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WEST VIRGINIA SCHOOL DAMAGED BY DYNAMITE

Desegregated Community Seen As Model Setup

Morgantown, W. Va. — (UPI) — A dynamite blast heavily damaged an integrated 17-room elementary-junior high school building today in the mining town of Osage, which had been regarded as a model desegregated community.

Sheriff Charles J. Whiston of Monongalia county said at least a case of dynamite had been touched off at two points in the main hallway of the building. A section of the brick wall of the 2½-story building was ripped out and the reinforced concrete ceiling supporting the second floor was bowed.

Dr. T. Emmens Dies in Eugene Of Heart Attack

One of Oregon's Best Known Doctors

Dr. Thomas Emmens, 46, of 6 North Modoc ave., Medford, one of the state's best-known eye doctors, died Saturday evening in Eugene of a heart attack following the Stanford-University of Oregon football game. He was born in Medford Nov. 2, 1912.

Dr. Emmens was a graduate of the University of Oregon, University of Oregon Medical school, and interned at Ancker hospital, St. Paul, Minn. He served as a captain in the U. S. Army Medical corps during World War II and took his postgraduate training in eye at the University of Pennsylvania and was on the staff of University of Oregon Medical school hospital and clinic during 1945-47.

He was a member of the Jackson County Medical society, Oregon State Medical society, and the American Medical society, Oregon Academy of Ophthalmology, Pacific Coast Academy of Ophthalmology, and the American Academy of Ophthalmology. He was also certified by the American Board of Ophthalmology.

He is survived by his widow, the former Leah Inch, Medford; four sons, Robert Walter Emmens, James Joslin Emmens, William Odell Emmens, and Lee Holmes Emmens, his mother, Mrs. Fannie Emmens, all Medford; one brother, Col. Robert Emmens, Tokyo, Japan, where he is stationed with the U. S. Air Force, and several aunts and uncles.

He has practiced ophthalmology in Medford since 1947. His father also was a well-known physician specializing in the eye in Medford.

Funeral arrangements will be announced by Perl Funeral home.

Complaint Filed Against Builder

The City of Medford's complaint against James Boyce of Watkins Construction company for allegedly violating a municipal set-back regulation was filed this morning in municipal court.

The complaint, signed by Oliver R. McNeil, head of the city's building department, was filed in connection with the erecting of an eight-unit apartment structure at 825 East Ninth st. with sideyards allegedly under the zoning ordinance minimum.

The city by this action now seeks to bring to a boil a situation that has been simmering since September.

City officials, realizing that apparent negligence by the building department contributed to the situation, have sought some means of an out-of-court settlement. They have evidently been unsuccessful.

Boyce has stated that since the building department issued him a permit on the basis of plans calling for the set-back, the city in effect took responsibility for the subsequent situation.

The complaint charges that the violation existed from July 10 until Sept. 22. On July 10 the permit was issued. On Sept. 22 McNeil issued an order requiring the contractor to stop work until he indicated he would correct the violation.

The zoning ordinance sets a fine of \$100 or 50 days in jail or both for any violation.

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According to Chaney, brother-in-law of the girl named in the petition, the case is closed as far as he is concerned.

Two Persons Die In Auto Mishap Near Ashland

Brings Fatalities To 15 in County

Two persons died in a traffic accident just north of Ashland about 11:55 p. m. Saturday, according to state police.

Mrs. Flonnie Marie Costa, 38, of 1689 Jackson rd., Ashland, driver of an automobile, and a passenger, Frederick Albert Kleinsmith Jr., 35, of Detroit, Ore., were killed instantly when a logging truck struck the rear of their car at the foot of Billings hill. The bodies were taken to Ashland mortuary, officers said.

The lumber truck and loaded trailer was driven by Cecil Anthon Allen, 38, of 4231 South Pacific highway, Grants Pass. Neither he nor his passengers, two soldiers from Fort Ord, Calif., were injured, state police said. An investigation of the accident is still being conducted.

Both vehicles were northbound on Highway 99 when the accident occurred. The Costa car apparently was intending to make a left turn into Jackson rd., officials said. The loaded truck and trailer was also traveling in the inside lane when it struck the Costa car.

Following the collision the Costa car traveled for 309 feet before it came to a stop against the southeast corner of the Bear Creek cafe, tearing out the front partition, officers said.

The body of the car was ripped off the frame from the rear to the dashboard, state police said. Minor damage occurred to the front end of the truck which apparently climbed up on the back end of the car.

The deaths were the 14th and 15th from traffic in Jackson county so far this year, and the sixth and seventh in the last two months.

Oil Slick Spotted In South Atlantic

Lisbon, Portugal — (UPI) — The U. S. Navy reported today that its search planes had spotted an oil slick and picked up distress signals in the South Atlantic area where a Portuguese plane went down Sunday with 36 persons aboard, including six Americans.

Officials at the Naval station in Port Lyautey, Morocco, stressed that it was too early to tell if there were any survivors from the amphibian which disappeared on a flight between Lisbon and Madeira, 600 miles west of Casablanca.

Many Events Set For Veterans Day; Showers Forecast

A breakfast, parade, "fly-by," football game and dance will highlight tomorrow's celebration of Veterans Day in Jackson county.

Weather forecast for tomorrow is patchy valley fog in the morning and partly cloudy during the day with scattered light showers, according to the U. S. Weather Bureau station at the Medford airport.

All schools, city, county, state and federal offices, and most businesses will be closed.

The breakfast for all veterans will start at 7:30 a. m. in the Veterans of Foreign Wars hall in Medford, officials announced.

The Veterans Day parade will start at 10:30 a. m. and will include local school bands, the Oregon National Guard band from Portland, floats entered by various organizations in the county, National Guard units from this area, and local Air Force, Navy and Army Reserve units in addition to veterans' groups.

The parade will form off Eighth st. west of Oakdale ave., proceed east on Eighth st. to Bartlett, and west on Main st. A reviewing stand will be in front of Crater Lake Motors on Main st.

Three F-89 jet planes will fly over the city about 10:45 a. m. as part of the parade ceremonies. They are from the 460th interceptor squadron at the Portland air base.

Tomorrow afternoon, Southern Oregon college will play a team from Moffett Field Naval Air base, south of San Francisco, in a football game at Medford high school stadium starting at 2 p. m.

Coach Agrees To Walk

In a previous game between the two teams this year, Moffett Field defeated Soc, 40-25, Al Akins, coach of the Southern Oregon college foot-

ball team, has agreed to walk home to Ashland if the Red Raiders defeat Moffett Field, it was reported today.

Beck Trial Jury Selection Starts

Tacoma, Wash. — (UPI) — Selection of a jury to hear the income tax evasion trial of former Teamsters boss Dave Beck began in U. S. court today before Judge George Boldt.

Out of a panel of 200, 48 jurors were excused outright for prejudice, health, business or other reasons. However, 12 persons were called to the jury box.

Judge Boldt meticulously explained the situation in his examination of the prospective jurors. He pointed out that the indictment was "by no way proof that Beck was guilty."

Youth Shot in Hand While Duck Hunting

Delbert Leland Johnson Jr., 15, of 512 Austin st., Medford, accidentally shot himself through his left hand Saturday afternoon while duck hunting, according to Jackson county sheriff's deputies.

Johnson, who was hunting with a friend, Grant Davis, 16, of 315 Beauty st., told deputies that he was loading the .22 caliber revolver when it discharged after he lowered the hammer.

The boy was treated at a doctor's office and released.

A duck hunting accident was believed to have taken the life of Carl Hardell Jr., 18, of Lebanon. He was presumed drowned after a boat he was using capsized on the Santiam river. Two other teen-agers, Tom Davis and Martin Grugeth, both 17, swam to safety.

A .22 caliber rifle discharged into the stomach of Dale Gilbert, 14, of Springfield, fatally wounding him. The accident occurred when Gilbert and Lee Meadows, also 14, took the gun from a cabinet in Meadows' home.

Warren Hamilton Stover, 44, Corvallis, was killed Saturday when his single engine plane crashed in a brush field 20 miles southeast of Springfield.

Headon Collision South of Albany Costs Three Lives

Two Electrocuted; Plane Kills One

At least 13 persons died in Oregon week end accidents, eight of them in traffic.

Two persons were electrocuted, one died in a plane crash, one was presumed drowned and a 14-year-old boy was wounded fatally when a .22 caliber rifle went off.

A headon collision Sunday between a pickup truck and a car about nine miles south of Albany claimed three lives and hospitalized 10 other persons.

Two of the victims were children, Dena Lee Simler, 4, and Rickey Blanton, 18-months. Mrs. Rosa Holeton, Carnation, Wash., died in an Albany hospital Sunday night.

The two children were among seven people in the car driven by Donald L. Blanton, 24, Junction City. Also in the car were Blanton's wife, Beverly, 21; Blanton's twin brother, Darrell, 24, his wife, Barbara, about 24, and Ronald K. Simler, 7.

The pickup was driven by James E. Holeton, 60, Carnation, Wash., who was on his way to Bakersfield, Calif., with his wife.

Glen Rasmussen, 41, Eugene, was struck broadside trying to avoid the accident. His car swung broadside in the road and was struck by William P. Sullivan of Seattle.

All were in an Albany hospital and their conditions were described from "fair" to "critical."

Just before midnight Saturday an auto and a lumber truck collided on Highway 99 near Ashland killing two persons.

Dead were Flonnie Marie Costa, 38, Medford, and Frederick Kleinsmith Jr., 35, a passenger in the car.

A Newberg mother and her 12-year-old daughter were electrocuted Saturday while on a shopping trip after a 12-500 volt power line came in contact with their pickup truck. The accident occurred south of Sherwood.

Mrs. Jewell Self and her daughter Alberta died when they stepped out of the truck onto the pavement, grounding the high voltage wire which had come down because of a windstorm.

Harry Edward Bibler, Culver, was killed Saturday night when his car smacked into an embankment south of Redmond.

Karl S. Roessler, an Oregon State student from Davis, Calif., was killed Saturday when the car in which he was a passenger ran into a freight locomotive. Two other OSC students were hospitalized and described as "critical."

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Liquor Violation Brings \$105 Fine

Two men appeared in district court Friday afternoon before Judge James M. Main. Cecil Hendricks, Klamath Falls, waived the right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over to the grand jury on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses. He was lodged in county jail in lieu of \$1,500 bond. He was represented by Richard Courtwright, local attorney.

Charles Vernon Burgess, Klamath River, Calif., was fined \$105 and sentenced to six months in the county jail after he pleaded guilty to furnishing liquor to a minor.
