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Manufacturing Job Placements Mount

Salem — UPI — The State Employment Service reported today that job placements in the state's manufacturing industries last month exceeded those of October, 1957.

This indication of a better overall business condition teamed with a decline in the number of people applying for jobs, the employment service said.

There were 1,666 manufacturing placements during October, compared to 1,153 during October, 1957. The overall non-agricultural total was 5,606 this year and 4,639 a year ago.

As for job applications, this October saw a total of 9,319, nearly 1,000 less than last year's 10,283. The service's active file of job seekers at the end of October was 7.8 per cent below a year ago.

Judge Refuses Picket Injunction

Portland — UPI — U.S. District Judge William East Thursday refused to grant an injunction sought by the Elk Creek Logging Company of Estacada in a dispute with Molalla Local 540 of the International Woodworkers of America.

The company had asked the court to stop picketing of its operations by the union. The picketing began after the union said the firm hired an "independent contractor" to haul logs which the union said was a breach of its contract with the company.

Ice Island To Be Reoccupied

Portland — UPI — A University of Washington meteorology professor says present plans call for reoccupying of the ice island which broke up in the Arctic this month, stranding 20 persons for a time.

Prof. Franklin I. Badgley told the Northwest meeting of the American Geophysical Union Thursday that the ice island, called Alpha, split several times during the year it was occupied. He said cracks usually came when the ice was strongest, in April. He added that no explanation has been found for the gradual splitting of the sea ice floe.

Two Hillcrest Escapees Caught

Salem — UPI — Two of seven inmates who escaped from Hillcrest girls school Thursday night were picked up by Salem city police today.

A search was on for the remaining girls.

School Superintendent Marjorie McBride said most of the escapees, aged 16 and 17, were "troubled makers." They used a master key to unlock a dormitory door.

Superintendent McBride said she did not know where the girls obtained the keys.

Firm Head Held On Murder Charge

Chester, N.Y. — UPI — The president of a small manufacturing firm was held on first degree murder charges today for killing an ex-convict turned labor organizer who was leading a wildcat organizing strike against his already unionized plant.

Malcolm White, 48, founder and president of the Chester Cable Corp., confessed the slaying of Alfred F. Dugan, 52, a convicted bank robber and narcotics peddler who was acting as an organizer for Local 1, Interstate Industrials Union (Ind.). The union has been trying to win recognition over a local of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (AFL-CIO) which represents the plant's 140 workers.
