# Is That So?

Thanks to wrongfully interpreted evidence, the great blue heron often seen in marshy places has been virtually eliminated from some areas.

The accusation was that he ate enormous quantities of valuable fish.

It is true that he is a highly capable fisherman, but so far as the charge is concerned, the fact is that he actually helps production of valuable fish. He does it by feeding on various creatures that eat game fish spawn or young. In parts of the south, for example, they feed them by re-plantation. The parent inserts her bill in the youngster's and then brings up part of the catch on which the digestive juices have already started to act. The problem is one of quantity rather than quality, and so anything in the meal line from a dragon-fly nymph to a young rabbit or snake will do.

**Migration Limited**

The great blue heron is a migratory bird, but his migration is generally no farther than necessary to avoid the snow. Those of southern Alaska, for example, seem to stay in the Puget Sound area during the winter season.

But in common with many other herons, the great blue, as a young bird, seems to indulge in a peculiar sort of migration that is more in the nature of a tour. Soon after he has learned to fly, he takes off on a flight that may extend for hundreds of miles. Its purpose apparently is not to find new breeding or feeding grounds but just to see the country.
