

UPI Honors Wildcats' Parseghian

Evanston, Ill. —UPI— They sang a blue song called "Lose 'em All" at Northwestern last year, so coach Ara Parseghian came up with a brand new team this year and has everyone in the Midwest singing his praises after five victories in six starts.

On the heels of his most impressive triumph, a 21-0 rout of Ohio State, United Press International joins the chorus today by naming the handsome dark-haired Ohioan college football's "Coach of the Week."

Woody Hayes, the disappointed Ohio State tutor, goes a step further with the announcement that Parseghian "gets my vote as coach of the year," a sentiment quickly endorsed by Phil Dickens of Indiana and certain to pick up added support.

One Senior
Six weeks ago such a development could hardly have been foreseen. Here was a Wildcat squad trying to come back from a 1957 campaign in which it lost all nine starts including three shutouts. On hand was one senior, tackle Andy Cverko, plus a handful of juniors. The rest were sophomores.

Parseghian, pointing out that he had "only two classes to work with," predicted that Northwestern wouldn't be "on an equal basis with other squads until a year from now when we'll have three classes." Then he set to work building a psychological fire under those sophomores.

Result — Northwestern's only loss in six games was a close one to Iowa, which could be headed for the Big Ten championship.

Tornado To Tussle Best Grants Pass Team in 11 Seasons

Grants Pass High School's best football aggregation in 11 seasons, a Caveman crew at its physical best of the year and a squad fired up by tremendous community spirit. That's what the Medford High school Black Tornado will be up against when it goes to Grants Pass on Friday night for the Southern Oregon conference championship encounter.

The best in 11 years rating is Caveman Coach Mel Ingram's admission. And, it's saying a lot. For during the period Grants Pass has fielded two state championship clubs, in 1948 and in 1951 and has fielded other strong contenders.

Grants Pass has a tough mobile line and an offense featured this fall by the running of Jack Dean, Marvin Terry, Oscar Nealey and Hugh Brown and the passing of Dick Hayes in compiling a record of four victories, two ties and only one loss. The line includes such veterans as Jerry Putnam, Wendell Winterbottom, Reed Daugherty, Ollie Wootsey and Ron Hoatson.

Beaten by injuries to some top players along through the campaign, the Grants Pass squad will be virtually intact for the District 6 A-1 title scramble. Only Marv Terry, a first line halfback, is a question because of a knee muscle ailment.

GP Doing Most
In the department of generating community spirit and show of support to bolster team morale, Grants Pass people are far outdoing the residents of Medford. The Climate city is plastered with signs such as "Beat Mudford" aiming to stir up community enthusiasm and the playing efforts of its team.

This spirit was evident at an open house in the schools on Monday night and will be

furthered by the annual Mother and Son football banquet this evening. Grants Pass gridders are dedicating the Medford game to their mothers. It is being stressed that the conflict will represent Ingram's quest for his 80th victory as Grants Pass mentor. Grants Pass merchants are furnishing food and other essentials and trimmings for the dinner.

No such blazing display of enthusiasm in the game is evident in Medford. Grants Pass apparently has replaced the Pear capital as southern Oregon city where residents go all out to support their teams. But, there is that possibility that Black Tornado fan and player alike, now view the titular tiff with sober seriousness with the fervor for the battle, the vitality and high spirit keyed to spring lose when it counts the most—on Friday night. Right now, however, GP seems to be outdoing Medford in its anticipation of the game.

Depth To Help
While the Cavemen loom at their best of the fall physically, the Tornado appears its hardest hit of the season. Medford, nevertheless, can be thankful for its depth in talent to help fill the gap for injury and sickness woes.

The Black Tornado, according to Coach Fred Spiegelberg, is not counting on halfback Dick Ragsdale because of the knee injury he suffered in the Ashland game. Halfback Gerry Lyons, victim of a calf injury at Ashland and then of flu, was hobbling at drill last night and was sent in early. Quarterback and Linebacker Jim Clark home in bed sick yesterday.

Tackle Gordon Pathman is nursing a bruised knee. Tackle Lynn Knight has his finger still in a splint because of a dislocation but is able to perform his punting chores. Spiegelberg this week has Ken Durkee, Cal Dean and Don Peek working to bolster the left half offensive position. Durkee, who did well in replacing Lyons and Ragsdale at Ashland, Dean and Peek have been defensive regulars this fall. John Harvey has been drilling at a defensive halfback.

Basically To Platoon
At quarterback the Tornado still has Bob Pond and Ray Konopasek, who have seen most of the duty in recent contests. Fred Funston, regular linebacker has been working at the post and Bill Charley and Skip Bennett have drilling at linebacker duties.

Spiegelberg has indicated that the Tornado plans to platoon basically but that there may be a number of performers seeing duty both ways. Reserved seats up for sale for the titanic brush were gone in a hurry on Monday morning. Grants Pass school officials are rounding up all available bleachers to provide a maximum of seats for the huge crowd expected.

Geneva Nuclear Talks Appear To Be Deadlocked
Geneva—UPI—The Soviet Union appeared hopelessly deadlocked today with the United States and Britain on a nuclear test ban. Diplomatic sources here saw no sign of a backdown on either side.

But because the United Nations shifted responsibility for some sort of agreement to the East-West conference here, Western officials expressed optimism that both sides would give way sufficiently to prevent a permanent rupture.

In New York the United Nations Political Committee ended its discussion on nuclear test bans and disarmament and left it up to the Geneva conference to work out some agreement.

Both sides were standing pat on their positions when the conference went into its fourth session today. These were:

The Russians want an immediate unconditional and permanent ban on nuclear testing and have handed the West a draft treaty to sign on the dotted line. They also insist on discussing this before talking about a control system to police it.

The West refuses to tie itself down with an unconditional ban until a control system has been set up and is working and until there is progress toward a general nuclear disarmament plan. For this reason the West insists on discussing a control system first.

Dallas Voters OK 3 City Measures

Dallas, Ore. —UPI— Two of three city measures here were defeated and the other passed by a decisive margin.

Voters accepted a proposal to issue \$290,000 in bonds to build a water storage dam across Rickreall Creek. The vote was 1469 to 343.

Defeated was the proposal to amend the city charter and establish a new city tax base increase from \$67,353.40 to \$95,000. The vote was 1159 to 525.

Also defeated by a 1024 to 597 margin was the proposal to issue bonds in the amount of \$125,000 for building a public swimming pool.
