Big Government, Business Derided In Current Play

Both big government and big corporations are derided in the current Footlighter play at the Fairgrounds theater. "The Solid Gold Cadillac," which opened Tuesday night and continues nightly through Saturday, takes a dim view of some of the goings on in both government and business, and this is probably why the play has been such a success, both on the stage and in the movies.

Ruth Kilbourne plays the leading role of the "older actress" who ends up controlling a multi-million dollar enterprise because she keeps asking embarrassing questions. Miss Kilbourne is an intelligent, experienced amateur actress and she gives a smooth, believable performance.

The play calls for a large cast of men, and since there usually are more women than men in a community this size interested in amateur theatricals, Director Frank Buchter deserves a big hand for assembling this cast.

Big Business Man
Charles Tucker plays McKeever, the big business man who gives up his job as head of the corporation to go to Washington and spend his time appearing before endless committee sessions of "damn" senators. The four corporation officers who have their fingers in so many business pies they don't know whether they do or don't own a subsidiary firm, are played by Curtis Butterfield, Thayer Tarvin, Leslie Boardman and Alvin K. Reiss. The men are obviously enjoying the whole play, and the audience enjoys it, too.

Supporting roles for women are well done by Jerry Jerome, the colorless secretary who is transformed into an attractive woman, Charlene Tarvin, who either has dyed her hair red or else wears a wig for the part, with interesting results to her appearance; and Helen Ashley, who has to depend upon pantomime since she doesn't speak more than a line or two in her role of secretary to the government official.

Robbie Robbins, Marion Keim and Peggy Moore complete the cast.

Many Sure Changes
Footlighter fans who were dubious about the many scene changes can rest easy. The cast manages the whole thing rather smoothly, with between-time minutes covered with music and the narration of Bernard Roberts. Some of the best lines - and there are many - are given the narrator who is merely a voice from the loudspeaker.

"The Solid Gold Cadillac" is interesting and should be seen if for no other reason than one almost has to know so many have seen the stage or movie versions and it constantly crops up in conversations. Curtain time is 8:30 o'clock. - O.S.

Stocks Spurt Higher On Active Trading

New York - (UPI) - Stocks spurted to new record highs in active trading today. The upturn, the second following the Democratic sweep Tuesday, was the widest since Nov. 27, 1957, when the average soared on medical bulletins indicating President Eisenhower's illness not as bad as at first thought.

Gains ranging to more than five points lifted all sections of the market-industrials to a record top; rails to a new high for more than a year; utilities to a new 28-year high. Chemical issues were the sensations today. Gains in the group at the highs ranged to more than five points in Eastman Kodak and more than three points in DuPont. Allied Chemical ran up three and Air Reduction gained more than two points.

Washington - (UPI) - A top official of the new civilian space agency declared today that America has the capability "right now" to fire rockets to the planets Mars and Venus. He added that conditions will be favorable for reaching Venus in 1959 and Mars in 1960-61.

Dr. Newell D. Sanders, assistant director for advanced technology in the National Aeronautics and Space Agency, said the same Thor-Able rocket combination being used in shoots at the moon could send instrumented robots to the nearby planets.

Mrs. Bengtson Dies in St. Louis After Illness

Mrs. Anna G. Bengtson, 16 Newtown st., Medford, died Tuesday in St. Louis, Mo., eight days prior to her 85th birthday. She was born Anna G. Anderson, Nov. 12, 1873, in Urova, Sweden.

In 1892 she came to the United States, first living in Jenoco, Ill., then Butte, Mont., where she operated a dress shop. While there she met O. Daniel Bengtson who she married in Telluride, Colo., Oct. 20, 1898.

Mrs. Bengtson was the first woman to live above the timberline, 12,000 feet elevation, in southern Colorado. In 1899 she became a naturalized citizen.

Following Mr. Bengtson's retirement as a mining engineer the family moved to Denver in 1923. Mrs. Bengtson died in 1927 and Mrs. Bengtson moved to Medford in 1935 where she lived until her recent illness. She went through Stenden, the equivalent of junior college in Sweden, and following her husband's death, attended Kellberg Institute of Physiotherapy in Chicago. She was a physiotherapist in Medford for the past 20 years. She returned to Sweden to visit her home in 1929, 1935 and in 1955.

Mrs. Bengtson was a member of the Medford Business and Professional Women's club, Moose auxiliary, and Reames chapter, Order of the Eastern Star. She is survived by one son, O. H. Bengtson, Medford; two daughters, Mrs. Linnea Frose, St. Louis, and Mrs. Edith Pearson, Blue Island, Ill.; one great-grandchild; three brothers, Oscar E. Anderson, Denver; John Anderson and Carl Anderson, Urova, Sweden and one sister, Mrs. Anton Johnson, Montrose, Colo.

Funeral services will be held Saturday, Nov. 8, at 2:30 p.m. at Huffman Mortuary, 601 Broadway, Denver, Colo. Interment will be in the family plot at the Fairmont cemetery, Denver.
