

Oregon Scores 12-0 Victory Over Stanford; Snaps Streak

Eugene, Ore.—UPI—Oregon's Webfoots finally found a scoring punch Saturday and defeated Stanford, 12-0, on soggy Hayward field before a slim turnout of 12,500 in a regionally televised Pacific Coast conference football game.

The victory snapped a three-game losing streak for defending co-champion Oregon, which had managed only one touchdown in its last three games.

After a rainy first half which saw neither team threaten seriously, Oregon put together scoring drives of 64 and 85 yards in the final 30 minutes. Quarterback Dave Grosz and Fullback Marlan Holland scored the touchdowns on one-yard plunges.

Stanford, which found its ground game stopped by the tough Oregon defense and the wet turf, took to the air when the rain stopped and gave Oregon a bad time. With Quarterback Bob Nickett completing 10 out of 13 passes, Stanford threatened seriously to score but costly fumbles spoiled its chances.

Stanford drove to the Oregon 10 late in the third period but a fourth-down pass from Nickett was dropped by Doug Dick on the two.

The Indians got another big chance in the final quarter after guard Bob Peterson recovered a fumble by Oregon's Willie West on the Webfoot 33. Nickett passed to Irv Nikolai on the 15 but he fumbled the ball and tackle Jim Linden recovered for Oregon.

That's when Oregon launched an 85-yard march to score the clinching touchdown. The running of Grosz and West and a 21-yard pass from Grosz to end Pete Welch led the drive.

Grosz led the march to the first Oregon touchdown, passing for 24 yards and running for 31 yards.

Stanford fumbled away another possible scoring chance early in the second half. Nickett passed twice to end Chris Buford to the Oregon 43 but Bill Face fumbled on the 36 and Len Read got the ball for Oregon.

Nickett got 87 yards from his 10 completed passes. West picked up 81 yards in 22 carries and Grosz 63 in 16 for Oregon.

Record Attendance Likely at Pro Tilts

The National Football League, the nation's fastest growing professional sport, figures to set a crowd record Sunday for second straight week by attracting nearly 350,000 fans to its six games.

The New York Giants, 2½ point underdogs, expect a record home attendance of about 70,000 for their Yankee stadium clash with the undefeated Baltimore Colts. The Browns, leading the Giants by one game in the Eastern division, also expect about 70,000 for their games with the Detroit Lions at Cleveland.

At Los Angeles, the Rams have erected temporary bleachers in the huge coliseum and are preparing to seat 105,000 for their game with the San Francisco Forty Niners. The same two clubs set an all-time NFL attendance mark of 102,368 when they met last season.

The Chicago Bears, who trail the Colts by two games in the Western race, expect their usual capacity throng of 48,500 for their Wrigley field game with the Green Bay Packers.

The Chicago Cardinals play the Redskins at Washington and the Eagles entertain the Pittsburgh Steelers at Philadelphia in the other games. Even if these two

games average only 25,000 fans the league appears virtually certain to top the six-game record of more than 295,000 paid it set last week.

New York (4-2) was a 10-point underdog last Sunday when it upset Cleveland (5-1) and tightened the Eastern race. If the Giants upset the Colts and the Lions (1-4-1) surprise the Browns, New York and Cleveland will be tied for the Eastern lead. If the Giants win and the Bears (4-2) defeat the Packers (1-4-1) Baltimore will be only one game in front of the Bears.

The Browns are favored by 9 points, the Bears by 14, the Rams by 7, the Redskins by 3 and the Eagles by 1½.

Baltimore, which has a Nov. 16 date with the Bears in Chicago, faces the Giants minus two of its top players. John Unitas, the quarterback who leads the league in touchdown passes with 12, and L. G. Dupre, veteran offensive halfback, were injured during Baltimore's 56-0 rout of the Packers last Sunday.

George Shaw will take over for Unitas while Jack Call and Lennie Lyles will alternate at Dupre's post. New York is in its best physical condition of the season although Frank Gifford, all-league left halfback, still is nursing a knee injury and may see little action.

Wolverine Stars Get \$100 Fines

Ann Arbor, Mich.—UPI—Two top University of Michigan athletes, fined \$100 each for selling illegal football betting cards, had their cases turned over to university authorities for further disciplinary action.

Tony Rio, Michigan's first string fullback who was suspended from the squad when athletic officials learned of his part in the gambling ring, and Jack Lewis, captain of the Wolverines' Big Ten basketball team, pleaded guilty Friday in an attempt to avoid publicity.

John Dobson, attorney for the pair, said "publicity has been out of proportion to the nature of the offense" and said the plea of guilty was entered to "eliminate further occasion for such publicity by avoiding a trial on these minor charges."

Same Fine

Durwood Collins, 21, Houston, Tex., also pleaded guilty Friday and was fined the same amount. David Martin, 21, Detroit, a student at Eastern Michigan College, Ypsilanti, Mich., entered a plea of guilty as he had indicated when arraigned last Friday.

Rio, Lewis, Collins and four other Michigan students will have their cases handled by the joint judiciary council, a student-faculty group which has jurisdiction to assess additional disciplinary action.

Iowa Clinches Bowl Bid; Sooners Seem Bowl Bound; Army Defeats Rice 14-7

Iowa clinched the Big Ten's Rose Bowl bid, Oklahoma moved another mighty stride toward locking up an Orange Bowl invitation and Army won its big intersectional battle with Rice Saturday in the key games of the nation's college football program.

Iowa, the nation's No. 1 team, walloped winless Minnesota, 28-6, and won the Big Ten championship when sixth-ranked Northwestern lost to seventh-ranked Wisconsin, 17-13, and ninth-ranked Ohio State tied eighth-ranked Purdue, 14-14. It was the second "Rose Bowl victory" in three years for Iowa which beat Oregon State, 35-19, on Jan. 1, 1957.

Oklahoma, No. 5, virtually clinched the Big Eight's Orange Bowl invitation with a 20-0 victory over Iowa State and Army, ranked No. 2, topped Rice, 14-7, on a 64-yard touchdown pass with 51 seconds remaining. Oklahoma can clinch the Orange Bowl bid by beating Missouri next Saturday. Missouri stayed in the running with a 33-9 romp over Colorado Saturday.

Bears Head For Bowl

California gained the inside track for the Rose Bowl berth opposite Iowa when it beat UCLA, 20-17, for its fourth win in five Pacific Coast conference games. Washington State raised its record to 5-2 with a 7-0 upset of Oregon State which now has a 4-2 slate.

Fourth-ranked Auburn whipped Mississippi State, 33-14, Pittsburgh shaded 10th-ranked Notre Dame, 29-26, 11th-ranked Mississippi crushed Houston, 56-7, 14th-ranked Air Force Academy nipped Denver, 10-7, 16th-ranked North Carolina routed Virginia, 42-0, and 19th-ranked Georgia Tech edged out 18th-ranked Clemson, 13-0, in other games involving highly-ranked powers.

Rutgers remained unbeaten and untied with an 18-0 victory over Lafayette. Louisiana State, ranked No. 2 and the country's only other unbeaten and untied major team, played Duke in a Saturday night game.

A crowd of 64,485 at Minneapolis saw halfback Willie Fleming dash 46 and 63 yards for touchdowns and quarterback Randy Duncan throw 11 and 10-yard scoring passes for Iowa. The Hawkeyes outgained Minnesota, 468 yards to 205, and permitted the Gophers to complete only four of 25 passes.

Oklahoma took the opening kickoff 69 yards in 14 plays for its first touchdown but needed two fumble recoveries to score its other touchdowns in the third period. Hard-hitting Iowa State almost equalled Oklahoma's yardage gain and forced the Sooners to lose the ball seven times on fumbles.

Army scored its sensational win over Rice when Joe Caldwell connected on a 64-yard

Golden Bears Beat UCLA 20-17; Line Up for Bowl

Berkeley, Calif.—UPI—California's Golden Bears took the inside track on the Rose Bowl race Saturday as quarterback Joe Kapp pulled them together in the final quarter for a 20-17 victory over UCLA.

The win, coupled with Oregon State's loss to Washington State, put Coach Pete Elliott's team in front in the Pacific Coast conference race with a 4-1 record.

Oregon State and Southern California each have 4-2 PCC records.

Saturday's battle turned into a late game brawl with halfback Jack Hart of Cal and guard Bob King of UCLA being ejected from the game. UCLA later was penalized 15 yards for unsportsmanlike conduct just before the game ended.

Cal, leading 14-3 in the third quarter, was being pushed around at will by the Bruins as the Uclans scored and were marching for the touchdown that would have put them in the lead.

Then Kapp came into the game and when California got the ball, took complete charge. He piloted the Bears on another touchdown drive passing and running at will against a team that had kept him bottled up all afternoon. The payoff on the big score was a 14 yard pass from Kapp to end Jerry Lungren.

Score in Fourth Quarter

That touchdown was necessary as UCLA came back to score again late in the final stanza.

For most of the first half, UCLA had led by three points—the result of a 13-yard field goal by Kirk Wilson. But just before the half ended, Cal marched 41 yards to score with Walt Arnold plowing over from the one. The big gainer was a 23-yard run by third string halfback Grover Garvin. Garvin, incidentally, had a great day with 96 yards gained from rushing in 10 plays.

That score gave Cal an 8-3 lead at the intermission.

The Bears upped it to 14-3 in the third quarter when they marched 36 yards on eight plays, with Hart plunging over from the four.

UCLA came right back and took charge. With Skippy Smith packing the ball eight times for 31 yards, the Bruins marched 72 yards in 15 plays with Smith scoring from the two.

Fish Releases All-Time High

Portland — October releases of large fingerling trout by the game commission pushed the poundage figure to an all-time high in hatchery fish production for a single year. Reino Koski, chief of fish liberations, said that at the end of October the poundage had reached a total of 715,000 pounds of fish released, which is already a 36 per cent increase over last year's total.

The heavy increase increase in poundage is almost entirely attributable to the game commission's large fingerling production program and the production of much larger legal sized fish than produced in the past. Although releases of large trout are viewed with favor by the angler, production of these fish is causing some concern because of fish food costs.

Total fish production at all game commission hatcheries during 1958 will reach approximately 20 million, the second straight year that this goal has been reached.

Fish remaining to be released are mainly chinook and silver salmon.

Clinics Slated For Grapplers

University of Oregon — A series of four high school wrestling clinics, sponsored by the University of Oregon and approved by the Oregon High School Activities association, are scheduled in McArthur Court beginning Nov. 8.

New Webfoot mat coach Mike Reuter announced the sessions and said that invitations have been extended to 80 Oregon high schools.

Each coach has been invited to bring two experienced wrestlers to the sessions who will aid in taking information back to the team. The boys, as well as the coach, will suit up and practice the maneuvers as they are demonstrated. The last clinic will include a practice workout to provide limited competition for the boys as well as practice for the referees participating in that phase of the clinic.

The remaining clinics are set for Nov. 15, Nov. 22 and Nov. 28, and each will deal with a particular phase of the wrestling game.

Seattle—UPI—The University of Oregon Ducklings scored a 16-7 come-from-behind victory over the Washington Pups in a frosh football game here Friday.

The win was Oregon Frosh's second in two starts. The Pups have a 1-1 mark now.

The Pups went out in front in the first period when halfback Bill Scott took an Oregon punt and rambled 64 yards to a touchdown. Kelly Pickering converted to make it 7-0.

Oregon came back in the second period to score on a 14-yard run by Frank Gusti and went ahead when quarterback Jim Suter passed to Jim Sanders for a two-point conversion.

The Ducklings scored again in the third period when fullback Mike Gaetner raced 54 yards to a touchdown. Suter passed to Dick Brown for another two-point conversion.

Lane Awarded Split Verdict

Syracuse, N. Y.—UPI—Kenny Lane's chances for another shot at lightweight champion Joe Brown were only slightly improved today after his split decision win over Lahouari Godih.

Friday night's over-the-limit lightweight bout did little to enhance Lane's standing as the number one contender for Brown's crown. He earned the split decision mainly on the strength of his right jabs which seemed to keep Godih, former French lightweight champion, off-stride.

He won 7-3 on Referee Joe Palmer's card and 5-3-2 in the opinion of Judge Harold McGarth. The other judge, Dick Albino, had it 6-4 Godih.

United Press International scored it 5-4-1 Godih.
