Khrushchev Sees East Triumphant

London—UPI—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev warned Monday that Soviet economists "with pencils in their hands" are estimating when Communism will make an economic triumph over the capitalist West.

Khrushchev, in a Leningrad speech broadcast by Moscow radio, said "it is becoming increasingly clear that the rule of capitalism is coming to an end." He said the time is approaching when the Communist countries will say "make way, we are advancing to the first place, and you go to the end of the queue, behind us."

"Our economists, with pencils in their hands, are already estimating when this will be. Our estimates are very accurate and rarely deceive us."

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Boy, 13, Confesses Slaying Playmate

Chicago—A 13-year-old boy broke down during a lie detector test Monday night and confessed slaying a 12-year-old playmate to rob him of \$6, authorities said.

Sheriff Roy Doerfler of nearby Joliet county said Raleigh Robinette of Joliet, Ill., calmly dictated a statement in the Halloween slaying of David Benson, 12, after three hours of questioning.

David, a Boy Scout, disappeared last Friday night after visiting the Robinette boy at the latter's home. Fellow scouts found David's body Saturday morning on a side of a woodland ravine near his home.

State's Attorney Frank J. Masters of Joliet indicated the Robinette youth would undergo psychiatric tests and no charges would be filed immediately against him.

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Alaska Could Turn Control of Congress

Washington—UPI—The American people conceivably—but not likely—might have to wait three weeks after the voting Nov. 4 to learn which party will control the next Congress.

In cases of an extremely close election, the new state of Alaska could determine the outcome in its first election Nov. 25, when two senators and one House member will be chosen.

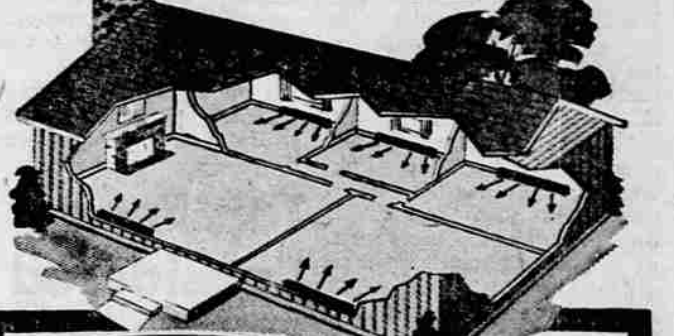
Actor Donald O'Connor Has Routine Checkup
