

# Ashland Hopes for Flare Up of Spirit Against Medford

Ashland - Crushed by three successive defeats and bitten hard this week by the flu bug, the Ashland high Grizzlies hoped to arouse their spirit and determination and flare up with a football showing of which they can be proud.

They entertain the potent Medford Black Tornado, No. 2 rated in Oregon, in Southern Oregon conference play. Kickoff time is 8 p.m.

Medford comes to Ashland with a 6-0 record for the season and needing a victory to pull up with the 3-0 conference mark of Grants Pass which it plays next week. Ashland is 2-4 for the year and 0-2 for the loop.

**Grum Situation**  
Sickness has left a number of Ashlanders "feeling punk" and injury has nit nard at the center slot. In the race of those conditions and the toughness of tonight's competition, Coach Varney Corey of the Grizzlies has described the situation as "mighty grim," adding that "it's not a happy perspective." Nevertheless, he's hopeful that the Grizzlies will come up with high morale.

An Ashland upset would be the snocker of the night in Oregon prep circles.

Defense against Medford plays has been a concentration of the Ashland duo this week out Corey and his staff have gone to no elaborate planning. The mentor indicated that the Grizzlies have been general defensive tending and will take pretty much standard measures against Medford's attack. Effort also has been made to polish up Grizzly plays and get better blocking with them.

**Only 17 at Drill**  
It was in evidence Wednesday when only 17 players were out for practice.

At the center position where knee injuries have sidelined Art Kiser and Jerry Tepper, Corey had planned to use George Moses, a reserve guard. However, Moses is weak from illness and Corey may use the services of Lee Scott, a junior varsity pivot man.

Guard Phil Rodenmayer and halfback Steve Gray are among others victimized by the flu and Chuck Rush may open in Rodenmayer's spot.

Probable starters for Ashland are Moses or Scott, center; Doug Forrest and Rush, guards; Ken Fletcher and Bob Rosebaum, tackles; Ron Johnson and Vern Speirs, ends; Dave Jackson or Bob Voris, quarterback; Gray and Dennis Johnson or Larry Haines, halfbacks, and Alan McKinis, fullback.

## Crater High Choice Over Klamath Pels

Central Point - The little school will be favored against the big school this evening when the Crater high Comets engage the Klamath Union Pelicans in Southern Oregon conference football contention at Modoc field in Klamath Falls.

Klamath Union is around double the size of Crater. Yet, season performances make the Comets the prognosticators' pick as the Central Point school wraps up its 1958 slate.

Comparative scores can't always be relied on in forecasting a winner. But the scores and game statistics are about the only tangibles to pickers have to go on. And, Crater is the "upperdog" on the basis of play within the conference.

The Comets bowed to Grants Pass 26 to 7 and to Medford 26 to 0 in District 6A-1. Klamath fell before GP 32 to 0 and before the Black Tornado 53 to 0.

In scrimmage yardage Crater gained 258 against Grants Pass and yielded 286 net to the Cavemen while Klamath netted only 44 against GP and were pushed back for 378.

Against Medford, Crater got 128 yards to the Tornado's 350. Klamath, meeting the Tornado compiled a 78 net and gave up 443.

In non league play Klamath defeated South Eugene 12 to 7, a team which later lost 25 to 0 to Cottage Grove. Crater downed Cottage Grove 19 to 0.

Crater has run up 152 points in seven games this season to 123 for rivals. Klamath in seven has compiled only 25 markers while rivals have totaled 198.

The Comets had their final practice of the fall yesterday and made it a session of fun as well as work and they went through pass patterns and signal drill. The drill was dismissed early.

Crater will meet a Klamath crew battered up by injuries but should be in pretty good shape itself. Coach Leonard Warren said that he thought defensive end Derrell Williamson, who suffered a knee injury in the Ashland game, will be able to play.

For the Comets the tangle means the difference between a winning season and a break-even one. Crater has four wins and three losses so far this season and also needs a victory tonight to come out even in league play. The Central Pointers are 1-2 in the circuit.
