Yellow chrysanthemums, orchids and gold candles decorated the rooms and serving table. Approximately 40 relatives and friends attended.

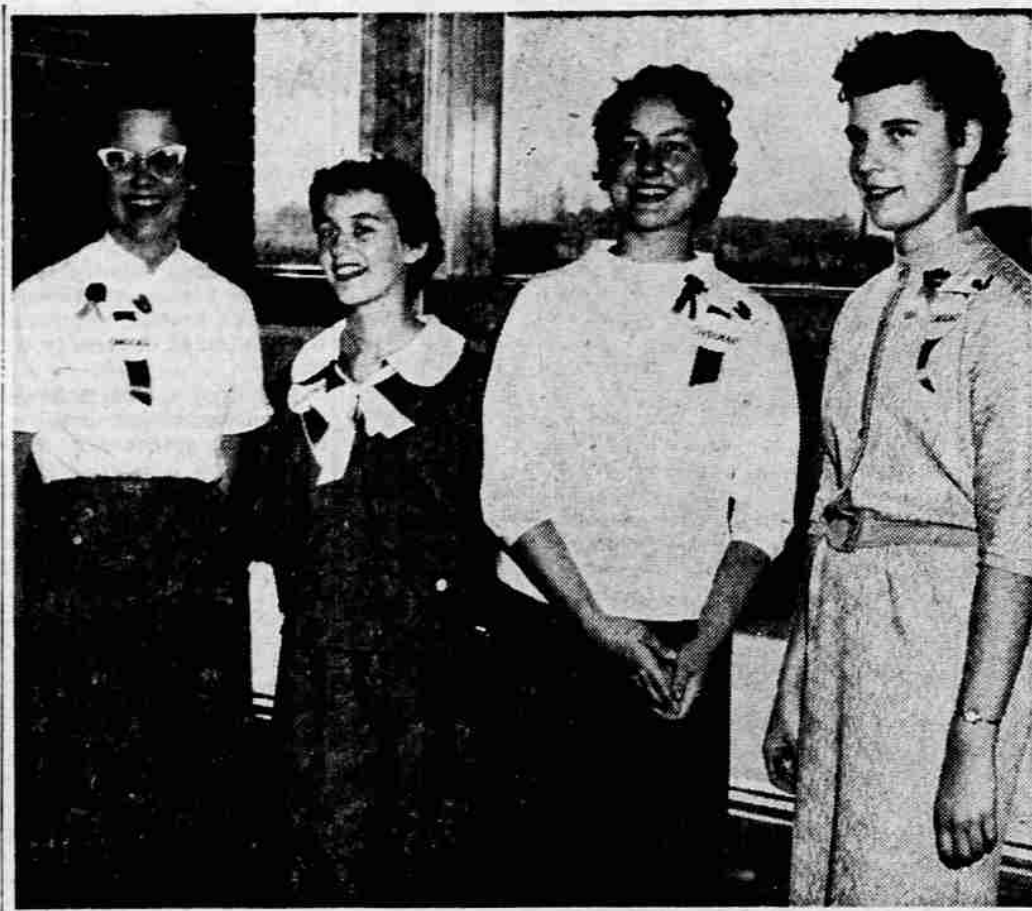
Mrs. Rhodes wore a black afternoon frock for the occasion with an orchid corsage.
