

4 Loop Togas May Be Settled Saturday

Four conference championships and as many as three bowl bids may be clinched next Saturday when the college football season builds toward its grand climax with renewals of old, upset-filled rivalries.

Iowa, the nation's No. 1 team, already has won the Big Ten's Rose Bowl berth and Louisiana State, Oklahoma and Clemson need only victories next Saturday to be "in" on the bowl gravy. LSU is gunning for the Southeastern conference's Sugar Bowl invitation while Oklahoma and Clemson may meet in the Orange Bowl as champions of the Big Eight and Atlantic Coast conferences.

In addition, West Virginia clinched the Southern conference title by beating William and Mary while a meeting between Dartmouth and Cornell, each 4-1, is expected to produce the Ivy League champion although Princeton, also 4-1 and playing Yale, still is in strong contention.

Two Races Muddled
Two conference races — the Pacific Coast and the Southwest Conference — are thoroughly muddled and probably won't be straightened out until Nov. 22. California (4-1) is the current leader in the PCC, with Washington State (5-2) and Oregon State (4-2) challenging. In the Southwest, Texas Christian and Rice are tied for first place with 3-0 marks and should still be tied when they oppose each other, Nov. 22. Rice plays Texas A&M (1-3) next Saturday while TCU has a somewhat tougher assignment against Texas 2-2.

LSU, second-ranked and a 50-18 victor over Duke Saturday night, still has powerful challengers for the Southeastern title in Auburn (4-0-1) and Mississippi (3-1) but undoubtedly would clinch the Sugar Bowl bid by beating Mississippi State next Saturday. Auburn is ineligible for bowl competition and LSU has beaten Mississippi.

Oklahoma is expected to have little trouble beating Missouri, which routed Colorado, 33-9 last Saturday but has been beaten three times while Clemson will be a strong pick over five-times-beaten North Carolina State.

Easy Assignments
Syracuse and Pittsburgh, the Eastern independents with high bowl hopes, have relatively easy assignments. Syracuse, which crushed Boston University, 42-0, Friday duce that score six-times-beaten Colgate and Pittsburgh, which nipped Notre Dame, 29-26, Saturday, will be also a top-heavy pick over Nebraska, 1-4 in the Big Eight and 2-6 overall.

Other games which will attract national interest next Saturday include Iowa vs Ohio State and Northwestern vs Purdue in the Big Ten; Georgia vs Auburn and Georgia Tech vs Alabama in the Southeast, Southern Methodist vs Arkansas in the Southwest, plus Army vs Villanova, Notre Dame vs North Carolina, Boston College vs Boston University, and Rutgers vs Quantico Marines. Rutgers, the only major perfect record team besides LSU, defeated Lafayette, 18-0, Saturday despite the loss of ace tailback Bill Austin.

Workmanlike Triumph
Iowa scored a workmanlike 28-6 triumph over winless Minnesota as Willie Fleming ran 46 and 63 yards for touchdowns and Randy Duncan passed for two more tallies, but second-ranked LSU, third-ranked Army and fourth-ranked Auburn turned in more eye-catching wins than the top-ranked Hawkeys.

LSU fell behind, 6-0, in the first period but then pulled out all the stops as Warren

Independent Hoop League To Be Made Up of Six Quintets

Six teams will make up the Southern Oregon Independent Basketball league in its first year of operation, it was decided at a meeting in Grants Pass Sunday.

Teams committed to the new league are Riddle, Grants Pass, Butte Falls, Hawkinson Tire of Medford and Southern Oregon College junior varsity. The sixth team will be sought from Medford.

Final details of operation and election of officers will be completed at a meeting to be held in Medford on Sunday, Nov. 23, it was decided.

At yesterday's meeting representatives voted for each team to furnish a referee for each game. The schedule will be drawn on a round-robin basis with each team playing 10 league games. Considerable discussion centered around joining the Amateur Athletic Union with the matter being left to the discretion of each team with no official league action being taken.

St. Louis —UPI—The Eighth U.S. Court of Appeals today ordered Little Rock, Ark., school authorities to proceed with integration plans "in accordance with the court's prior orders."

The court also directed the district court at Little Rock to enjoin school board President William G. Cooper and Superintendent Virgil T. Blossom from leasing school buildings for private, segregated operation.

The action set aside U.S. District Judge John E. Miller's dismissal of a petition by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People for an injunction preventing the school leasing. Miller had ruled that the petition must be considered by a three-judge court because it constituted a ruling on Arkansas law.

In its decision, the federal court here said the petition did not challenge the constitutionality of Arkansas Acts No. 4 and No. 5. Both acts were backed by Gov. Orval Faubus, and gave him power to call a special election on the integration question and close the schools if voters back segregation.

Jordan Chance Jeopardized

Los Angeles —UPI—Don Don Jordan's scheduled chance at Virgil Akins' welterweight title Dec. 5 appeared to be in "double jeopardy" today because of his alleged attempt to settle an argument with a bow and arrow.

Jordan, rated the world's outstanding 147-pound contender by Ring magazine, was jailed with a friend Saturday night when two women charged he shot arrows at them after they asked him to move his car.

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Air Force Probes Rocket Failure

Cape Canaveral —UPI—Air Force rocketeers poured over coded data today in an effort to learn why the third stage of their third moon rocket failed to fire. But a project official said the trouble probably was just a broken wire.

"I doubt if we'll ever know for sure what happened," said the official, who could not be named. "But it probably was just a broken wire. All it takes is a spark to ignite the third stage, but we never had that spark."

Up to the point at which the third stage was supposed to fire in the Saturday attempt, it was learned, everything was going perfectly. The first two stages of the 52-ton moon bird had achieved just the right angle of flight and had sped the pioneer payload up to the speed necessary at that phase of its flight.

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Three Cling To El Capitan Face

Yosemite National Park, Calif. —UPI—Three mountain climbers, braving scattered showers and cold weather, clung to the sheer slippery sides of El Capitan today in a daring attempt to be the first to scale the 3,604-foot granite monolith.

Early today, the climbers were only 300 feet from the top. They hoped to make it by Tuesday, weather permitting.

Ahead of them lay one of the most perilous parts of the ascent. At the very top was an overhang which required the utmost ingenuity to surmount.

The climbers were Warren Harding, 34, West Sacramento; George Whitmore, 27, a Fresno, Calif., pharmacist; and Wayne Merry, 27, a San

Jose State college student. Harding almost lost his life Sunday when a piton broke loose, causing him to fall four feet. One of the other climbers stopped his fall.

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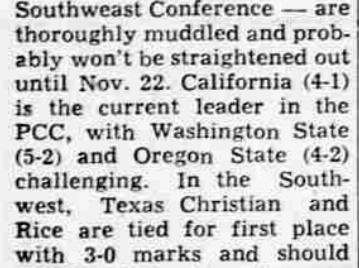

Boros Cops Golf Prize
Atlanta —UPI— His fellow pros aren't kidding when they call Julius Boros "the best stretch in golf."

The popular Connecticut Yankee, now playing out of Mid Pines, N.C., turned in another strong finish Sunday to walk off with the big share of the purse in the \$30,000 Carling Open tournament.

Boros sank a pair of birdies on the final two holes for a 2-over-par 74 and a 72-hole total of 284. That was good enough for a take-home pay of \$8,500 — \$3,500 first-place money and a \$5,000 bonus for repeating in the Carling, which he won previously in 1954.

Boros needed those two birdies. Billy Casper of Apple Valley, Calif., two strokes behind after 54 holes, was only one back after Sunday's 16th hole. Casper also birdied the short par-3 17th but Boros ended the threat on the final hole by placing his approach shot within three feet of the pin, then sinking the putt.

Bill Collins, Baltimore, Md., had a 74-287 for third while Pete Cooper of Lakeland, Fla., who had a 70, and Fred Hawkins of El Paso, Tex., who had a 73, tied for fourth at 288.
