Jacksonville Branch Library May Withdraw From County

The Jacksonville branch library may withdraw from the county system, Mrs. Ilene Applebaker of the Jacksonville library committee told the county court yesterday afternoon.

Jacksonville library committee members and the branch librarian, Mrs. Helen Roberts, have been "insulted" a number of times by Head Librarian Miss Helen Webster, Mrs. Applebaker said. Members of the Jacksonville library board have consulted with Jacksonville Mayor F. Keaveny and Councilman Everett Ravnor and were told unless conditions improve the city council may agree to start proceedings for withdrawal of the library.

Mrs. Ruth Griffin, another member of the Jacksonville library committee, pointed out, however, that service "is wonderful" from the head library in Medford.

Another Meeting Planned

County Judge Rodney Keating said since neither Miss Webster nor any of the Jacksonville library board members were present at yesterday's meeting another would be held in the near future.

(Miss Webster said she had not received notice until just before the meeting, then had too many library matters to take care of. Mrs. Leland Menzies, Jacksonville county board chairman, was reached by telephone during the meeting, but was unable to attend.)

Jacksonville library committee members, Clinton A. Smith, Mrs. Applebaker and Ruth Griffin, with Councilman Ravnor, met with the county court to discuss why the branch librarian's salary was "cut" \$5 a month in September. No clear explanation was given by Miss Webster, either in telephone conversations or in a letter sent to all branch librarians in September, the board members said.

City's Share

Miss Webster told the Mail Tribune yesterday afternoon that the \$5 cut came after the Jacksonville city council increased the city's share of the librarian's salary by \$5. The county library pays the difference in salary between what the city pays and the total salary which is equivalent to a dollar an hour, Miss Webster explained.

The Jacksonville librarian worked 49 hours in September and 50 hours in October, Mrs. Applebaker told the county court. The city council previously had paid \$20 a month toward her salary and

this year raised it to \$25, Councilman Ravnor said.

Mrs. Applebaker quoted from the Sept. 18 letter Miss Webster sent to all branches: "You will have a chance to increase your salary in two years; the growth of your community and the use of your library, and your own efficiency. The latter includes a cooperative attitude, desire to serve, good housekeeping which includes attractive arrangements, prompt response to requests for books, care in keeping records and in trying to recover overdue books, interest in learning about the work, and attending training meetings."

Library Criticized

The Jacksonville library has been criticized for poor housekeeping and lack of cooperation, Mrs. Griffin said. Mrs. Applebaker quoted from the letter, which stated, "as soon as we get dependable cooperation in returning books from branch service upon request, we're going to be able to share our NeNaughton Rental Service with you all."

Committee members said the books are returned promptly and the branch library still does not get the service.

Books are too often lost, Miss Webster said, and many of them come back to the system headquarters late.

A portion of the Sept. 18 letter made county court members angry when read by County Judge Rodney Keating. This stated, "Our support was cut considerably this year by the county court,

principally because of the unpleasant, complaining agitation of some communities. The result is fewer books for you, fewer books for all of us, to be purchased this year. I suppose these few individuals sincerely believed gains could be achieved in this way but they were mistaken."

Support Funds

Library support funds have been increased every year since 1954, county court members said. Since the county apportions money for library support, the county court should have some jurisdiction over the Jacksonville county library system, but does not, they declared.

"We have sincerely tried to cooperate by following the different memorandums issued," Mrs. Griffin said. "However, it is a little difficult often for a small library to always conform. I'm sure this problem can be solved in a cooperative manner because it makes us sad to think of withdrawing."

The trouble has all come in the last four years and has meant "a continual hassle," Councilman Ravnor said. The salary cut came after Miss Webster called the mayor and suggested the county library system pay the entire salary of the librarian. The mayor took it up with the council and notified the librarian the city wanted to retain its present interest in the library, and the present arrangement.

Miss Webster said her job includes the selection, training, and discipline of personnel.

Oregon Democrats Eye Senate Control

Salem—UPI—Oregon Democrats were confident they can win control of the state Senate in today's election, but Republicans were also expressing confidence over State House of Representatives races.

Two years ago, Democrats gained control of the House for the first time in 20 years, while the Senate was split 15-15 between Republicans and Democrats.

If the Democrats gain Senate control, it will be for the first time since 1878.

In the Senate the picture shapes up this way: Democrats have 12 holdover members plus Sen. Dan Thiel, Astoria, who has no opposition. Must Win Three

That means they only had to win three contests to gain control. Half of the 30-member Senate is elected every two years.

Republicans have three holdovers plus two unopposed senators—Francis W. Ziegler, Corvallis, and Carl H. Francis, Dayton.

Thus the Democrats went into today's election with 13 seats under their belt and the Republicans with only five. Of the 12 remaining races, four are in Multnomah and Clackamas counties which have Democratic registration leads.

In the House, all 60 members are elected every two years. Last time, Democrats controlled the House 37-23 until Rep. Joe Rogers, Independence, changed his registration from Democrat to Republican, reducing the margin by one.

Fourteen Republicans and 26 Democrats are running again in the House and there are only two men unopposed—Reps. Clinton P. Haight, Baker Democrat, and Fayette I. Bristol, Grants Pass Republican.

Four House members of the last session decided to try for the Senate. They were Democrats Richard Groener, Milwaukie, and William Grenfell Jr., Portland, and Republicans Edwin Cone, Eugene, and Eddie Ahrens, Turner.

Elmer Deetz, Canby dairyman and a former Republican House member, ran for the Senate as an Independent. Three candidates ran for

House seats on the Independent ticket.

Some To Be Missing

Some old faces will be missing from the 1959 Senate. Declining to run this time were Sens. Howard Belton, Canby Republican and Dean of the Senate with 11 sessions; Phil Brady, Portland Democrat; Truman Chase, Eugene Republican; Rudie Wilhelm, Portland Republican; Warren Gill, Lebanon Republican and candidate for governor in the primary elections; and Lee Ohmart, Salem Republican.

Washington—UPI—Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson, suffering from laryngitis, was ordered by his physician to cancel two speaking engagements scheduled for Thursday.

Benson, who has been campaigning hard for GOP candidates in today's congressional elections, has been under treatment since Saturday.

He returned to his office this morning after an overnight trip from Salt Lake City and called off the two speeches. He had been scheduled to speak Thursday morning before the 35th annual stockholders meeting of Southern States Cooperative, Inc., in Richmond, Va., and Thursday night to the National Water Well Exposition and Convention here.

Base officials would not comment on the radiation check. However, newsmen Bill Shannon said base authorities stopped him and then checked him with a geiger counter before permitting him to go on.

Salem Hunter's Death Investigated

Salem—UPI—State police and the Polk county sheriff today were investigating the possibility that Ammon S. Grice, president of the Oregon Farmers union, was not killed with his own gun in a hunting accident as first believed.

Grice, a West Salem farmer, was wounded when a shot struck him while he was hunting near his home Oct. 21.

He died several days later at a Salem hospital. State Police Sgt. James Darby said that investigations started after examination of evidence at the scene of the shooting indicated that Grice might have been hit by a bullet from another weapon.
