

Louisiana State, Mississippi Clash in Meetin' of Unbeaten

Louisiana State and Mississippi, two of the perfect-record giants of college football, clash Saturday night to determine which shall go on and challenge other powers like Iowa, Army, Ohio State and Auburn for the national championship.

LSU, ranked fifth in the nation by the United Press International Board of Coaches, is a six-point favorite to beat sixth-ranked Ole Miss in this heralded "meetin' of the unbeaten" at Baton Rouge, La. Both have 6-0 records.

This game has two other important facets beside the high national ranking and preservation of a spotless record. The winner is a good bet to go on to the Southeastern conference championship and fall heir to a berth in the Sugar Bowl New Year's Day.

Quarterbacks Bobby Franklin and Billy Brewer appear to make Mississippi the better passing team, but LSU boasts a superior "grind 'em down" running game because of halfbacks Billy Cannon and Johnny Robinson, and fullback Tommy Davis. LSU's line makes up in speed for what it lacks in weight, compared to the Rebels.

Sooner Over Colorado
Another perfect record and a likely bowl berth are at stake at Boulder, Colo., where undefeated and untied Colorado takes on seventh-ranked Oklahoma in a Big Eight Conference showdown.

Coach Bud Wilkinson's men are favored by seven. The winner undoubtedly will be the conference representative in the Orange Bowl.

Although the Sooners have not lost a conference game in their last 67, they were held to a 21-21 tie by the Buffs in 1952 and were forced to come from behind before beating Colorado in their last two games.

Colorado, ranked 11th this week, is one of the nation's four remaining perfect-record teams. It hasn't beaten Oklahoma since 1912.

Rutgers, the fourth of the unbeaten-untied major colleges, takes on a small-college toughie in Delaware at Newark, Del., but is favored to keep its record unscathed.

The teams occupying the top four rankings—all with records of four victories against one tie—all are favored, but by widely varying margins.

Iowa Favored
Iowa, ranked tops in the nation and hungry for a Rose Bowl bid, is picked by eight at home against beleaguered Michigan, second-ranked Army is picked by 32 points over Colgate at West Point, N.Y.; third-ranked Ohio State is six over Northwestern at Evanston, Ill., and fourth-ranked Auburn was six over Florida at Gainesville, Fla.

The No. 1 intersectional battle of the day finds Notre Dame a three-point favorite over Navy at Baltimore, Md. In the game to be televised nationally by NBC, Wisconsin is picked by six points over Michigan State at East Lansing, Mich. Both have slim Rose Bowl hopes.

Other Big Games
There also are big games in the Pacific Coast, Southwest and Atlantic Coast conferences, involving the Rose, Cotton and Orange Bowls.

Oregon State is a slim one-point pick over California at Corvallis, Ore., in the races for the PCC title; Southern Methodist was favored by three over Texas at Austin, Tex., and Clemson was an 8-point choice at home against Wake Forest in the AAC.

In Friday night games, New Mexico was at Denver, Vanderbilt at Miami, Fla. and Texas Tech at Tulane.

Saturday's intersectional meetings pitted College of Pacific at Boston College; Wil-

liam and Mary at Boston University; Dayton at Holy Cross; Furman at Penn State; Villanova at Wichita.

The Rooks will use the single-wing formation and the Frosh the split-T. Dick West of Hood River will start at tailback for the Rooks while Jim Suter of Portland's Washington high will start at quarterback for the Frosh.

Jim Funston, ex-Medford High all-stater, is listed as starting guard for the Oregon State college Rooks for their grid fray tonight with the University of Oregon Frosh.

The championship of the Oregon Collegiate Conference will be at stake Saturday when Oregon Tech meets Oregon College of Education at Monmouth.

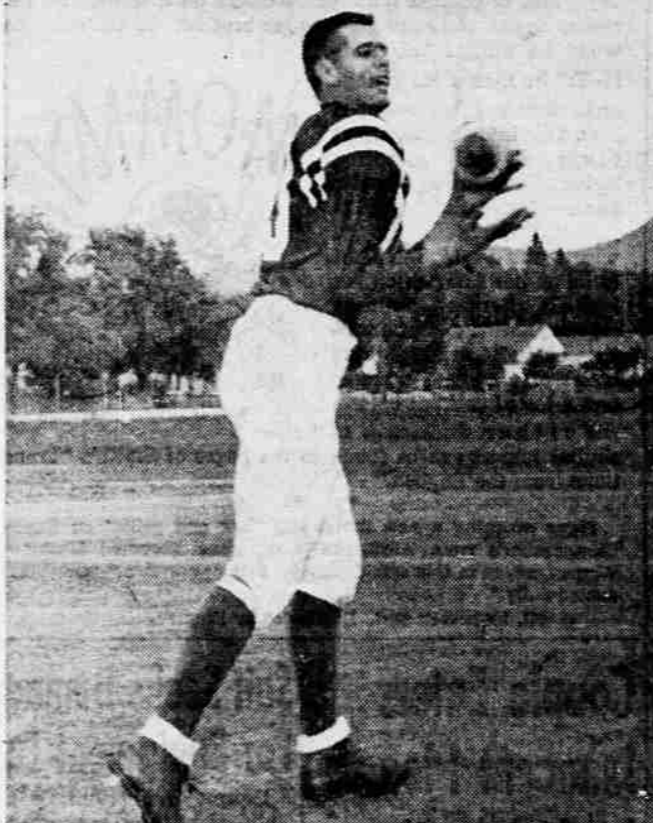
Both teams have 3-0 OCC records and this is their final league game.

Top-rated Jefferson High school continued its red hot pace Thursday night by walloping Benson 54-0 to gain at least a tie for the Portland prep football title.

Raye Renfro, Jeff's fine fullback, scored four touchdowns to run his record-smashing season's total to 139 points. Norm Patera of Cleveland, who held the lead until Thursday night, was held to one touchdown as his team edged Lincoln 18-12. Patera now has 124 points.

In other games Roosevelt, ranked seventh in the state, kept a chance for at least a tie by downing Franklin 31-12. Madison eked out an 8-7 win over Wilson and Washington waxed Grant 44-0.

Salmon Season Sets Records

Portland—Salmon anglers on the lower Columbia river and offshore areas found the 1958 season the best ever experienced. During the past summer, this world famous salmon angling area produced more fish for more anglers for a longer period of time than ever before recorded.

Final statistics on the lower Columbia sport fisheries compiled cooperatively by the game commission and the state fish commission reveal that from July 1 through Sept. 8, 60,790 anglers took slightly more than 65,000 salmon. This is an increase of about 12,000 in both the number of anglers participating and the number of fish taken than was recorded in 1957.

More than 27,000 of the fish taken were chinook salmon, while close to 38,000 were silver salmon.

Since some angling was under way before recording began on July 1 and continued lightly following September 8, the entire catch for the lower river and offshore fisheries would undoubtedly tally higher than the actual computed figures. Catch records are statistically computed from Coast Guard boat counts, moorage operator reports, and systematic creel checks.

Texas Suspends Ezzard Charles

Austin, Tex. - (UPI) - Texas closed its boxing doors to former champion Ezzard Charles Thursday, telling the 37-year-old fighter the action was taken "not only for the best interest of boxing but also for your own health."

Charles, once a boxer of great skill, took a pitiful beating Monday night in losing by a knockout to nationally unknown Donnie Fleeman, the Texas lightweight avy weight champion.

Charles' indefinite suspension, was announced by Alton Erickson, supervisor of boxing and wrestling for the Texas Bureau of Labor Statistics. Erickson made his announcement in a letter to Charles.

Beaver Club Last Tough Foe For Cal

The California Bear express looks like it is on the track to the Rose Bowl but the Oregon State Beavers will try to derail them Saturday.

The Beavers have the advantage of playing on their home ground in the Pacific Northwest and they look like the toughest of the remaining Bear opponents who include UCLA, already beaten by OSC, the toothless Washington Huskies, and the Stanford Indians whose feathers have been dragging more often than not this football season.

Cal has a 3-0 Pacific Coast conference record against the Beavers' 3-1 and the winner of the Saturday contest may well go to the Rose Bowl for the dubious honor of meeting one of those ferocious Big Ten teams from the Middle West.

Bruins-Cougars
UCLA which dropped a 20-19 decision to Stanford last Saturday is minus a half dozen seniors whose careers were cut short by conference penalties, and has a 1-2 league record. UCLA takes on Washington State which has an identical mark. The Cougars appear to be going no place but fast since they lost quarterback Bobby Newman with injuries.

In another league game, Stanford (2-1) battles Southern California (1-3) at Palo Alto. The Trojans, like the Bruins, are bereft of seniors, but they still have a good chance against the in-and-out Indians.

Oregon (2-2) and Washington (0-3) complete the league schedule. The Ducks, with their sterling defense, should take this one if they can push over just one touchdown-a job they have found most difficult in the past.

Idaho-Spartans
In other Coast games, Idaho which has a 2-4 record, meets independent San Jose State. Flip a coin on this one.

Small College Label Incorrect For Miss Sou

Hattiesburg, Miss. - (UPI) - Officials at Mississippi Southern don't like the "small college" label that's pinned on their football team despite its No. 1 ranking in the United Press International ratings.

Reliable sources report that the top school officials are gloomy over the "small college" designation of Southern, which actually has more students than the University of Mississippi, a "major" football power.

The classifications by the NCAA are based strictly on the football schedules and not the number of students. To be considered "major," a school must play at least half its games against "major," opponents for two consecutive seasons.

Schedule "Major" Foes
Early reports on the Southern's 1959 schedule indicate the school may be promoted to the "major" group within the next few years. Already lined up as '59 foes are Auburn, North Carolina State, Texas A&M, Virginia Tech and West Texas State.

John Thomas, assistant coach at Oregon State, told an alumni luncheon Thursday that "for the first time this year the team has responded and it looks ready to give its effort of the season" despite some key injuries.

Thomas also said Oregon State expected California to be its "toughest game."

Rose Bowl Favorite
The winner will be favored to go to the Rose Bowl. California leads the Pacific Coast conference with a 3-0 mark and Oregon State is 3-1. Cal has won its last four straight.

The fact that Oregon State is "up" for this game could be important. Coaches said the Beavers were "listless" in practice before losing to Southern Cal 21-0. When Oregon State was upset 28-0 by Wyoming it didn't have all-American tackle candidate Ted Bates nor fullback Nub Beamer in action. Both are ready to go Saturday.

Thomas said four Beavers were unable to practice this week.

Grimm Mason, one of the two top tailbacks in Oregon State's single wing, has a bad knee and may be out for the season. Gary Lukehart, the regular blocking back, suffered a mild case of blood poisoning and got out of the hospital only last night. Jerry Doman, a regular end, suffered two broken wrist bones and ended Washington last week. And Ed Kahoelauli, regular tackle from Honolulu, has a sprained wrist.

Two May Play
Thomas said it was hoped at least "two of them" could play but that Mason definitely was out.

Thomas, who has seen California games pieces, called California's Joe Kapp "in every respect an all-American." He praised Dainard Paulson of Inglewood, Calif., who has taken over as the No. 1 tailback for Oregon State.

"I've never met a boy with better attitude," Thomas said. Paul Christopholus, athletic publicity director for California, said the Bears expected their "toughest game" of the season and pointed out that California hadn't won a game at Corvallis for 38 years. The Bears also will be up against Coach Tommy Prothro's home record of 14 wins and one tie at home without defeat since he came to Oregon State four years ago.
