

Knowland, Brown In Final Pleas For California Governor Post

San Francisco (UPI)—Republican Sen. William Fife Knowland and Democrat Edmund G. Brown wound up their bitter campaign for governor today with a series of last-minute appeals to California voters.

Knowland, planning to work desperately right up until the polls open at 7 a.m. (PST) Tuesday scheduled a last-ditch "prop stop" aerial tour of the San Joaquin Valley.

Brown, confident that he has the election in the bag, planned a brief appearance in Long Beach, a "campaign clincher" luncheon with his supporters in Los Angeles and a final "get-out-the-vote" state wide radio appeal tonight.

Both candidates obviously were worn out after a campaign that actually started 23 months ago when Knowland announced he was giving up his post as Republican Party leader in the U. S. Senate in order to make a try for governor in his home state.

Brown actually announced his candidacy for governor on his 27th wedding anniversary Oct. 30, 1957. Before the marathon campaign ended today, Brown and his attractive wife, Bernice, had a chance to observe still another anniversary.

While Brown and Knowland were winding up their appeals, Republican Gov. Goodwin J. Knight and Democratic Congressman Clair Engle were fighting the final round in their battle for a six-year term in the U. S. Senate.

Tests of Party Strength

Both the gubernatorial and senatorial contests are regarded throughout the nation as key tests of the relative strength of the two parties. California has not elected a Democratic governor in 20 years and Republicans have held Knowland's Senate seat since before he was appointed

Demos Confident; Republicans Hopeful As Election Nears

Washington (UPI)—The 1958 political campaign ends today with the Democrats confident and the Republicans hoping for upsets in Tuesday's elections.

Despite close races in some states, practically all the polls and other political barometers indicated the Democrats will increase their now slender majorities in the House and Senate.

Almost 50 million voters in 47 states will ballot Tuesday to elect 33 U.S. senators, 452 House members, 32 governors and many other state and local officials. Maine elected a senator, a governor and three

House members Sept. 8—all Democrats except one House member.

Last minute appeals came today from the candidates. But the big guns in both parties were silent except for Vice President Richard M. Nixon, campaigning in the soon-to-be new state of Alaska which holds its first election Nov. 25.

Predict 12 Seats

In a dispatch written today for United Press International, Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler predicted his party will gain at least eight to 12 Senate seats and at least 40 House seats.

Sunday he used more specific figures and said he expected a gain of 11 or 12 Senate seats and 47 House seats. Chairman George A. Smathers of the Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee predicted a Democratic pickup of at least 12 Senate seats, not counting the one already won in Maine and those at stake in Alaska.

Republican National Chairman Meade Alcorn said reports from GOP leaders would "do better than the polls indicated." He said these reports promised "some very startling upsets" and showed that the GOP "could conceivably recapture control of the House." He admitted regaining control of the Senate "would be very difficult."

Names No States

The Senate lineup is now 49 Democrats and 47 Republicans. The House is divided 232 Democrats, 195 Republicans and eight vacancies.

Alcorn named no states as the locale for upsets. Smathers said his party had its best chances to displace Republican senators in Connecticut, New York, West Virginia (two seats), Michigan, Indiana, Minnesota, Wyoming, Wisconsin, California, Arizona and Nevada.

Rescue Workers Continue Probe of Mine's Depths

Springhill, Nova Scotia (UPI)—Grimy workers continued today their fevered digging into the wrecked Cumberland Mine in the dim hope that a third miracle would occur and still more entombed miners might be found alive.

Twice all hope had been abandoned but digging workers found two groups of men still alive, deep beneath the earth.

Mine officials held little hope today that more miners would be found alive but they vowed work would continue until the last missing body was found. They hoped to finish the grim task by the end of the week.

100 Men Rescued

Forty six bodies have been recovered and 100 men have been rescued, including seven who were trapped almost nine days, and 12 others who were found after more than six days. That left 28 unaccounted for since the Oct. 23 cave-in.

During the week end, officials of the Cumberland Railway and Coal Company and its parent, the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation said they were certain no men were left alive in the mine.

After Saturday's rescue, crews of highly trained rescue workers brought here were called off the search. They left for their homes Sunday, leaving coal mine rescue squad to end the search.

Two Persons Hurt In One-Car Mishap

Two persons were hurt, one seriously in a one-car accident north of the Birdseye creek bridge about 9 p.m. Saturday, according to state police.

Allen Wittlesey Carmen, 20, of Redwood City, Calif., was in fair condition in the Josephine county general hospital at Grants Pass this morning and is being treated for possible head injuries, hospital attendants said. Carmen and his passenger Duke Sumner Stroud, also of Redwood City, were taken to the Grants Pass hospital by ambulance. Stroud was treated as an outpatient and released.

State police said the car was southbound on Highway 99 when a car attempted to pass the car driven by Carmen. The car moved to the right edge of the road, the car wheels caught on the edge of the pavement and the car was flipped over throwing Carmen out of the car. Extensive damage was done to the top and sides of the car which was towed into Gold Hill by wrecker, officers said.

The Communist Party, anxious to win back the million voters who deserted it to vote for the new constitution last Sept. 28, jumped the gun with two mass rallies last week.

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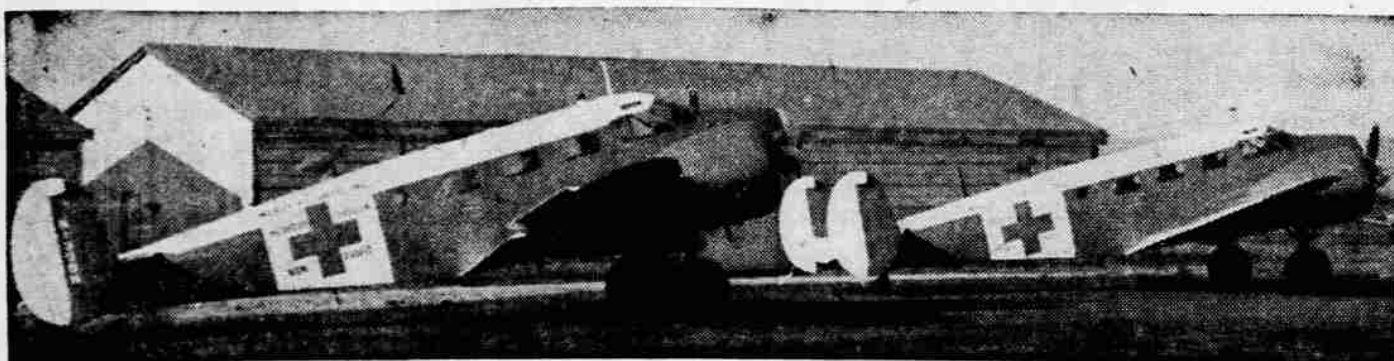

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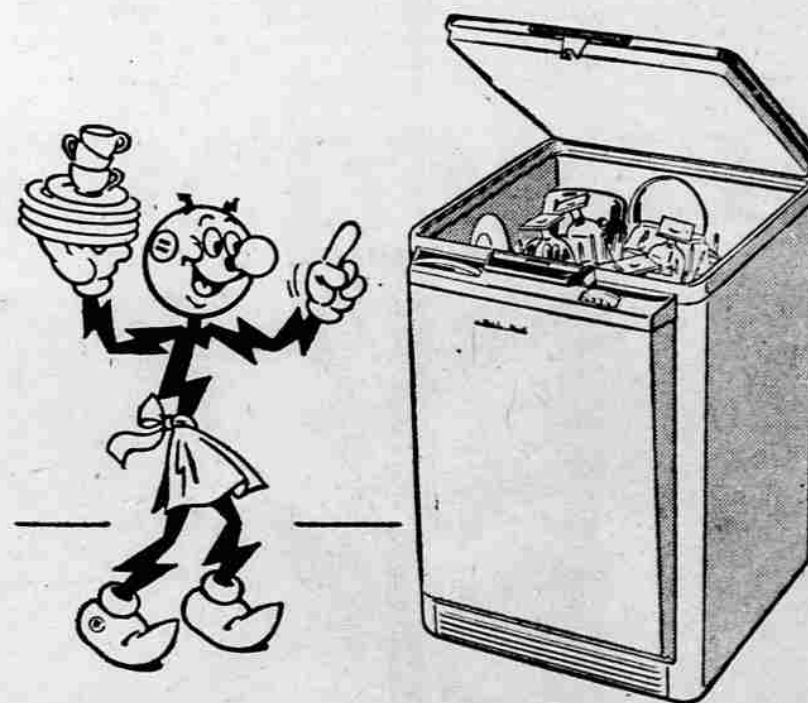
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
