Iraqi Envoy To West Germany Held

Baghdad, Iraq—UPI—Abdul Salem Arif, Iraqi ambassador to West Germany, has been arrested here and will be tried on charges of conspiracy against the security of the fatherland, it was announced today.
Arif had been linked with Premier Karim Kassam as a hero of the July 14 coup that overthrew King Faisal. He later broke with Kassam over relations with the West. Arif was considered extremely pro-Egyptian.
Kassam, as commander in chief of the Iraqi armed forces, said Arif, a retired staff colonel, had arrived in Baghdad from Bonn without permission and was arrested because of repeated attempts to disturb public security.

Disarmament Responsibility Shifted by UN

United Nations, N.Y.—UPI—The United Nations shifted responsibility for disarmament to the Big Three atomic talks in Geneva today and plunged into debate on reunification of Korea.
The General Assembly's Main Political Committee met this morning to discuss ways of reuniting North and South Korea under one flag. Russia attempted Tuesday to have a North Korean delegate sit in on the debate, but the United States opposed it.
The disarmament debate ended Tuesday night when a plenary session of the General Assembly passed by a 49-9 vote with 22 abstentions a 17-power western resolution calling for early agreement at the Geneva atomic talks. It also urged the U.S., Russia and Britain to refrain from testing nuclear weapons while negotiations are going on.
The resolution had the effect of moral pressure on the nations involved, but unlike Security Council resolutions, cannot be enforced. Thus, it left the problem up to the Big Three nuclear powers to work out in restricted negotiations.
Resolution Killed
The Assembly also passed three other disarmament resolutions, but killed by a 27-21 vote with 13 abstentions an Afro-Asian resolution calling for immediate discontinuance of nuclear weapons tests until there is agreement on controlled suspension in Geneva.
The Assembly approved:
—By a vote of 76-0 with 2 abstentions a resolution to revive over-all disarmament negotiations by creating an 81-nation committee for one year only.
—By a vote of 55-9 with 12 abstentions a resolution encouraging the nuclear powers to reach agreement in the current Geneva conference on nuclear tests.

Some Changes

The President acknowledged there had been some changes in the relationship between Chiang Kai-Shek's Nationalist China and United States. He recalled that Chiang, in the Oct. 28 communique issued jointly with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, pledged to use peaceful methods as the "primary means" of trying to regain the Chinese mainland.
Eisenhower said that such factors as were evidenced in this section of the communique were subject to constant change.
Asked whether the U. S. was moving toward a policy of recognizing "two Chinas," he replied that the American position is not going to change as long as the Communists continue to do things we cannot stomach such as holding the American prisoners.

Ike Says U.S. Not To Change Red China Stand

Washington—UPI—President Eisenhower said today the United States will not change its attitude toward Red China as long as it does things which, as he put it, the American government and people cannot stomach.
He told a news conference that one of these things was the continued holding in Chinese prisons of several Americans whom the Peiping government had promised to release.

Multnomah Voters Favor Democrats

Portland—UPI—Multnomah county voters gave Democrats good-sized margins in races for county sheriff and district attorney Tuesday.
Incumbent Francis Lambert led Republican Kelly Deaderick by a margin of 117,563 to 57,099 for county sheriff with complete totals from 800 out of 857 precincts.
Charles E. Raymond was ahead of Republican Donald Walker, 91,988 to 76,926, in the race for district attorney with 800 precincts reported.
Marvin (Buck) Grayson, a brother of former all-American football player Bobby Grayson, apparently had won election to the Portland city council. He had a lead of 77,509 to 54,679 over ex-commissioner Jake Bennett.

Smylie Only GOP Winner in Idaho
Boise, Ida.—UPI—A Democratic landslide today swept out of office all but the head of Idaho's Republican state administration—Gov. Robert E. Smylie.
The Democrats even gained control of the legislature.
And with only 72 scattered small vote precincts still missing, it appeared that the controversial right to work initiative measure also went down to defeat.
Reelected for a second term, Gov. Smylie was the only survivor of the most staggering defeat suffered by a Republican state administration in more than a decade. And it was a narrow escape for Smylie himself, who managed to win over his Democratic foe, State Sen. A. M.
