Butler Interprets Election Results

Washington - (UPI) - Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler Friday interpreted Tuesday's election results as a revolt against President Eisenhower's economic policies and a voter demand for new ones.

At the same time, he clearly implied that he wanted to remain as chairman of the Democratic National Committee—a decision he will announce when the committee meets Dec. 6. He said the deciding factor in whether he stays or goes would be his stand on the civil rights issue, on which he has repeatedly insisted that the party must take a forthright position in support of Supreme Court desegregation decisions.
