Morse Claims Hatfield Gave False Evidence

Sen. Wayne Morse charged Mark Hatfield here Friday with giving false evidence in the trial of a civil suit in which the Republican candidate for governor and his mother were co-defendants. "Some years ago," the Democratic senator told an estimated 200 people at a noon-hour meeting in the Esquire theatre, his party's local campaign headquarters, Hatfield "killed a precious 7-year-

old girl by negligent driving of an automobile. "Being called as a witness before a jury," Morse continued, "Hatfield gave testimony that the jury rejected and the Oregon supreme court rejected as well." He said Hatfield "cannot be believed under oath as a witness." Morse in the course of his speech quoted at length from the supreme court's opinion on the case (173 Oregon page 79). The court affirmed Nov. 23, 1943 a \$5,000 judgment against the Hatfields in Marion county circuit court. The case had been appealed on several technical counts, including one that the circuit court judge had failed to instruct the jury properly. (Alice Marie Lane, according to a resume in the opinion, was struck and killed June 10, 1940 on Skyline rd. 4 1/2 miles south of Salem by a car driven by Hatfield. (Hatfield was not quite 19 years old at the time. (The defense, in answering an amended complaint in the suit brought by the girl's family, asserted according to the opinion that she was concealed in "thick, tall grasses" beside the road until the moment she stepped into the car's path. (Hatfield, under cross-examination, was said to have testified he could not see through or over the grass and did not see the girl "at any time." (But, the opinion stated, a photograph "known to this record as defendants' exhibit C" showed the grass was not tall enough to conceal her. ("There is no testimony," the court observed, "sustaining defendants' allegation set forth in their answer to plaintiff's amended complaint. ("We are convinced that this is not a case where the victim darted out from a place of concealment into the path of an oncoming automobile.") Morse remarked after finishing his quotation that, "In public life your standards cannot be too high. "I know what a guilty conscience can do to people," he added. The senator related Hatfield's alleged false testimony to "evasive language" and "intellectual dishonesty" which he said characterized one of the candidate's campaign brochures. He charged Hatfield with not taking specific stands, and said he "ducks and dodges" all issues. (Continued on Page 15)

Sorenson Heads Special Gifts Committee

R. M. Sorenson, assistant manager of the Medford branch, U. S. National Bank, has been named chairman of the special gifts committee of the Oregon Shakespearean Festival's fund raising campaign. Hatfield, Others Reply Immediately

Reaction was statewide and immediate to talks made by Sen. Wayne L. Morse (D-Ore.) in Medford Friday and Klamath Falls Thursday, in which he accused Mark Hatfield of giving false evidence in a case involving the death of a 7-year-old girl 18 years ago. Hatfield himself, the Republican candidate for governor, was quoted by United Press International, as saying: "The entire case is a matter of public record and the Supreme Court reports, in every law office in the state carry the final chapter in the tragedy. To have it brought up again in an effort to shatter a reputation at this particular time will bring on a recurrence of great grief to all who were involved in the regrettable accident 18 years ago. "Those who conspire to profit thereby have my compassion," Hatfield concluded.

In Portland, Lamar Toozie, chairman of the Hatfield for Governor committee, described Morse's charge as a "vicious and contemptible 11th hour attack. . . It is a sad day in Oregon politics. Politics in Oregon have plummeted to a new low with this degrading, last-ditch effort from the camp of a defeated candidate. . . " In La Grande, Marion Weatherford, Republican congressional candidate, referred to Senator Morse as "a hysterical man," and said the talk was "an example of gutter politics in its extreme."

Gov. Robert D. Holmes, Hatfield's Democratic opponent, released the following statement yesterday afternoon: "I want the people of Oregon to know that I sincerely regret Sen. Morse's use of a tragic incident in Mark Hatfield's life in the campaign. Never in my entire career of public service have I used the personal life of an opponent. "Sen. Morse has been campaigning for me and I appreciate his efforts, but I deplore his reference to this tragic incident for all parties involved. I had no knowledge that he planned to discuss the matter and it came to me as much of a surprise as to other Oregonians. "I withheld comment briefly so that I might reach Sen. Morse, but he is between cities in eastern Oregon and I have been unable to contact him and feel that my thousands of friends and supporters are entitled to know immediately of my strong feelings against the use of such incidents in a political campaign."

In Eugene, Congressman Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.) said, "This matter should not have been introduced into the campaign. He said there are many other "good reasons" for not voting for Hatfield. Travis Cross, a Hatfield campaign aide, in Salem, said the case in question had probably been looked into by others in every political campaign in the past in which Hatfield has participated. He said that to his knowledge no one had ever used it until Morse brought it up last week.

Medford Area's Halloween Is Fairly Quiet

But Some Damaging Vandalism Reported

Halloween passed with relative quietness in the Medford area, although a few cases of damaging vandalism were reported to Medford police.

Earl Fehl, owner of the Fehl building at the corner of Sixth and Ivy sts., reported to city police that two outside light fixtures had been torn out, and obscene language was written in soap on the windows there. He said the vandalism occurred between 11 p. m. Friday and early Saturday morning.

One woman reported to police that a backhoe had been left on her front yard, and a couple stop signs were removed, they said.

Most of the windows in downtown Medford were marked with soap and wax, and eggs were thrown at buildings and on sidewalks in several downtown sections.

In residential areas, grade school children in Merford collected \$248.91 for the United Nations Children's Fund project, sponsored by the Medford chapter, Oregon United Nations association. A total of \$22 was collected in Gold Hill.

About 200 children participated in the fund drive.

Central Point police reported nine street signs moved, some garbage cans missing and three incidents of balloons filled with water being tossed into homes. Three balloons filled with water were thrown into the Pioneer club Friday night, officers said.

Stabbing Victim Now In City Jail

The victim of an apparent stabbing Friday afternoon walked out of the Sacred Heart hospital Friday night, city police said yesterday.

John Norman Pederson, 38, of the Crater hotel, Medford, is now being held in the Medford city jail on charges of being drunk in public, officers said. The wound in Pederson's back was examined before he was placed in jail and it seemed all right, an officer said.

Hospital attendants called the attending physician when Pederson left and he directed them to call police. Officers picked up Pederson later on the streets. Upon questioning by officers, Pederson said he didn't know what happened Friday and was apparently unconscious when the stabbing occurred.

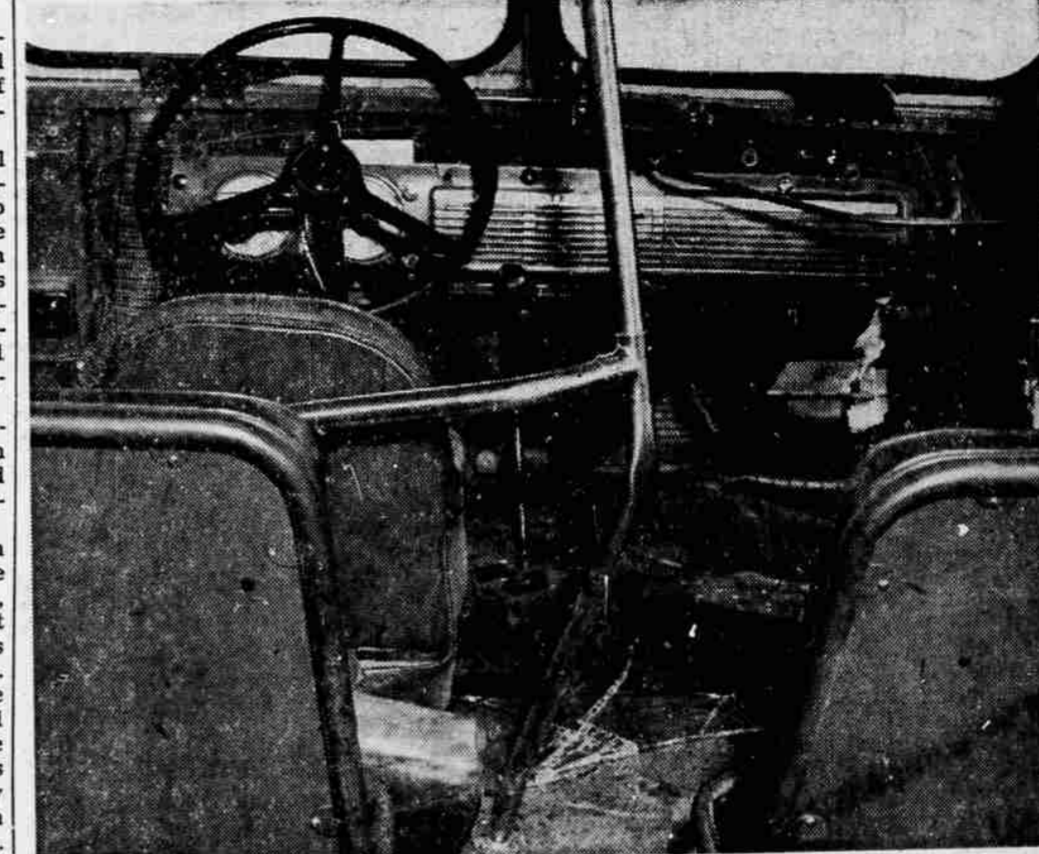
He was found about 12:10 p.m. Friday lying in the city park at the south edge of Medford. He was taken to the police station where examination revealed a puncture wound like that made by an ice pick in his back.

One Breaks Leg; Others Suffer Cuts And Bruises

Griffin Creek Vehicle Rolls Over Bank

About 35 school children suffered lacerations and bruises and one suffered a broken leg when a Griffin Creek school district bus was apparently crowded off Dark Hollow rd. and rolled over about 4 o'clock Friday afternoon, state police and county school officials reported Saturday.

Larry Perckett, 11, a fifth grader at Griffin Creek school, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elza Perckett, route 4, box 385A, Medford, was taken to Sacred Heart hospital by Medford Ambulance service with a broken leg and minor bruises, officials said.

Jim McDonald, public relations director in the county school superintendent's office, said about 35 children suffered lacerations and minor bruises, as did the driver, Stephen M. Whipple, 53, of 503 King st., Medford. No Serious Injuries

McDonald said a telephone contact Saturday morning with parents of children on the bus at the time indicated that no serious injuries have as yet shown up.

State police and McDonald said the accident happened when the bus, which was northbound on Dark Hollow rd., met another vehicle on a section of road about 15 feet wide. Whipple told officials the vehicle crowded the bus, and he pulled the bus as far to the right as he "dared."

Whipple told officials the bus was traveling about 15 miles an hour at the time.

State police said the vehicle which crowded the bus did not stop.

Another bus was sent to the scene, and the children were taken home by the second bus or their parents, McDonald said. The bus, which left the school at 3:35 on its regular run, may be a total loss, McDonald said.

The accident occurred about 9/10 of a mile from the junction of Pioneer rd. and Dark Hollow rd., he said. The embankment, McDonald said, is at about an eight-foot incline.

The bus came to rest about 50 feet from where it left Dark Hollow rd., McDonald said. McDonald said Saturday county school officials urged motorists to use extreme caution when approaching or overtaking school buses, and reminded residents there are state laws governing the operation of vehicles in the vicinity of school buses.

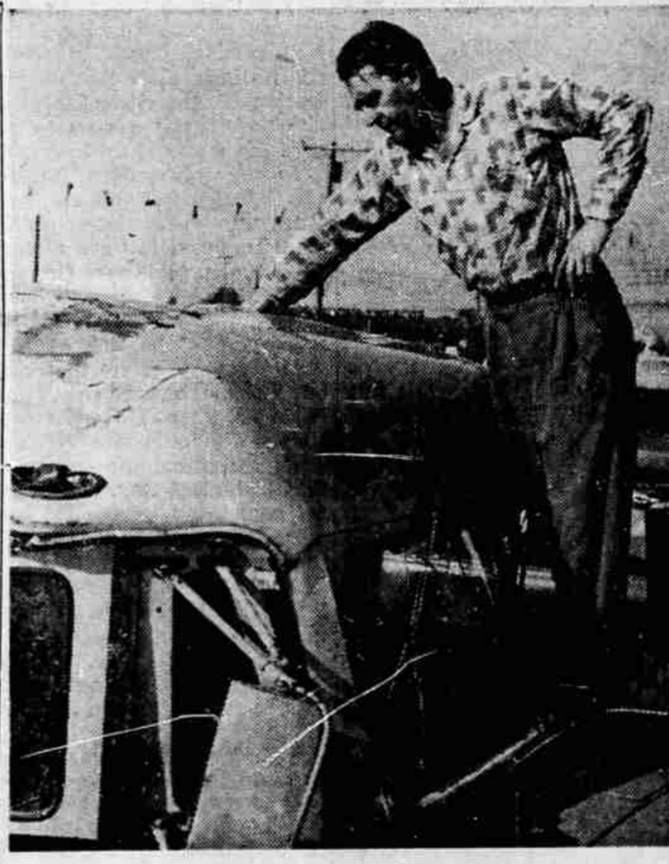
He pointed out Friday's accident was the second in which a school bus has been involved in an accident in two days. Thursday a Medford school district bus was one of three vehicles damaged in an accident on Highway 62 in front of the Desert Service station. None of the children on the bus at the time was injured.

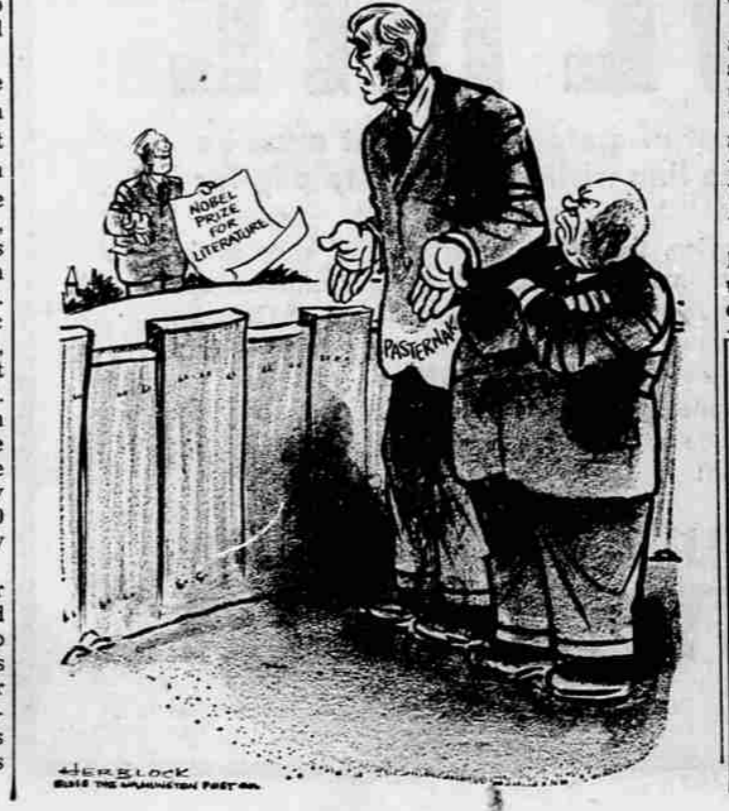
