Stream Conditions To Be Controlled in OSC Research Job

Corvallis—A quarter-mile stretch of a small stream in which water flow, fish life and other stream conditions will be rigidly controlled is being readied by a team of Oregon State college scientists for a new, long-range research on unknown phases of stream life and management.

The unique outdoor laboratory will make it possible to study the relationships and interactions of water quality, fish production, plant growth including troublesome slime, insect production, stream bed changes, and effects of different types of organic wastes.

Don Sutton, president of the SOEA, performed a similar function for the panel on "Teaching: A Potentially Secure Vocation." He is a sophomore at SOC in teacher education in the field of science-mathematics.

First Studies
It is one of the first studies of its kind ever conducted and will provide important information on multiple stream use.

A special dam and diversion ditch will make it possible to keep the stream flow constant about a cubic foot per second throughout the year.

The Robert A. Taft sanitary engineering center of the U.S. Public Health Service provided \$9,250 to OSC for dam construction and other work needed to control stream flow.

The National Institutes of Health, Public Health Service, physiology unit of the sanitary engineering center, Public Health Service, which is located on the OSC campus also will cooperate in the studies with Peter Doudoroff, the biologist in charge of this unit.

Specialists in Field
OSC scientists cooperating on the study are all specialists in various phases of the research. Project workers include Charles E. Warren, fish and game department; Fred J. Burgess, engineering; John D. Lattin, entomology; and Harry K. Phinney, botany.

The fish toxicology and physiology unit of the sanitary engineering center, Public Health Service, which is located on the OSC campus also will cooperate in the studies with Peter Doudoroff, the biologist in charge of this unit.
