

# California Republicans Facing Trouble in Tuesday's Election

San Francisco — (UP) — Much is at stake for both political parties in next Tuesday's California election. The Republicans, in power for 20 years in the nation's second most populous state, are in trouble and optimistic Democrats are predicting a major victory, perhaps even a sweep for their entire ticket. U.S. Sen. William F. Knowland, the GOP candidate for governor, ran 662,000 votes behind the Democratic nominee, State Attorney General Edmund G. (Pat) Brown, 53, in the June primary election. Since then Knowland has waged a shirt-sleeve, precinct-level campaign throughout the entire state, but almost all newspaper polls and other surveys still show Brown with a long lead. Knowland said last week

that if he loses to Brown he would not expect to be a candidate for public office again. Thus a Brown victory would all but put an end to the presidential aspirations of the 50-year-old Knowland, who inherited the mantle of Republican Party leadership in the Senate from the late Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio. In the equally important contest for the U.S. Senate, the Republican nominee, Gov. Goodwin L. Knight, 61, took a thumping in June from Rep. Clair Engle, 46. Recent polls and surveys show veteran campaigner Knight gaining on Engle but the distinct Democratic trend in the primary and in late voter registration puts Engle in the favorite's role. Both President Eisenhower and Vice President Richard M. Nixon campaigned hard in California in the past month in an effort to bolster the GOP cause. Nixon, a native Californian and the likely Republican presidential nominee in 1960, raised about \$600,000 for GOP coffers but failed in his major mission — to patch up personal and political differences between Knight and Knowland.

The proposal would outlaw the union shop and is the keystone of Knowland's campaign for "Union Democracy" and labor union reforms. Knight sides with Brown, Engle and the rest of the Democratic ticket in opposition to right-to-work. Organized labor has pulled out all the stops in registering voters for the election and fighting right-to-work. Since the June primary, Democrats have added 333,000 voters while GOP registration is up on 123,000. A total of 6,752,421 voters are eligible to cast ballots next Tuesday — 3,875,000 Democrats and 2,876,000 Republicans. For the first time in history, Democrats have more than a million-vote edge in registration over the GOP.

## IRS Said Trying To Intimidate Church Leaders

Arlington, Va. — (UP) — A segregationist group has charged that federal tax officials subjected Southern church leaders to "propaganda, intimidation and coercion" by pointing out that churches used for schools could lose tax-exempt status. The Arlington chapter of Defenders of State Sovereignty and Individual Liberties demanded Thursday that the Internal Revenue Service identify the head of any IRS department which has any such tax denial exemption "under active consideration. Might Risk Status. IRS officials said Wednesday that churches might be risking their tax status under certain circumstances if they provide space for private classes in communities where public schools are closed to thwart integration. The officials commented in response to a reporter's questions. They said the issue had been raised informally. But they emphasized that no such case had been brought before them officially for a ruling. The state sovereignty group said that it will petition Virginia members of Congress next year to open an investigation "to ferret out those responsible for using an office of IRS to coerce, intimidate and propagandize private church institutions into submission to race mixing schemes of the National Association of Colored People. IRS officials said that a church's tax-exempt status would come into question if its activities in non-religious fields, such as education, were of such a nature that its primary purpose ceased to be religious. Under the law, religious institutions are not required to pay federal taxes or even to report their income and expenditures to the Treasury.

A 12-year-old Medford boy was interrogated and arrested by city police Wednesday in connection with reported thefts and malicious mischief. The boy, later released in custody of his father, admitted taking a total of \$15 in two thefts from the residence of Mrs. Sidney Loretta Brennehan, 1110 West Eighth st., earlier this month. He also admitted, according to police records, smearing gasket seal material on the Brennehan house and car and on a neighbor's car this week.

## Suit Seeks Damage For Equipment Loss

Delmar D. Farnum, Orleans, Calif., has filed a complaint in circuit court against Tony Bertolino and Charles Bertolino, owners of Bertolino Produce, formerly of Medford, and Roy Rodgers, Ashland, an employee of the produce company. The complaint asks \$9,403 in equipment loss following a fire which burned a log truck and log trailer owned by the plaintiff. According to the plaintiff, Rodgers was careless and negligent when he attempted to transfer gasoline from a five-gallon can into the fuel tank of the truck on Aug. 27, 1958. The truck was being used by the defendant's firm at the time of the incident. The complaint states that gasoline was spilled over the exterior of the truck fuel tank and the floor of the garage which ignited. The fire destroyed the truck, trailer, premises, and numerous spare parts and accessories. Karl Clinkenbeard, Medford, is attorney for the plaintiff.
