Four Vehicles Involved in Crash

Investigating officers gathered from talking to witnesses that Reter's vehicle, southbound on Holly st., struck a second vehicle driven by Margaret Ann Winters, 1468 South Columbus ave., which was eastbound on Sixth st.

The Winters vehicle, according to the report, was knocked into a parked vehicle registered to Owen A. Kunkel, 28 Highland dr. Mrs. Kunkel had apparently just parked the vehicle and was putting coins in the parking meter when the accident happened.

The Kunkel vehicle in turn was spun back into the street, police said, where it collided with the yellow truck operated by James Chris Hagler, 2872 Howard ave., Jackson county dog control officer.

All four cars received damage, according to the report, but there were no injuries.

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Feeding the Family

Calypso Punch

Here is a party punch garnered from a Caribbean breakfast during the recent food editors conference. Perfect for parties of young folks or to have a pitcher handy for the gang after the game. It uses the popular seven-ounce bottles of lemon-lime carbonated beverage for special zest.

Simmer three cinnamon sticks and one-fourth cup sugar in two cups water for 10 minutes. Cool and discard cinnamon sticks. Combine two cups pineapple juice, one cup orange juice, one-fourth cup lemon juice with the cinnamon syrup in a punch bowl or pitcher filled with ice. Slowly pour in four seven-ounce bottles lemon-lime carbonated beverage. Garnish bowl with lemon and orange slices, if you like. Makes 18 four-ounce punch cups.

Golden Nugget Party Fudge

Show any male of any age a plate of fudge and he'll be happy. This recipe makes two pounds or enough to make several boys happy; girls, too. For chocolate fudge, use chocolate chips. For golden fudge, use the new cellophane bagged caramel chips found in the same part of the store as chocolate chips.

2/3 cup (small can) undrained evaporated milk
1 2/3 cups sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups diced or miniature marshmallows
1 1/2 cups caramel or chocolate chips
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Mix evaporated milk, sugar and salt in saucepan over low heat. Heat to boiling then cook five minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add marshmallows, caramel or chocolate chips, vanilla and nuts. Stir one to two minutes or until marshmallows melt. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto waxed paper.

Buttermilk Bread

Good Eating Item

There's a trend toward buttermilk in more recipes, if the foods editors conference

is a criterion. No fewer than 10 recipes featured this healthful, zesty beverage as a recipe ingredient. We especially liked this easy buttermilk bread served at Sardi's and later made by us at home. Recipe makes two loaves.

1 cup buttermilk
3 tablespoons sugar
2 1/2 teaspoons salt
6 tablespoons shortening
1 cup warm water*
1 package cake yeast, active, dry or compressed
1/2 teaspoon soda
6 cups sifted flour (about)

Heat buttermilk till it is hot enough to melt the shortening, but do not boil. Stir in sugar, salt and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Measure water into a large mixing bowl. *Warm, not hot, water for active dry yeast; lukewarm water for compressed yeast. Sprinkle or crumble in yeast. Stir until dissolved. Add lukewarm milk mixture.

Combine baking soda and three cups of the flour. Add to yeast mixture and beat until smooth. Stir in remaining flour. Turn dough out on lightly floured board. Knead until smooth and elastic adding extra flour if necessary. Place dough in a greased bowl. Brush top lightly with soft shortening. Cover with a towel.

Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about one hour. Punch down and turn out on lightly floured board. Divide in half, knead each half lightly and shape into loaves. Place in greased bread pans (9x5x3 inches). Brush top with shortening. Cover and let rise once again in a warm place, until center of loaf is slightly higher than edge of pan; about one hour.

Grocers Appreciate

Regard for Produce

The smart homemaker has a tender regard for perishables, particularly fresh fruits and vegetables. She knows they require the constant attention of the produce man to keep their appearance fresh. The produce man, in turn, appreciates the considerate consumer who doesn't pinch, squeeze or touch produce unnecessarily.

Help the markets, consumers generally, and yourself by treating produce gently. After all, if a store's spoilage losses increase, overhead goes up and this added cost is reflected right back to you in higher prices.

Home care is vital to your budget. Buy only the fresh fruits and vegetables for immediate use to get the most out of them. Store at proper temperature, in the refrigerator, at room temperature, or in a cool, dark, dry place, dependent on the item.

Now for a quick look at this week's best buys.

Grocery Department. National promotions for macaroni products and honey are underway. This should mean "specials". Plenty of tasty, nutritious - packed peanut butter to combine with honey for sandwich and cookie making. Legumes, which, according to our well-worn Webster's, are "restricted to fruits of the pea family", are a compact and inexpensive source of food energy. How about a hearty split pea or lentil soup, soon? Raisins, canned purple plums, olives, and cereal products are all good buys.

Vegetable Buys. Western consumers will find a good supply of fresh vegetables in the markets throughout the fall since the indicated total production is three per cent above last year, the United States Department of Agriculture reports. Substantial increases are indicated for cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, sweet corn and tomatoes. Celery, lettuce, onions, potatoes, green peppers, and bunched vegetables are budget-worthy.

Fruit Buys. Apples top the fruit buys... many kinds and sizes from which to choose. Grapes, pears, bananas, cranberries, avocados, melons are in good supply at fair to excellent prices. Seasonal pomegranates and persimmons are available.

Oregon's Labor Force Declines

Salem—UPI—Oregon's labor force dropped from a total of 730,500 in mid-August to 707,300 in mid-September, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission reported today.

However, non-farm employment rose 8,100 in the month's time compared to a 2,400 job increase for this period last year.

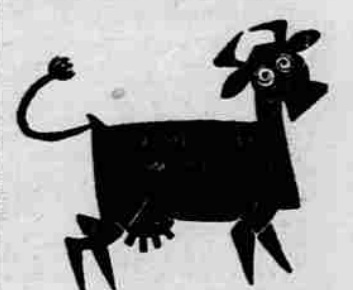
side activities with contract construction employing 3,900 more workers and sawmill employment rising slightly. State and local government jobs increased by 6,500 in September.

Agricultural jobs declined from an estimated 105,100 to 79,200 during the period and comparatively little seasonal labor was still required except in late fruit and vegetable harvests.

Total unemployment declined from 37,200 jobs in mid-August to 31,800 this month.

To the Editor:

Since mid-March when I accepted an invitation to speak before a group in Medford I have felt additional interest in Jackson County politics and have followed your local papers closely.

As you know, I am a former Democrat and am now a Republican. After having been nominated and elected by both parties as a Democrat, I changed my registration to Republican as my protest at what was happening to the Democratic party. Many Democrats like myself were repulsed by the caucus tactics which were directed by the Multnomah County bosses, but I am the only one to take action.

I now fear for all Oregonians when the Democratic party endorses "legislation by caucus." The Democratic party of Oregon just will not tolerate any legislator who thinks independently or has an independent idea.

I have watched your own Representative Robert Duncan willingly go along with the Multnomah Democrat leaders and voting step by step as directed by the strategists who evidently say to him in effect, "... vote as we say or we will see that you are on the outside looking in." He may have privately protested at the domination by Multnomah County, but he has never objected publicly or strenuously.

For confirmation of this established policy of legislation by caucus contact Democratic Rep. Katherine Musa. She fought the bosses and with the Republicans tried to get all Oregon citizens a 30% cut in taxes at the special session of the Legislature. This courage resulted in her being held up to public scorn by her own party. She was pushed out of their caucuses. I know, because I was in the Legislature at the time.

Ask Democratic Rep. Emil Stunz. He did the same as Mrs. Musa. He objected to bossing of the Democrat leaders and was vilified and then purged from his party by members of his own party. Through maneuvers which would do credit to a professional eastern politician Rep. Stunz was defeated in his own party primary. He refused to conform and was therefore eliminated.

This "conform or be purged" philosophy is one all Democratic legislators must now accept. When a man is elected by the Democrats he goes to Salem to serve the Democratic Party and nobody else and he must leave his independent thoughts at home.

I have watched the Jackson County situation closely and I feel it my duty as an Oregonian to let the people know what is going on.
