Space-Saving Necessary Art For Crowded Japanese

Tokyo — Space-saving is such a well-developed art in Japan that even pinball machines are miniature. Apparently the technique of making every square inch count developed from necessity—this island country with an area no larger than California has a population of 90 million. But some of the household space-savers might well be adapted in those small homes builders are putting up

in the United States. No Japanese house is stuffed with furniture, so even a tiny house has the spacious look. Cushions on the floor take the place of chairs and sofa, and are stowed when not in use. Even the pillow-back support which some homemakers use with the cushions fold and tuck away. Beds just aren't. The Japanese sleep on "futon," or padding, which at night is spread on the "tatami," or woven straw floor covering. In the

daytime, the futon goes into the closet. Sliding doors help the homemaker make the most of space; open, an area becomes one huge room, but with the doors closed, it becomes two or three rooms. To save space there are narrow gauge railways all over Japan. And a Japanese woman can open a square cotton or silk scarf, called "feroshuki," and tie in it, hobo fashion, more than most of us can get in a suitcase.

Even the trees are dwarfed; these are "bonsai," which through root pruning and branch shaping from the seedling stage grow no more than potted plant size. And the Japanese home with no space for a garden outside creates one inside in miniature. "Bon-kei" are tray landscapes, with the homemaker simulating the natural scenery through arrangement of stones, sand, artificial trees and flowers in a shallow porcelain dish or tray.
