

Residents in Cities in County To Elect Councilmen, Officers

Residents of Jackson county's nine cities outside Medford will vote for city officials Tuesday, and in Rogue River a charter amendment will appear on the ballots.

Polls in all county precincts will be open between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. A list of polling places appears elsewhere in today's paper.

In Central Point, a number of write-in candidates are expected.

Running for mayor is Freeman Mason; city recorder, Lyle Paul, incumbent; and Betty M. Parker; treasurer, Ed Jones and Mrs. Avis Van Hoy.

Candidates for the Central Point city council are Ward I. Bill Colley, E. R. Yocom and Arthur Rupp; Ward II, Dale Bartley, Gay Anderson, and Les Bigham; and Ward III, Jerry Bianconi, James Corliss, Calvin Bower and Don Patterson.

Ashland Candidates
Ashland candidates for park commissioners are J. F. Eberhardt, Archie C. Fries Jr. and John C. Cotton. Three positions are open on the commission.

Seeking the three city council positions are Kenneth H. Jones, incumbent; Derrel Beard, incumbent; David S. Kerr, incumbent; Donald E. Lewis, Arthur M. Peters, Mrs. R. H. Virginia Westerfield and W. P. (Bill) Wright.

All council positions are for four-year terms as are those for park commissioners.

Seeking election as Ashland city treasurer are Paul R. Fennell, incumbent, and Guy E. Clarke, two-year term. W. E. Bartlett is unopposed for two-year term of city recorder.

Phoenix Candidates
Phoenix candidate for mayor is Arthur MacKintosh, two-year term.

Phoenix city council candidates for three positions of four-year terms each are Faye Carver, incumbent; E. P. Foxworthy, Mrs. Mona Ferns and A. C. Reese.

Eagle Point Candidates
Eagle Point candidates for mayor are J. Ed Putman and O. Ray Tresham, incumbent, two-year term.

Candidates for the three city council positions, four-year terms, are John Grow, John N. Fortin, Ernest E. Gregg, David H. Kahl, incumbent; F. L. (Lenn) Hickman, and J. E. (Jake) Olsen, incumbent.

Other city positions are not up for election.

Butte Falls Candidates
Butte Falls candidate for mayor is Ellga Abbott; recorder, Kizzie Edmundson, incumbent; treasurer, E. W. Smith, incumbent.

Six city council positions are open in Butte Falls, with five candidates running for a write-in candidate expected for the sixth position. City council candidates are Bruce Pingle, Abbot Driskell, Billy Rogers, Burrell Sacey, all incumbents; and Don L. Smith.

Gold Hill Candidates
Gold Hill candidate for mayor is Milton Steimetz; recorder-treasurer, Ferd Jones, incumbent.

Seeking the three city council positions are Kendall Dufur, Fred Lester, Fred Lewis, Olav Loken and Delos Walker.

City council terms are four years and other positions have two-year terms.

Jacksonville Candidates
Jacksonville candidates for mayor are E. L. Graham and H. R. Parrott.

Seeking election for the positions on the city council are Arthur Davies, Everett Ravnor and E. W. Hannen.

All positions are two-year terms. City recorder and treasurer are appointed.

Talent Candidates
Talent candidate for mayor is Wayne Reichstein; recorder, Noma McAbee, incumbent;

and treasurer, C. G. Sharpe.

Seeking the six positions on the city council are Richard Bradford, James J. Henry, incumbent; C. W. Cooper Jr., incumbent; Albert Praed, John Butler, incumbent; Leo Jacobs and Roma Rice, incumbent. All positions are for two-year terms.

Rogue River Candidates
Rogue River citizens will vote on a city charter amendment Tuesday to consolidate the positions of city recorder and city treasurer.

Seeking a two-year term as mayor are B. H. (John) Leyen and Robert J. DeArmond. If defeated Leyen may continue in his unexpired term of two years as city councilman. DeArmond's

term on the city council expires this year.

Seeking the two-year term of city recorder are Orva Jean Cruise and Mrs. Lois O. Morgan. No one is running for city treasurer.

Three four-year positions and one two-year position are open in the city council. The three council candidates getting the most number of votes will fill the four-year terms and the candidate ranking fifth in ballots cast will assume the two-year position.

Council candidates are Fred J. Deagler, Victor E. Freiden, Albert E. Banforth, Claude B. Willoughby, Richard S. Niquette, incumbent; and Leslie J. Weigart.

Fire Breaks Away In Selma Vicinity

Grants Pass-UP-A roaring fire, started from slash burning, covered 160 acres of timber and brush land on the Jantzer Logging company operation on Bate Lumber company land about 11 miles east of Selma Thursday.

Thirty men from the Bate and Jantzer operations fought the fire from its outbreak at noon Thursday and a relief crew took over early Friday morning.

The blaze burned over dry timber in land described by forest patrol dispatcher Bill Pope as "steeper than a cow's face." He said the fire broke away from the slash burning about noon and one finger of flames spread toward the Kerby lookout and another toward Munger creek.
