New York—(UPI)—Wall Street, ordinarily considered a Republican stronghold, today bid up stock prices to a new record high following a sweeping Democratic victory.

The idea set forth by the financial district was that with Democrats in power federal spending would rise and new inflation pressures would develop.

Rails scored the widest percentage gain among the leading sections. They reached a new high for more than a year. Utilities were at their best in 28 years. Industrials reached an all-time high.
