ORDINANCE NO. 7045  
AN ORDINANCE submitting to the legal voters of the City of Medford proposed acts of municipal legislation at the general election to be held November 4, 1958.

THE PEOPLE OF MEDFORD DO BOTH ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:  
SECTION 1. That there be, and hereby is submitted to the legal voters of the City of Medford for their approval or rejection at the general election to be held November 4, 1958, proposed acts of municipal legislation amending the Charter of the said City as ordained by the Council of the City of Medford by Ordinance No. 7044:

CHARTER AMENDMENT REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE BY THE CITY COUNCIL  
AN ACT  
To amend the City Charter of the City of Medford, Oregon, by amending Section 165 thereof to exclude assessments for sidewalk construction from the petition requirements applicable to street paving.

BE IT ENACTED by the people of the City of Medford that the City Charter of the City of Medford be amended by amending Section 165 thereof to read as follows:  
"Section 165. The City Council shall not have power to levy special assessments for paving, other than sidewalk construction, except upon petition signed by the owners, according to the records in the office of the County Recorder, of property to an aggregate amount of a majority of the lineal frontage on the improvement to be made and of the area within the limits of the assessment district to be created therefor."

SECTION 2. That the ballot title for the measure provided to be submitted to the legal voters by said Ordinance No. 7044, as aforesaid, and returned to the City Recorder by the City Attorney is adopted as hereinafter set forth, and the following is the number, ballot title and form in which said measure shall appear on the ballot:

Purpose: Amend City  
Charter by authorizing YES   
construction of side-  
walks on local assess-  
ment basis without peti-  
tion of owners of abut-  
ting property. NO

SECTION 3. That the precincts  
and polling places, judges and  
clerks, and hours of and for the  
election at which the foregoing  
measure shall be submitted, shall  
be the same as those designated,  
appointed and set within the City  
of Medford, Oregon, for the State  
General Election to be held on  
November 4, 1958.

SECTION 4. Notice of said  
election shall be given by the City  
Recorder by publication of a full  
copy of this ordinance in three  
issues of the Medford Mail Tribune,  
a newspaper published and of gen-  
eral circulation in the City of  
Medford, Oregon, two of which  
publications shall be not less than  
10 days prior to such election, and  
by causing a full copy of this  
ordinance to be posted at each  
of the places for holding said elec-  
tion and at three public places  
within the City of Medford not  
less than two weeks prior to such  
election.

SECTION 5. The City Recorder  
is hereby directed to certify the  
above mentioned proposed Charter  
amendment to the County Clerk of  
Jackson County, Oregon, within the  
time and as may be provided by  
law for the submission of municipal  
measures at General Elections, and  
to further provide such supplies for  
the conduct of such election as may  
be required to be supplied by the  
City of Medford in connection  
therewith.
