A new dessert called "Apollo Fluff" combines vanilla wafers, gelatin, honey and evaporated milk. For the recipe use 2 cups vanilla wafers, coarsely crumbled; 1/4 cup sugar; 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter; 1 package orange flavored gelatin; 1 1/4 cups boiling water; 3 tablespoons orange juice; 1 tablespoon lemon juice; 1 tablespoon grated orange rind; 1/2 cup honey; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1 tall can evaporated milk; 1 tablespoon lemon juice.

Chill bowl and beaters. Chill evaporated milk in refrigerator tray until ice crystals begin to form along edge. Mix vanilla wafers crumbs and sugar together. Cut in butter. Firmly press crumb mixture on bottom of pan or nappies. Set aside. Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Combine orange juice, lemon juice, grated orange rind, honey and salt. Add to orange gelatin. Chill until slightly thickened. In the chilled bowl, whip evaporated milk until thick; add lemon juice and continue to whip until stiff and forms a peak. Fold gelatin mixture into whipped evaporated milk and pile lightly on top of crumb crust. Chill until set.

Cancer Society To Expand Work On Education

An expanded educational crusade against cancer is being planned for Jackson county for the coming year. Members of the Medford committee and representatives from the Jackson County unit of the American Cancer society met last week with Mrs. Wilbur W. Falloon, Portland, executive secretary of the Oregon division, to discuss methods of reaching more people with the facts about cancer. Recognition of the danger signals and prompt treatment of cancer are responsible for a rising ratio of recoveries from the disease, it is stressed.
