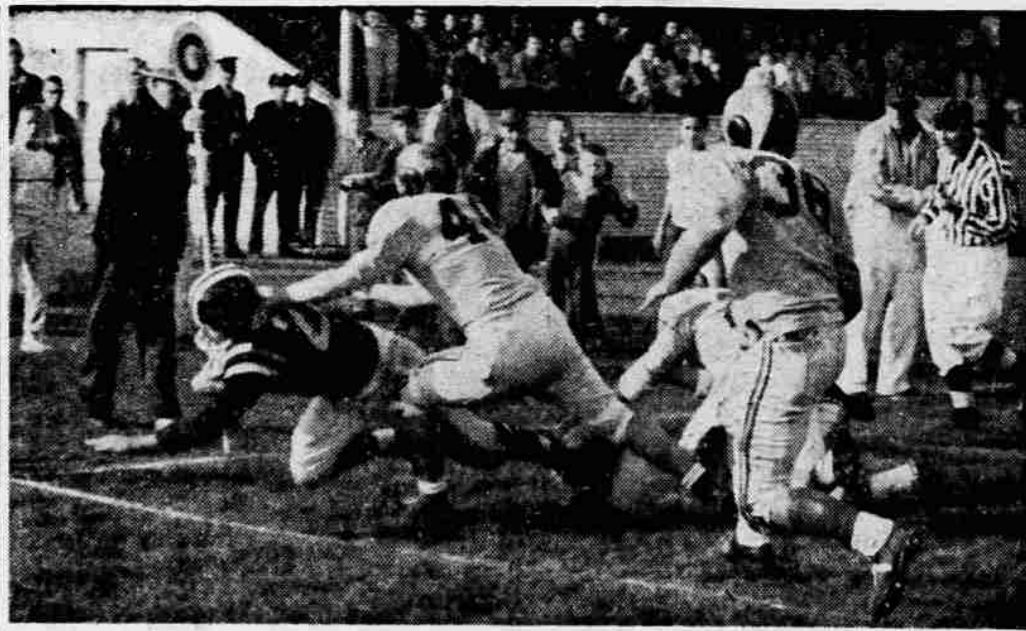

Guide Gets Victory on Foul Claim

Laurel, Md. —UPI— A. G. (Bert) Dobb, who sold Sailor's Guide to Dr. Leon Levy of Philadelphia following the Australian horse's victory in the Washington, D.C. International, today declared he would not have entered a foul claim against Tudor Era's jockey.

Tudor Era, one of the two American entries in Tuesday's classic at Laurel, finished 3 1/2 lengths ahead of Sailor's Guide but was disqualified for bumping the Australian horse on the stretch turn and placed second.

The foul claim, upheld by the stewards, was made by Howard Grant, the American rider of Sailor's Guide, against jockey Willie Harmatz on Tudor Era.

However, Dobb later appeared quite surprised at Grant's action.

"In our country," the Australian horseman said, "the jockey is not permitted to claim foul without permission from the owner or trainer of the horse."

"I would not have given that permission," Dobb added. "Because of Grant's foul claim, the official result of the race was held up almost a half hour while the stewards studied movies of the race and also conferred with both riders."

Satisfied that Grant's objection was justified the stewards ordered the disqualification of Tudor Era and awarded the winner's purse of \$70,000 to Dobb.

OSC's Bates Rated West's Best Tackle

San Francisco—UPI—The best college tackle in the West—if not in the country—this year is Ted Bates, a powerful line man for Oregon State.

Because the Beavers have been whipped three times already, it is possible that Bates may be overlooked in the balloting for All-American status.

Bates is so good, that opposing teams have taken to building their offenses in spots where towering Ted won't be in the way.

"He's one of the finest college tackles I ever saw," says his coach, Tommy Prothro. "He never has a bad day."

Bates was the guy who handed California its only Pacific Coast conference loss to date. He spent most of the afternoon in the Golden Bear backfield and was the man mainly responsible for holding the great Joe Kapp to a minimum of 20 yards gained on the ground and not much more in the air.

Stopped Kapp

Three times during the game Bates broke through the Cal defenses to toss Kapp for important losses when California was on the march. There wasn't an inch of ground gained over his position during the game. And the Oregon State coaches consider California the best team they have met this year.

Standing 6-3 and weighing 215 pounds, Bates is a senior who has been a standout all through his college career.
