Area Puts Two Democrats Five Republicans in Jobs

Jackson county voters put two Democrats and five Republicans into office in yesterday's general election.

It also voted, as did the state at large, in the races for governor and labor commissioner, and as did the fourth district as a whole for congressman.

Biggest "upset" in the local races was the defeat of Mrs. Bereth P. Hopkins, Republican, seeking reelection as county clerk. She was defeated by Marvin Madden, Democrat, in his first bid for public office. The count (103 complete precincts out of 105 in the county, and not including about 800 absentee voters) showed 12,614 for Madden, 10,086 for Mrs. Hopkins.

representatives, was easily re-elected. The other representative from this county will be Mrs. Eve Nye, Republican and former Medford school board member, and Mrs. Marjane Duncan, a Democrat and wife of Representative Duncan, trailed. Here is the vote: Bob Duncan, 13,038; Mrs. Nye, 11,493; Lattie, 9,755; Mrs. Duncan, 9,549.

Carlos Morris, Republican coroner unopposed for reelection, received 19,212 votes. For governor, Jackson county voters gave Mark Hatfield, the Republican secretary of state, 13,971, and Gov. Robert Holmes 9,098.

More than 24,500 Jackson county voters cast ballots in yesterday's general election—approximately 69.2 percent of the 35,518 registered to vote.

In the race for congress from the fourth district, Jackson county voters gave Democrat Charles O. Porter, Eugene, a slim lead over Republican Paul Geddes, Roseburg. The count: Porter, 11,633, Geddes, 11,276.

The vote here for labor commissioner was, Democratic incumbent Norman Nilsen, 11,662, Republican challenger Lyle McCauley, 10,322.

Officers Elected in Cities in Jackson

Voters in nine Jackson county cities outside Medford elected city officials and voted on city measures in the general election yesterday.

Freeman Mason was elected mayor of Central Point with 379 votes to win over M. C. Gleason, who received 137 votes in a write-in campaign.

Hatfield's Victory Greatest in Career

Portland —(UPI)—Oregon voters Tuesday gave Secretary of State Mark Hatfield the greatest victory of his political career, rewarding his bipartisan campaign for governor with a resounding plural victory over Gov. Robert Holmes.

Republican Hatfield polled a heavy vote in virtually every precinct in the state and found staunch voter support even in Democratic strongholds. Earliest returns showed him well ahead of Holmes who served a two-year term as the first Democratic governor in Oregon in 20 years.

Democrats Hold House But By Slimmer Margin

Portland —(UPI)—Oregon Democrats will control the house of representatives in the 1959 legislature, but by a slimmer margin than last time.

Nearly complete results indicated 33 Democrats and 27 Republicans will make up the house at the legislature which convenes in January.

Opposition Tide Greatest Since Cleveland Era

Number of GOP Governors Engulfed

Washington —(UPI)—Democrats surged to their greatest congressional triumph today since the Roosevelt New Deal.

President Eisenhower, who had pleaded in vain for a GOP victory, was confronted for his last two years in office with a House and Senate under more complete opposition domination than any ever before faced by a chief executive in this century.

As of midmorning the indicated margins of Democratic control in the 86th Congress were 28 Senate and 130 House seats, compared to the present margins of 2 Senate and 37 House.

Started Two Months Ago

The Democratic tide, which started rolling in Maine two months ago, swept across such Republican strongholds as Vermont, Ohio, South Dakota, Nebraska and Wisconsin.

Robinson Wins Council Post

On the basis of complete returns from all precincts in Medford's fourth ward, Councilman Fred Robinson apparently won his bid for reelection in yesterday's general election.

Robinson received 1,105 votes, and the next-highest contender, Roy Wilkes, 1,025—a margin of 81 votes in unofficial returns. It appeared unlikely that absentee votes could upset this result. The third man in the race, William Doernbach, received 436 votes.

In Ward 1, Stanley Stark was the victor over George Stacy, 739 to 565.

Don Hansen, unopposed in Ward II, received 2,007 votes, and Robert Bacaus, unopposed in Ward III, received 1,062.

Mayor John Snider, unopposed for reelection received 7,023 complimentary votes.

Tickets Go On Sale For Fireman's Ball

Tickets will go on sale Thursday morning for the annual Medford firemen's ball.

The dance is scheduled for the evening of Wednesday, Nov. 26, at the Medford Armory. Baldy Evans' band will play.

Off duty firemen will call at Medford establishments tomorrow with the tickets.

Proceeds from the dance will go toward the Christmas toy project. Firemen are repairing and painting broken and discarded toys for distribution to needy children. State Legislature To Be Dominated By Democrats

Three Representatives Defeat Challengers

Portland —(UPI)—Oregon's election Tuesday gave the state a Republican governor, a Democratic legislature and a congressional delegation with a single Republican survivor.

Gov. Robert D. Holmes Wednesday conceded defeat at the hands of Republican Mark Hatfield who will be inaugurated in January as the youngest governor in Oregon history at age 36.

Breasting the Democratic tide along with Hatfield was Congressman Walter Norblad of the first district who won his eighth term in Congress over Democratic Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton.

The other three Democratic representatives won votes of confidence at the expense of GOP challengers. Rep. Edith Green of the third district once again was returned to Washington with a whopping majority.

Public power man Al Ullman was reelected in the second district over wheat rancher Marion Weatherford.

Republican Paul Geddes of Roseburg failed in his attempt to unseat Rep. Charles Porter in the fourth district.

In the other race for a major state office, Labor Commissioner Norman Nilsen won handily over Republican Lyle McCauley after a quiet campaign.

Oregon voters spoke out strongly against abolition of capital punishment for first degree murderers and refused to sanction the invasion of the state into the power generation field. School teachers were encouraged to run for seats in the state Legislature without having to resign in the interim to teach school.

A move to make more state money available for veteran farm and home loans was rejected. State legislators lost their bid for a salary increase.

Hatfield will take office at an age one year younger than Oswald West was when he became governor in 1910. He won election in the face of opposition from organized labor and its powerful COPE. The state's two Democratic senators actively urged his defeat and one, Sen. Wayne Morse, challenged his personal integrity in the final days of the campaign.

For the first time in 80 years voters sent to the state Senate a solid Democratic majority, ending the 15-15 control the parties shared in the 1957 legislature. Nearly complete returns indicated the balance of power would be 18-12 in the Democrats' favor next year. Tabulations of the House races trailed the major contests but the Democrats seemed assured of holding and expanding their control of the chamber, in view of the Democratic onslaught.

BLM Schedules Meeting Tomorrow

Medford bureau of land management district officials have scheduled a meeting on Thursday, Nov. 6, at the Jackson county courthouse auditorium to hear suggestions toward improving the district's 1959 field operations program. The meeting, open to all interested persons, will be held at 1 p.m.

Plans for development of resources in the area will be discussed by BLM officials. Representatives of the forest service are also expected to attend.

This is the second meeting scheduled to give persons an opportunity to make suggestions toward improving BLM field operations.

Red China Renews Attack on Quemoy

Taipei —(UPI)—Chinese Communist artillery shattered a 27-hour lull in the Quemoy Islands today with another heavy bombardment. Nationalist guns roared back.

The artillery duel began a few hours after the Communists accused the Nationalists of using poison gas shells in Monday's firing. The Nationalists denied the charges but prepared for Red "reprisals."

Moscow Radio echoed the Peiping charges early today and said the United States and Nationalist China were guilty of "barbarism" and violation of international law.

Statesmen Meet With Pope John

Vatican City —(UPI)—Pope John XXIII held a mass audience today for the statesmen and officials who came from all parts of the world to witness his coronation. It marked the start of a pontificate devoted chiefly to religious affairs.

The audience provided the first opportunity for the official delegations to meet and talk with the new Pope. The delegates came from Europe, North and South America, Asia, Australia, the Middle East and Africa.

The Pope indicated in a sermon before the coronation "pastoral" that he would be a "pastor" rather than a political figure and that the pontificate did not call for a "statesman, diplomat, scholar, and organizer of collective life."

Newport, Ore. —(UPI)—Circuit Judge Richard Anderson of the 21st judicial district won reelection Tuesday.

Three Candidates Seek Election to EP Irrigation District Board of Directors

Eagle Point—Eagle Point irrigation district has declared all of its board of director candidates eligible for election, a district official said today.

Eagle Point irrigation district will be the only district holding an election next Tuesday, Nov. 11. In all other irrigation districts only the incumbent has filed for election.

Under Oregon law when the incumbent is the only candidate the district board may declare him elected and no election need be held.

Those up for election in the Eagle Point irrigation district are Dobe Greb, incumbent, James Dunn and Mrs. Ann Todd. Election will be held in the Reese Gospel church from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Nov. 11, Eagle Point irrigation district officials announced.

Incumbents who have been or will be declared elected by directors of their respective irrigation districts are David Holmes for Talent, C. Norman Gail for Gold Hill, J. G. Cameron for the Medford irrigation district and Gordon Kershaw for Rogue River Valley.
