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Sen. Morse Attacks Hatfield, Praises Holmes and Porter

Quoting a statement by Hatfield that he would "take power out of politics," Morse commented, "I thought he believed in democracy."

"We're not going to take power out of politics and put it in the control of McKees," Morse called Paul B. McKee, president and director of Pacific Power and Light company, "the power behind Hatfield," and said he was "chiefly responsible for getting Mark Hatfield into running in the first place."

The senator discussed the current campaign at length, and praised Gov. Robert D. Holmes and Rep. Charles O. Porter, both Democrats seeking reelection.

He predicted "an overwhelming increase" in the number of Democrats who would be elected to Congress Nov. 4. He said he anticipated "at least eight" new Democratic senators and "30 to 40" new representatives.

"The delegation from Oregon, working with a Democratic Congress, needs your support," he said. He urged "an overwhelming vote" for Porter, and predicted he would win by several thousand votes.

He spoke of cooperation between Porter and himself with regard to Latin America. He said the Senate Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on Latin American Affairs, of which he is chairman, has recently received a \$150,000 appropriation for "a thoroughgoing study of American-Latin American affairs."

He emphasized the threat of Communist influence south of the border.

"Foreign affairs is the issue that pales all others into insignificance," he said.

Morse spoke of his and Porter's support for the Talent project. "We have a great job to do," he said, in increasing "job-producing, wealth-producing" federal appropriations in this area.

He then discussed the "direct liaison" and cooperation between Governor Holmes and the Oregon Congressional delegation in Washington.

"In my opinion," Morse said, "several million dollars for Oregon in the way of federal appropriations this year would never have come without the whole-hearted cooperation of Governor Holmes."

He said Holmes has always answered requests from Washington for information or for his presence there in connection with a Congressional issue affecting Oregon. He said Holmes "has made a magnificent impression before members of Congress."

Morse referred to criticism of Holmes for postponing last year's deer season.

"Bob Holmes," he said, "had the courage, the independence and good judgment to put the economic interests of all the state before the interests of several hunters." He also mentioned Holmes' endorsement of the county regional game committee plan.

Senator Morse was in town only a few hours, coming here from Klamath Falls, and leaving for Josephine and Douglas counties Friday afternoon.

Talent Project Now Seven Months Late

Work on the Talent irrigation project is approximately seven months behind schedule, according to James Callan, project engineer.

He blamed the strike and lockout of the operating engineers this summer and the fast approaching winter weather for the delay. The delivery canals will not be completed to deliver water until August, he added.

The earth-fill on the Keene Creek dam will start the first of the week, he said. The Greensprings tunnel connecting with the power-house will be holed through about Nov. 8 or Nov. 10.

The outlet works tunnel on the Emigrant reservoir should be holed through about the same time, the engineer said. Howard Prairie dam work is almost complete with only minor work left on the fish screen structure and the control house. Conde creek and Dead Indian canals will be completed the first part of November, Callan said.

The penstock on the Greensprings power-plant should be ready for testing some time in November, he added.

Students are preparing to be shot Nov. 20. When many of the student body will receive immunization shots for diphtheria and small pox.

Those who have not received immunization shots for diphtheria or small pox or if it has been over five years since the last small pox vaccination or three years since the last diphtheria vaccination should obtain an immunization form from the office and fill it out. This must be returned to the office immediately to qualify for protection from these diseases.
