rowan signed a complaint against her. She asked for a preliminary hearing and time to obtain counsel.

Police said Mrs. Baldwin and Mrs. Dorothy Hylland, 43, mother of two children, battled with an axe and knife Friday afternoon and Mrs. Hylland suffered fatal wounds.

Chief of Police Walter Walker said the incident took place when Mrs. Baldwin allegedly called for her children to come home from the Hylland woman's yard. An argument ensued and Mrs. Baldwin was reported to have gone home and obtained a butcher

knife, while Mrs. Hylland reached for an axe.

Mrs. Baldwin told Walker that the Hylland woman swung at her with the axe and she blocked the blow with the knife, apparently striking Mrs. Hylland just above the heart. She was dead on arrival at Holy Rosary hospital here.

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Air Force Developing Air-Ground Missile
Washington — (UPI) — The air force revealed yesterday that it is developing a speedy new missile, dubbed the "White Lance," for use by bombers

attacking land targets. A little brother of the liquid-fueled "Rascal," the White Lance is a solid-propellant rocket to be released from distances of at least several miles to streak ahead of the bomber.

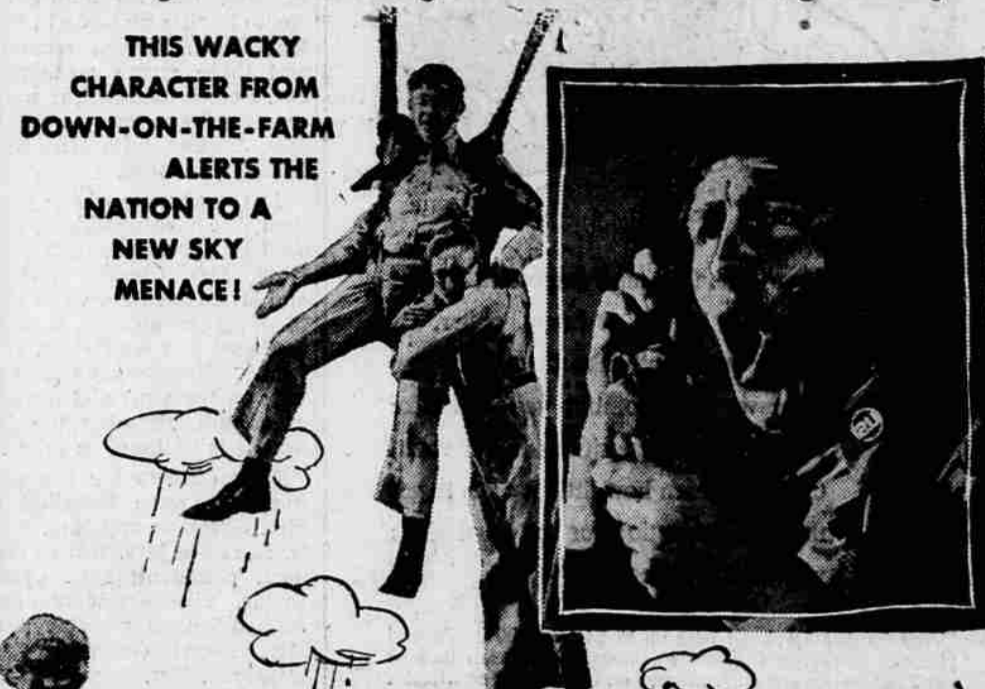
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
