## County Voting on Measures Listed

Here is how Jackson county voted on the state measures on yesterday's general election, 103 out of 105 precincts reporting, but not including about 800 absentee ballots:

No. 1, state boundaries, yes 15,706, no 3,926; No. 2, veterans loans, yes 10,153, no 10,663; No. 3, legislative salaries, yes 10,174, no 11,113; No. 4, capital punishment, yes 9,755, no 11,258; No. 5, urban redevelopment, yes 9,802, no 8,719; No. 6, county debt, yes 10,860, no 7,617; No. 7, grand juries, yes 14,702, no 4,029; No. 8, state institutions, yes 11,395, no 6,999; No. 9, judges assignments, yes 14,281, no 4,816; No. 10, power development, yes 8,578, no 11,136; No. 11, county home rule, yes 12,720, no 5,505; No. 12, TV hospitals, yes 10,604, no 9,018; No. 13, teachers in legislature, yes 11,877, no 8,045.

In uncontested state races Jackson county voted this way (same returns as above): Supreme court: O'Connell, 16,887; Sloan, 16,637; Rossman, 16,045; circuit court, Main, 17,024; Kelly, 16,769; district judge, Bashaw, 16,453; superintendent of public instruction, Putnam, 17,018.

## Nixon Warns Republicans To Begin Working

Washington —UPI— Vice President Richard M. Nixon grimly warned fellow Republicans today they must get to work—right now—if they want to win in 1960.

He made it clear in a post-election statement that he himself intends to waste no time getting down to business in preparation for the 1960 election. That is the year Nixon hopes to win the presidency.

Nixon emerged from the GOP wreckage of Tuesday's election as still the top political figure of the Eisenhower administration. But the results brought him—as well as the GOP—new problems.

**Threat To Nixon**  
Nelson A. Rockefeller, New York's Republican governor-elect, emerged as a possible threat to Nixon's apparent long lead for the 1960 GOP presidential nomination. And the once-powerful California Republican organization, the bedrock of Nixon's national operations, was a shambles in the wake of a statewide Democratic sweep.

The vice president said "the great lesson of this election for both Democrats and Republicans is that in these days campaigning is a year-round business."

In so many words, he said the GOP lost because it started too late.

"Republicans worked for two years. The result was inevitable."

He said, however, that "we shall not make this mistake again. We shall begin working tomorrow for the victory which will be ours in Nov. 1960."

New York —UPI— New York City voters approved legalized bingo for charity Tuesday by a vote of more than two to one.

The game has been played here for years with little legal interference.

After Jan. 1 it will be played under the supervision of the City Department of Licenses under rules of the state Lottery control commission.

The rules specify how many games may be played, the maximum prizes allowable and restrict the game to charity.

J. Ed Putman, with 180 votes, was elected mayor of Eagle Point, city officials there reported today.

Candidates vying for the three city council positions in Eagle Point were Ernest E. Gregg, 154; F. L. (Lenn) Hickman, 127; John N. Fortin, 116; David H. Kahl, incumbent, 91; John Grow, 85; and J. E. (Jake) Olsen, incumbent, 70.

### Butte Falls Election

Six Butte Falls city council positions were filled in yesterday's election with O. R. Abbott successful write-in candidate. There were five candidates running for the six positions. Others elected were Bruce Pingle, Robert Driskell, Billie Rodgers, Burrell Facey, and Donald L. Smith.

Unopposed in the other city office position up for election were Elga Abbott, mayor; Mrs. Kizzie Edmondson, recorder, and E. W. Smith, treasurer.

**Jacksonville Election**  
Jacksonville voters elected E. L. Graham, mayor with 302 votes over John O. Morgan, 75.

Seeking the three positions on the city council were Arthur Davies, 299; Francis Guidry, 240; Everett Ravnor, 226; John Caird, 190; and H. R. Parrott, 140.

**Rogue River Election**  
Rogue River citizens voted in favor of the city charter amendment which would combine the offices of city re-

order and treasurer into one office; Yes, 163 and No, 37.

In the mayoralty race B. H. (John) Leyen defeated Robert J. DeArmond 137 to 74. Incumbent city recorder Mrs. Orva Jean Cruise received 201 votes. Present city treasurer Mrs. Lois O. Morgan did not run.

Those winning four-year terms on the city council in Rogue River were Fred J. Dengler, 145; Albert E. Freiden, 135; and Victor E. Banforth, 155. Richard S. Niquette, incumbent won the two-year council term with 119 votes. Other city council candidates, Claude B. Willoughby received 111 votes and Leslie J. Weigart 107 votes.

### Gold Hill Election

Gold Hill candidate for mayor Milton Steinmetz received 164 votes. He was unopposed. Incumbent city recorder-treasurer Ferd Jones received 183 votes.

Those receiving the three positions on the Gold Hill city council were Kendall Dufur, 129; Fred Lester, 148; and Delos Walker, 109. Other city council candidates, Fred Lewis received 105 and Olav Loggen 102.

**Phoenix Election**  
Phoenix candidate for mayor Arthur Mackintosh was unopposed and received 210 votes. For the three positions on the city council Faye Carver, incumbent, received 202 votes, Mrs. Mona Ferns 191, E. P. Foxworthy, 165, and A. C. Reese, 162.

## Extension Specialist Says Figures on Food Sometimes Deceiving

Lincoln, Neb.—UPI—You may not be spending as much to feed your family as you think. Clara Leopold, extension home management specialist at the University of Nebraska, said this is because not all items on grocery shelves are food.

A recent survey of more than 1,000 retail grocery stores showed that notions and drugs are carried almost as commonly in grocery stores as are food products.

To get an accurate figure on what it costs your family to eat, the specialist suggested subtracting from the checker's tape all notions, drugs, cooking utensils, clothing, cosmetics and magazines.

### Marinade for Game

Combine 1 quart water, 1 1/2 cups vinegar, 1 large onion cut in slices, 1 carrot, sliced, 1 clove garlic, 1 teaspoon thyme, 2 bay leaves, 12 peppercorns, 1 tablespoon salt and 8 sprigs of parsley in a saucepan. Bring to a fast boil over a high flame. Turn flame to simmer and cook slowly for 1 hour. Cool and strain the marinade over the game. Venison, elk or moose roasts should marinate overnight.

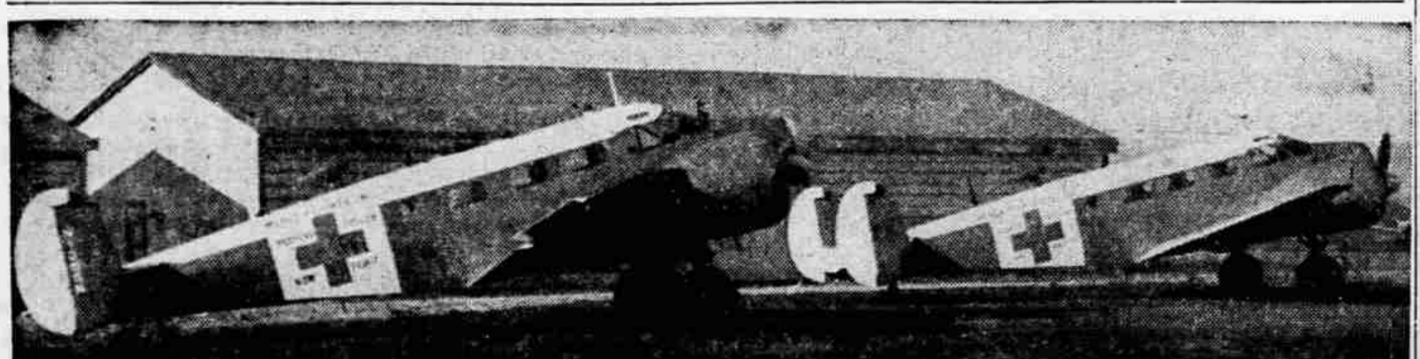
