Portland—(UPI)—City Transit Lines of Salem, Eugene and Springfield today sought cancellation of a bankruptcy order. Federal Judge William East set further argument on the issue for 9:30 a.m. Friday in Eugene.

Frank E. Bocci, company attorney, said that City Transit's operations in Eugene and Springfield had ceased but that the Salem operation is "running rather successfully."

The involuntary bankruptcy petition was brought by bus drivers who claimed back wages were due. Don Swink, an attorney for the petitioning drivers, suggested that should East vacate the bankruptcy order the company should continue to be operated by a receiver until the issue finally was settled.

Dr. E. A. Merkel To Preside At Health Meeting

Dr. A. Erin Merkel, Jackson county health officer and president of the Oregon Public Health association, will preside at the annual meeting in Portland Nov. 6 and 7.

Dr. Merkel will leave Tuesday to confer with directors of the association and the state board of health Wednesday prior to the annual meeting.

Also attending from the valley are Orie Moore, chief sanitarian; Miss Josephine Koppes, administrative secretary for the public health office here; and Miss Alena Makinen, public health nurse. Dr. Merkel said that the convention this year is geared to the interest of all persons interested in community health. This year for the first time the program is such that it approaches health problems from rehabilitation, social welfare and other social fields.

The conference, to be attended by about 200 public health and related agency workers from the state, will include speakers from throughout the state, Washington and California.

Keynote speaker will be Dr. Victor Howery, dean of the graduate school of social work, University of Washington, Seattle, who will speak at the 10:30 a.m. opening general session Thursday.

Conference theme is "Health and Social Services—Catalysts in a Free Society."

WU Seeks To Cut Proposed Increase

Washington—(UPI)—Western Union asked the Federal Communications commission today for special permission to scale down its proposed increase in private line teletypewriter service rates.

Western Union told the commission the revised rates would replace increase proposals it made last August but which the FCC later suspended.

The company said the new proposal was designed to hike annual revenues an average of 17 per cent or \$5,500,000. The modified rates would become effective Dec. 1.

Western Union noted that this amount was approximately \$2 million less than rate increases it proposed Aug. 15.

UPI Sets Up Elaborate System For Coverage of Election News

Washington—(UPI)—United Press International was geared today to perform its biggest single reporting job—gathering, tabulating and reporting national election results.

Roughly 7,500 people will be on the job election night. They will be collecting and computing returns, and finally translating results into news dispatches for instant transmission to newspapers, radio and television stations throughout the world.

Election headquarters, national nerve center of the whole operation, was set up in the Washington bureau in the National Press Building.

More than 14,000 miles of special teletype circuits were installed to pour returns with-out interruption into this national tabulating center from every section of the country.

Headquarters here, working on an around-the-clock schedule, will be manned by 105 people—nearly the entire regular Washington staff, plus two executives from the main UPI office in New York.

The national tabulating

done here is a final part of the job, but actually, by comparison, a small part of the operation.

Special election bureaus also have been set up in each of the states to compile and flash to Washington returns collected by the thousands of men and women for every precinct and county across the land. Each state election bureau also will write news dispatches about its own state races.

Nine special teletype circuits, one more than the number used during the 1956 presidential elections, will pour into Washington results on every Senate, House and governorship race, plus special state propositions such as the right-to-work laws proposed in Ohio, California and four other states.

Entered on Charts
These returns will be entered on huge election charts that line one wall of the bureau. The charts have been perfected over the years to a point where the exact status of the overall election picture can be given almost instantly at any given moment.

Flowing back from Washington over 375,255 miles of regular UPI teletype circuits to newspapers and radio and TV stations will be the news of the results.

The spot election story for afternoon papers will be written by Raymond Lahr, political writer Robert Barkdoll will write the main election story for morning newspapers. Both Lahr and Barkdoll have been writing national politics for many years.

Lyle C. Wilson, UPI vice president and Washington manager, will bring 32 years of political reporting experience to a vital phase of the election-analyzing results.

Separate governorship stories will be written by William Theis, chief of the Senate staff, for afternoon papers, and by Dayton Moore, a veteran UPI congressional reporter, for morning papers.

Other Top Byliners
William J. Eaton, labor reporter, will write the right-to-work story.

Frank Eleazer, head of the House staff, and other members of the Washington bureau, also will have signed stories.

Merriman Smith, UPI White House reporter, will report President Eisenhower's election night activities, and Warren Duffee will keep tabs on Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Harry Ferguson, assistant general news manager from New York, will be in editorial command Tuesday night.

Merton T. Akers, veteran election specialist from New York, and Julius Erandsen, Washington news editor, organized the election operation. Milton Magruder prepared the elaborate chart system. Ernest Barcella will direct preparation of election news dispatches for afternoon newspapers and Grant Dillman for morning papers.

Net gains in the leading groups held to small amounts since some of the key issues moved off slightly. Specials strengthened. Some of the oils, tobaccos, tires, metals, and utilities strengthened.

American Motors continued to lead the market in turnover. It rose more than a point. Studebaker-Packard, also active, firmed. Small gains appeared in the leading auto shares. White Motors rose more than a point to a new high in the truck group. Amerace rose more than 2 points in the textiles. It set a new high as did American Viscose, the last on a rise of nearly 2 points. Allied Chemical rose in its section while DuPont and Eastman sagged. Admiral, up more than a point at a new high, featured an irregular rise in telecommunications.

Jacksonville Tavern Owners File Petition

Charles P. McBeth and Adelaide L. McBeth, operators of J'ville Tavern, Jacksonville, have filed a petition in circuit court against the Oregon Liquor Control Commission.

According to the petition a hearing was held by the commission Oct. 3, 1958, concerning alleged violations by the McBeths. The commission charges that employees of the tavern on two occasions, Sept. 13 and Sept. 21, sold alcoholic liquor to minors.

On Oct. 23 the commission served notice on the McBeths, cancelling the tavern's liquor license effective today, Nov. 3, at 7 o'clock in the morning.

The petitioners claim insufficient evidence was presented at the hearing to prove that an employee of the tavern sold liquor to minors on either day as charged. They further charge that the commission refused at the hearing to permit the introduction on behalf of the McBeths of certain evidence competent, relevant, and material to their defense.

The petition also charges that the petitioners were denied the elements of due process of law in that the trial examiner for the commission counseled them to the effect that it was unnecessary for them to produce a certain key witness whose testimony would have been material to the defense of the petitioners.

The McBeths request a review of the case and ask a stay be granted the revocation of the liquor license pending action.

Attorney for the McBeths is Russell W. DeForest, Medford attorney.

Papermakers Reach Agreement

Portland—(UPI)—Representatives of the United Papermakers and Paperworkers and International Brotherhood of Pulp Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers unions and management spokesmen Saturday announced a new wage agreement. The proposal is a 2 1/2 per cent general wage increase for men and a 5-cent an hour boost for women.

The proposal involves 20,000 employees of 44 Pacific Coast pulp and paper mills. The increase would be retroactive to June 1, 1958, if approved by a referendum vote of the union locals.
