Raider Win Will Make Akins Walk

Coach Al Akins of the Southern Oregon college football team has agreed to walk back to Ashland from Medford on Tuesday if the Red Raiders of the Rogue defeat the Fliers of Moffett Naval Air Station.

And, Akins felt today that he will have to hoof it. He said that the Raiders were fired up and intent on making the coach return to the SOC campus on foot.

Southern Oregon and Moffett vie at the Medford stadium on Tuesday at 2 p.m. It will be one of the attractions of the Veterans Day holiday here.

The Raiders, a team made up mainly of players from the southern area of the state including a number of former prep stars from the Rogue valley, will have their first action in two years in the Pear city. It will also be their final appearance of the season on valley turf.

Eager To Even
Moffett dumped the Raiders 40 to 25 in the collegians' season opener. SOC is eager to make up for the loss and the Raiders figure that their improvement since the first game can carry them through.

The Fliers, one of the top service teams on the West Coast this fall, come to Medford after absorbing a 53 to 12 licking at the hands of Oregon Tech at Klamath Falls on Saturday. Since Ore. Tech clipped SOC 40 to 0 a short time back, the game last Saturday would indicate on the surface a good chance for the Raiders.

However, Moffett at Klamath Falls, lost two key players by injury. These were Calvin Campbell, one of the outstanding halfbacks playing service in this country, and Dick Olivas, a quarterback who generalizes the Fliers well and is a fine passer and an adept ball handler. Both are expected to be ready for the hassle with the Ashland school.

LA Rams Overpower Forty Niners 56-7

Los Angeles - (UPI) - The Los Angeles Rams, in sole possession of third place in the Western Conference of the NFL, refused today to look beyond their next game although San Francisco coach Frankie Albert said he didn't know who could beat them.

Albert's statement came after the Rams defeated the Forty-Niners, 56-7, in the worst beating ever suffered by the San Francisco club from its California rival.

"They're the best club we have played all year and they have got a chance to win it all," Albert said. "I told Sid Gilman we'd try to beat Baltimore to help the Rams along."

One At A Time
Gillman, happier than he has been in a long time, refused to look beyond next Sunday's Green Bay game and warned his players if they started dreaming of possible championship aspirations they would get "lobbered."

A crowd of 95,082 in Memorial coliseum saw the Rams score on their second offensive play and then easily draw away.

Gillman paid tribute to his defensive unit for what he termed "a great performance."

"While our defense has been real good all year, our boys outplayed their best previous effort this time," Gillman said. "San Francisco had what I considered the best five-man end combination in pro football."

Although he lavished praise on all his players, Gillman had added words for defense.

Fate of Sceptre To Be Decided

London - (UPI) - The fate of the Sceptre, Britain's thoroughly-beaten challenger in this year's American Cup yacht races, will be decided this week at a meeting of the Royal Yacht Squadron.

One London newspaper reported Sunday that the \$196,000 yacht will be scrapped as "a total loss."

"It would not be practical to modify her hull," Peter Nicholson, head of the firm that built Sceptre, told the Sunday Dispatch. "If no one wants Sceptre, as she is, the logical thing would be to pull her to pieces and use the lead and spars... to build a new challenger."

The Sceptre was hailed in some British quarters as a "white elephant of the high seas" following her defeat by the American yacht, Columbia, in four straight races in September.

Anthony of New York, who registered 29 knockouts while winning 35 of his 42 bouts is favored at 3-1 over Ray because of his punch. Ray, making his New York debut, scored seven kayoets while winning 17 of his 27 starts.

Lightweights Frankie Ryff of New York and Eddie Perkins of Chicago will meet Wednesday night in a TV-ABC 10-rounder in the Chicago Stadium. Each is a light hitter but Ryff is favored at 8-5 because of his greater experience, winning 28 of 33 scraps. Perkins, on national TV for the first time, won 11 of 15 bouts.

"White sometimes runs like he hasn't got enough sense to stop in a play where it looks like he'll surely be halted," Evashevski said. "He just keeps on going - and often gets through."

Fans sent up a 30-minute-long cheer when the Hawkeyes stepped from their plane. Signs read: "Iowa, Big Ten champs" and the band played, "California Here I Come."

The New York Giants have run out of undefeated opponents, the Nation league division races are wide open and the turnstiles are spinning like propeller blades.

That's the NFL situation today with five weeks remaining, and Coach Jim Lee Howell's Giants are the team the other top clubs are cheering and cursing. The Giants, two games behind Cleveland two weeks ago, have put both division titles up for grabs with dramatic triumphs over previously unbeaten teams.

The Giants shattered Cleveland's five-game victory streak Nov. 2 and Sunday they upset the Baltimore Colts - only team to reach the halfway mark in the campaign with a perfect record, 24-21.

New York's victory before 71,163 at Yankee stadium, the largest crowd ever to see a pro football game in the big city, enabled the Giants to tie the Browns both (5-2) for first in the Eastern division. It also cut the Baltimore (6-1) margin over the Chicago Bears (5-2) to one game in the Western race.

Pat Summerall's 28-yard field goal with 2:40 to go provided New York's victory margin after Sam Huff of the Giants stole one of George Shaw's passes.

Lions Upset Browns
The Detroit Lions gave New York a vital assist by upsetting the Browns before 75,563 at Cleveland, 30-10. The Bears took advantage of New York's triumph by whipping the Green Bay Packers, 24-10.

The Rams crushed the San Francisco Forty-Niners, 56-7; before 95,082 at Los Angeles; Bobby Layne's four touchdown passes sparked the Pittsburgh Steelers to a 31-24 victory over the Eagles at Philadelphia, and Eddie Lebaron five touchdown passes paced the Redskins to a 45-31 victory over the Chicago Cardinals at Washington.

Sunday's action produced an NFL six-game attendance record of 342,734, bettering the record of 295,000 set last week.
