Former Agent To Leave State For Near East

Miss Eula Wintermote, former home demonstration agent for Jackson county and presently serving in the same capacity for Linn county, has resigned from the Oregon State college Extension service to take a position with the Near East Foundation in Teheran, Iran.

She will leave Albany November 4 for her two year assignment overseas. Before leaving the United States Miss Wintermote will attend an orientation course in New York City, leaving there November 6.

Miss Wintermote will be assistant to the Iranian home demonstration agent and will instruct Iranian women in household improvement. She will work in Iranian villages surrounding Teheran and at the end of her two-year assignment will be given the option of returning to the United States or of continuing her work in Iran for another two years.

Miss Wintermote is a graduate of the University of Nebraska and received her master's degree at Colorado State university, Fort Collins, Colo. Prior to her six years in Jackson county she served as a physical therapist with the Women's Army Corps during World War II.

Mr. and Mrs. D. Elmer Dooley of Medford and Camp White are also working with the Near East Foundation at Teheran.

Announcement was made recently that Miss Wintermote would receive the Distinguished Service award at the National Home Demonstration Agents' association convention to be held at the Drake hotel in Chicago November 5.

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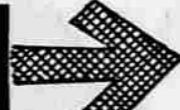
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
