College Sponsors Concert

Ashland—William Richards, pianist, will present a concert in Churchill hall, at Southern Oregon college Sunday, November 16, at 8 p.m. This is the second program of a series being sponsored by the college this winter for students and townspeople of the Rogue valley, and is free to anyone interested.

Mr. Richards' musical talent was discovered when he was very young. At the age of six he began piano lessons with Marguerite Ritter at the School of Music of the University of Southern California, where he later became a scholarship student. He studied in Los Angeles and in New York with such noted teachers as John Crown, Madame Alice Ehlers, and Lewin von Swarthout.

Under the auspices of the Institute of International Education, he was sent to Europe for further study at the Conservatoire de Musique, Fontainebleau, France. There he was accepted as a piano student by Robert Casadesu, one of the foremost pianists of our time, and won in the competition. He also studied with Mlle Nadia Boulanger, teacher of musicology to many of the most famous American musicians.

The pianist has performed as soloist, accompanist, and ensemble player in recitals and concerts in the United States and Europe. Many critics have praised his playing. An Atlanta, Ga., critic commented on his "beautiful tone and virtuoso technique" and a reporter in Dallas, Tex., wrote of his "command of tonal resources, ranging from exquisite delicacy to great power. Others have written of his 'beautiful Chopin with tender passages and dynamic climaxes,' and his 'musical intelligence and heartfelt expression.'"
