 "Stop boing poor old Charley and bring on those Baltimore Colts."

That was the New York Giants' slogan today as they gloated over a 21-17 Sunday triumph that snapped Cleveland's five-game winning streak and left them only a game behind the Browns in the National Football league's Eastern division.

Next Sunday the Giants entertain the league's only remaining undefeated team, the galloping Colts who crushed the Green Bay Packers 56-0. Baltimore, aided by the Rams' 41-35 victory over the Chicago Bears before 100,474 at

Rams Trip Bears 41-35 In Pro Mix

Los Angeles—UPI—The Chicago Bears came within one dropped pass of beating the Los Angeles Rams, George (Sad Papa Bear) Halas lamented today without offering any other excuse for a 41-35 trimming at the 1958 halfway point on the pro football schedule.

"We never complain or belly-ache after a game—not in the 35 years I've been in this sport," said the owner-coach of the team rated the pre-season favorite for the Western conference title in the National Football league.

"The turning point against the Bears Sunday was when Harlon Hill dropped a fourth quarter clutch pass in full stride behind the Los Angeles defense."

The only incident that bothered Halas was the case of the missing kickoff tee at the start of the second half. The Bears carried Chicago's tee to the dressing room at half-time, and forgot to bring it back.

A hurry-up appeal went to the Rams bench which claimed to have lost its own tee. "They wouldn't loan us one," scowled Halas, "and we know it was over there on their side all the time."

Halas had high praise for the Rams' Jon Arnett, declaring the youngster who almost single handedly ruined the Bear chances Sunday was one of the "greatest of all time in the sport."

Gillman Happy
 Sid Gillman was happy over the Rams' victory and said he felt that the vaunted superiority of the Bear teams was largely a myth.

"This was our most satisfying victory since we won the division title," he said. "I was confident all week that we could beat the Bears because the players were so confident. They were really up for this game."

"I have never seen such kickoff returns as those Arnett made. He was just tremendous. And it was Les Richter's best game. He played with a bad ankle, but we just couldn't keep him out."

Los Angeles, took a two-game lead in the Western division. Who's "poor old Charley?" That's Charley Conerly, 37 going on 38, the grey-haired Mississippi cotton farmer and ex-marine who has played quarterback for the Giants for 11 years. The fans booed Charley at the Polo Grounds they boo him now at Yankee Stadium, and 78,404 stunned Clevelanders felt giving him a record razzing Sunday in their big Municipal stadium.

Fires Touchdown Passes
 Because it was old Charley, hammered and pounded as he has been for so many years by Cleveland's aggressive defenders, who fire the three scoring passes that handed the Browns their first 1958 defeat. The Giants, 10-point underdogs and playing without all-league halfback Frank Gifford, kept the Browns from taking a three-game lead and breaking the Eastern race wide open.

Hugh McElhenny's 32-yard run in the final four minutes gave the Forty-Niners a 24-21 victory over the Detroit Lions before 59,213 San Francisco fans; Norm Van Brocklin's one-yard toss to Dick Bielski with 17 seconds to play gave the Philadelphia Eagles a 21-21 tie with the Cardinals at Chicago, and Bobby Layne's two touchdown passes paced the Steelers to a 24-16 victory over the Washington Redskins at Pittsburgh.

Giant Defense Stiffens
 With Don Heinrich, New York's other quarterback, sidelined with an ankle injury, Conerly had to go all the way. And things looked bright for the Browns when Ken Konz stole one of "poor old Charley's" passes and raced 46 yards to give them a 17-7 halftime lead.

Two minutes before that, Jim Brown, the league's top rusher and scorer, raced 58 yards to score. But it was a different story in the second half when the New York defense kept the Browns from crossing their own 40.

The New York defense probably faces a stiffer task next Sunday in a Baltimore club that averaged 39 points a game. John Unitas of the Colts threw scoring passes to Lenny Moore and Alan Ameche Sunday before he was taken to the hospital with a possible cracked rib. George Shaw replaced Unitas and threw scoring passes to Lenny Lyles, Jim Mutscheller and Bert Rechichar during a cold rain before 51,333 fans.

Joe Brown Defending Wednesday
 New York—UPI—The lightweight champion and his top contender will fight this week, but not against each other. Champion Joe Brown will risk his unbeaten string of 20 bouts against young Johnny Bussio Wednesday night in a non-title 10-rounder that opens the brand new Exhibition Hall at Miami Beach. It will be televised nationally by ABC.

Kenny Lane, No. 1 contender, meets Lahouari Godih of Algeria in a TV-radio 10-rounder at Memorial Auditorium, Syracuse, N. Y., Friday night.

Lost Thriller
 Blondish, southpaw Lane of Muskegon, Mich., will be fighting for the first time since last July 23, when he lost a thrilling title battle to champion Brown at Houston, Tex.

Brown of New Orleans hasn't fought since then either. However the champion is favored at 12-5 over Bussio of New York. Lane is favored at 2-1 over unranked Godih although the classy Algerian lightweight gave top welterweight contender Don Jordan a terrific fight before losing a disputed decision to Don at Madison Square Garden, Aug. 29.

McElhenny, Perry Spur SF Victory

San Francisco—UPI—San Francisco Forty Niner Coach Frankie Albert today praised his veteran running backs Joe Perry and Hugh McElhenny whose flashy performances led San Francisco to a hard-fought 24-21 win over the Detroit Lions.

"In 11 years, I've never seen Perry run better than he did Sunday," he said. "As for McElhenny, he is still the greatest break-away runner in the game. We gave them some blocking for a change."

Perry, who has run for more yards than any other back in the history of pro football, answered critics who have suggested that he was over the hill, by rewriting the Forty Niner record book. He galloped 174 yards for a 13.2 yards per carry average to crack two team marks.

Two Long Runs
 In the first half, he stunned the 59,213 fans by exploding for runs of 61 and 74 yards off right tackle Bob St. Clair's blocks. The 61 yarder set up a field goal and the 74 yarder with less than a minute remaining in the half put the Forty Niners ahead 17-7.

But it was McElhenny who preserved the win. The Lions moved ahead 21-17 with nine minutes to go. Another of the Forty Niner old pros, Y. A. Tittle, though slowed by a groin injury, was sent in to replace a faltering John Brodie at quarterback.

He soon faced a make or break third down and seven to go situation on the Forty Niner 32. Tittle hit McElhenny for 28 yards in probably the key play of the game. Two plays later, McElhenny took a short toss and cut through the Lion secondary to score the winning touchdown on a 32 yard play.

McElhenny caught a total of four passes and contributed two big downfield blocks on Perry's runs.

Colleges Hear Pro Message
 New York—UPI—The nation's college football teams have gotten the "message" from the professionals—at long last.

The "message" in this case happens to be the field goal, an obscure scoring weapon among the crew cuts since the days of the old drop kick but the play-for-pay boys' ace in the hole on attack right along.

There was a lot of "settling for three" along the collegiate trail the past week end, too, a United Press International survey disclosed today.

The survey showed 11 schools that "went for three" 15 times: One of them—Purdue—established a Big Ten record by making two field goals in a 31-8 romp over Illinois, while Georgia Tech permitted Tommy Wells five shots at the crossbars before he finally hit for the margin of victory in a 10-8 decision over Duke.

Field goals also marked the margin of victory for Syracuse, Wisconsin, Kansas and Davidson.

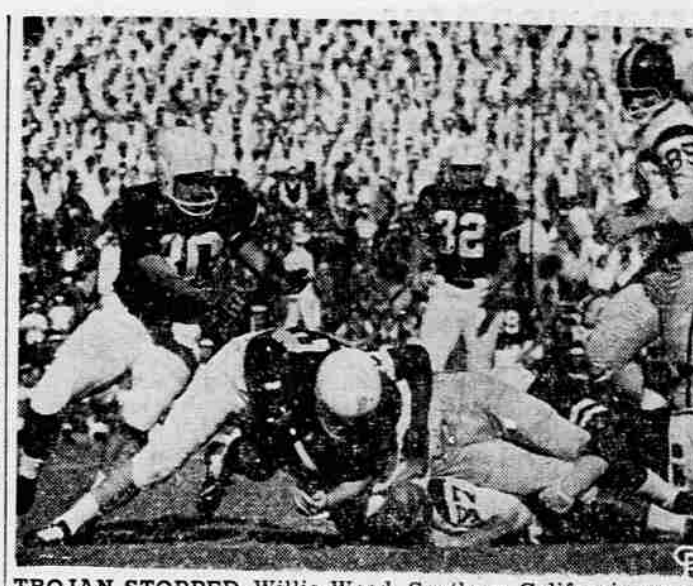
The blonde majorette, who performs in a brief, tight gold costume, brushed off a suggestion that she had toned down her "wiggling" by saying, "not that I know of."

Grid Bowl Picture Coming Into Focus

 There's many a pitfall ahead but the New Year's Day bowl picture appears today to be rapidly coming into focus.

Iowa, Louisiana State, Oklahoma and Oregon State gained the inside track for various "automatic bids" on Saturday and it also seems that Syracuse, Mississippi, Clemson and North Carolina are in line for lucrative January invitations. Toss in the Southwest Conference champion and rugged Pittsburgh and here's a long range look at the possible pairings in five major bowls:

Rose Bowl: Iowa (5-0-1) vs. Oregon State (5-2-0).

Sugar Bowl: Louisiana State (7-0-0) vs. Syracuse (5-1-0).

Cotton Bowl: Rice (4-2-0) or Texas Christian (3-1) vs. Mississippi (6-1-0).

Orange Bowl: Oklahoma (5-1-0) vs. Clemson (5-1-0).

Gator Bowl: Pittsburgh (4-2-1) vs. North Carolina (5-2-0).

Iowa, the nation's No. 1 team, took a firm grip on the Big Ten lead with a 37-14 triumph over Michigan Saturday while Oregon State took over the Pacific Coast conference lead with a 14-8 decision over California. Northwestern, 21-0 winner over Ohio State in Saturday's biggest upset, is still a strong challenger in Big Ten but has lost one game

and has three tough ones to go. Iowa, unbeaten, has weak Indiana and strong Ohio State left.

Louisiana State's 14-0 victory over Mississippi left the Tigers one of the two remaining unbeaten and untied major powers in the country, the No. 1 team in the Southeastern conference and virtually a sure thing for the Sugar Bowl. Syracuse moved into strong contention for the berth opposite LSU with its 16-13 win over Pittsburgh. Syracuse also must be considered a contender for a Cotton Bowl bid opposite the Southwest conference champion.

Oklahoma practically clinched the Big Eight title and an Orange Bowl bid by whipping previously unbeaten and untied Colorado, 23-7. Clemson should clinch an Orange Bowl bid next week by beating North Carolina State.

Mississippi, beaten but far from disgraced in the South's "game of the year," is a good bet to go to the Cotton Bowl. Rice and Texas Christian, each 3-0 in conference play, may resolve the Southwest conference title on Nov. 22. Pittsburgh, beaten twice and tied once but nevertheless one of the country's top-line powers, probably would take a Gator Bowl bid opposite North Carolina, which scored a 21-7 victory over Tennessee on Saturday.
