



## GOLD HILL School Events Listed

Gold Hill - Gilbert Mack, principal of the Hanby and Patrick schools in Gold Hill, has announced several important reminders to parents.

There will be no school on Monday, Nov. 10, because of teacher's institute. The schools will remain closed on Nov. 11, Armistice day, and school will resume on Wednesday, Nov. 12.

Immunizations for diphtheria and small-pox vaccinations will be given at the Hanby school, for youngsters of both schools, on Wednesday morning, Nov. 12, beginning at 9 a.m. Dr. Erin Merkel, Jackson county health officer, will administer the vaccine. No child will be vaccinated without written permission from parent or guardian, Mr. Mack said. He added that slips were sent home to parents about two weeks ago by students, to be filled out and returned to the school.

Parents who wish to have a pre-school child immunized or vaccinated at this time must accompany the youngster.

On the same date, Dr. Merkel will be at the Sams Valley school at 10:30 a.m. to give immunizations to youngsters there.

Parents are invited to attend open house at the two Gold Hill schools Thursday evening, Nov. 13, in observance of National Education week. The open house is in conjunction also with the regular Gold Hill Parent-Teacher association's meeting that evening, scheduled for 8 p.m.

Patrick open house will be held prior to the business session, between 6:45 and 7:45 p.m.

Open house at the Hanby school will follow the PTA

meeting. Mrs. Ruth Brewster, school music teacher, will be in charge of special music for the program that evening.

Refreshments will be served in the Hanby school's cafeteria. Sixth grade mother's will be in charge of these arrangements.

Teachers and pupils have spent many hours working on material concerning classroom studies, which will be on display at many of the Gold Hill merchants during National Education week.

The Gold Hill post office was specially honored when Postmaster Harry D. Force received the Post Office department's "Motor Vehicle Safety Award."

Postmaster Force stated that the Gold Hill post office has experienced no accidents in 54,900 miles driven, a frequency rate of 0.0. ## 'Hounds' Learn to Shadow 'Hare' In Narcotics Training School

Editor's note: (One of the grimmest battles fought by law enforcement agents is that waged unceasingly against the illegal narcotics trade. This dispatch provides a glimpse of a little known government "school for narcotics agents.")

Washington -UPI- A well-dressed, respectable looking

man slips out of the lobby of a famous Washington hotel. Up one street, down another he moves along quickly, occasionally looking back over his shoulder, frequently changing direction. He darts in one entrance of a big department store, out another and jumps into a taxi.

Not far behind him are five other equally ordinary looking men.

They, the "hounds," are students at the Treasury's Narcotics Training School for state, local and foreign enforcement officers.

Shadowing the "hare," a Treasury agent, is part of their training.

One of Many Subjects  
Surveillance is only one of many subjects covered during the two-week, 80-hour course at the Treasury school.

The curriculum also includes such topics as undercover work, narcotics smuggling, identification of drugs, seizures and arrests, interrogation, and organization of the narcotics underworld.

Equipped with this special knowledge, Federal authorities say, local officers will be better able to help the Federal government's 275 narcotics agents break world-wide dope smuggling rings. The students are expected to pass on what

they learn to their fellow officers back home.

Since it was established two years ago, the school has graduated 376 officers from 33 states and 10 foreign countries.

The course is given six or seven times a year with an average of about 25 students in each class. There is no tuition fee. Students, or their governments back home, must pay their own living costs.

According to the school's director, Patrick P. O'Carroll, the course "is open to any police officer who will benefit from the training." Students are usually detectives, O'Carroll said, "because narcotics work is mostly investigating—not the sort of thing uniformed officers are best suited for."

Long Experience  
The instructors, O'Carroll explained, are mostly Treasury agents "with long experience in the field of enforcement—men who know right now what's happening on the street."

Veteran narcotics agents

will tell you that the toughest part of the business is not catching the corner dope peddler but tracing his drug supply to its source—a chain that may lead from Texas to the Orient.

As O'Carroll put it: "What we want to show the students is that getting one little capsule of heroin is not the end of the case. We want them to learn to track that capsule all the way back to where it originally came from."

To this end, the course includes a unit on the narcotics underworld—the international smuggling rings.

Most Fruitful Area

The fact that virtually all narcotics used in this country does come from overseas explains why most of the school's students have been from coastal cities. That's where narcotics control work proves most fruitful.

But some shipments do slip through and so police officers everywhere know, for example, the best way to seize a quantity of narcotics hidden in a home. To learn forcible entry, the students study the school's "fortified room" problem.

They are told, for example, that upon announcing that they are "police officers with

a search warrant" it is vital to get inside quickly, before the drugs can be dumped down a drain. But before they break down a door they must be sure that it is not painted glass or that they will not shatter their shoulders against hidden nails.

The surveillance problem is highly realistic. The "hounds" get a look at the "hare" through a one-way window, then are told where they are to pick up his trail.

In following him they must notice where he goes, what he does, to whom he talks. Sometime during the hour-and-a-half chase he will pass a supposed package of drugs to someone else. But he may do it very slyly—by leaving it in a phone booth or in a newspaper dropped on a park bench.

When the problem is over the "hounds" and the "hare" attend a critique with other members of the class. The "hare" tries to pick out the men who followed him. Then the team leader reads a report on what the "hare" did. He points out where it is right and where deficient.

In the two years since it was authorized by Congress

in the Narcotics Control Act of 1956 the school has already proved of value. O'Carroll said, "Our graduates have made some excellent cases."

He credited the fastest application of school training to three students from Afghanistan. Heading home, they stopped off in Beirut, Lebanon, where they visited the U.S. Treasury agent there.

He told them he had no case pending but suggested that if they "hit the street" they might turn up something. Within 24 hours one of them made a "contact" which eventually led to the breakup of a smuggling ring.
