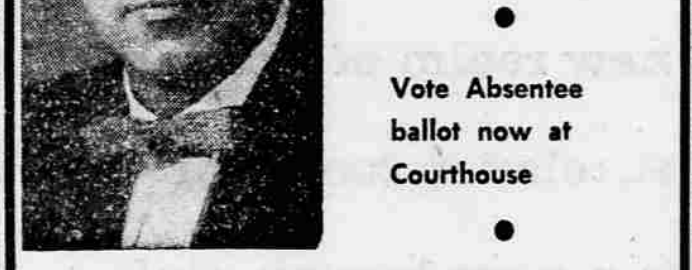

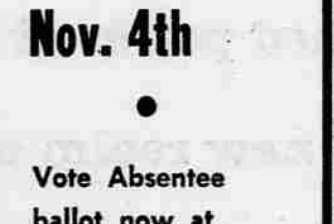

Joe Kapp Leading League In Total Offense Yards

Los Angeles—(UPI)—Quarterback Joe Kapp, the man California is counting on to take it to the Rose Bowl, led the Pacific Coast conference in both total offense and rushing today.

Kapp's total offense figure is 783 yards, according to official PCC statistics released today, compared to 459 for Don Long, the no longer eligible UCLA tailback. Bob Newman, Washington State's passing star, is third with 457 yards.

But Newman still held the No. 1 position in passing, despite an injury early in the USC game last week. He has 49 completions for 511 yards, and six touchdowns, with a percentage of .653. Bob Nicolet of Stanford vaulted into second place after a good game against UCLA with 431 yards on 41 completions, with Long third—36 for 396 yards.

Charles Morrell of Washington State trails Kapp in rushing, 322 to 409 yards, with Willie West of Oregon holding third on 278 yards.

Kapp has gained 354 yards by passing, on 30 completions in 50 attempts—a .600 mark. California's Bill Patton still is the top scorer in the league with 50 points, while Ken Hall of Idaho is next with 27. Gail Cogdill, Washington State, Kapp and Jack Hart, also California, each has 26.

Chris Burford of Stanford replaced Dick Wallen, UCLA, as the top pass receiver with 25 for 284 yards, with Bob Dehlinger, Idaho, in second on 22 completions, and 233 yards. Wallen remained in third—although sidelined for

Buffalo Coach Gets UPI Honor

Buffalo, N. Y.—(UPI)—Don't mention his name to the Ivies; it's sheer poison.

His team is rated as a small college but already has knocked off two Ivy league opponents and could wind up with the best record in the school's football history.

That's the United Press International Coach of the Week, Dick Offenhamer, whose University of Buffalo team upset Columbia, 34-14, last Saturday and is winning him new-found respect as one of college football's up-and-coming bright young men.

"I personally didn't think we had too much of a chance against Harvard in our season-opener," Offenhamer said, "but I honestly felt we had a 50-50 chance to beat Columbia, even though we were the underdogs."

Cleveland's Backs Head Pro Rushing

Philadelphia—(UPI)—Imagine National Football League teams preparing a defense against a pair of backs each averaging around seven yards per rush.

That's the task confronting opponents of the Cleveland Browns and their backfield scourges, Jimmy Brown and rookie Bob Mitchell. Between them, they've netted 1,229 yards in five games to date.

Brown, of course, has everything in the offense world wrapped up in the rushing bracket—total yardage with 815 in 118 carries for a 6.9-yard average, an average of 163 yards per game and 14 touchdowns scored. All this, with seven games to go!

Mitchell, with 414 yards in 53 carries for a 7.8 average, was in second place in the statistics, leading with a comfortable 90 yards over third-place Lennie Moore of the Baltimore Colts.

Moore jumped from sixth place to third, with Willie Gallimore of the Chicago Bears holding fourth place with 323 yards and Tommy Wilson of Los Angeles dropping from third to fifth with 302.

Kansas City—(UPI)—Willamette University of Salem, Ore., was ranked second in the nation today in the weekly NAIA small college football ratings.

Willamette, unbeaten and untied, moved from fourth place. Northeast Oklahoma State was ranked first.

Others in the top 10 included Arizona State of Flagstaff third, Missouri Valley fourth, St. Benedict's of Kansas fifth, Gustavus Adolphus sixth, Kearney, Neb., seventh, Lamar Tech eighth, Tampa ninth and East Texas State 10th.

Augusta, Ga.—(UPI)—Beverly Hanson of Indio, Calif., completed a clean sweep of the year's top honors for women golfers today when she was named winner of the Gienna Collett Vare Trophy, which is awarded to the player with the lowest tournament scoring average. Miss Hanson, who also was the leading money winner on the ladies' professional golfing circuit this year, wound up with an average of 74.92 strokes for 84 tournament rounds.

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
