

Bruce Ginn Apparently Jealous Of Brother, Psychologist Says

Los Angeles - (AP) - Bruce Harlow Ginn, 18, who calmly shot his 14-year-old brother and said he would kill him again if he had to do it over, apparently was intensely jealous of the younger boy, a top psychologist said today.

Dr. Richard Centers, associate professor at UCLA and a recognized leader in the field of social psychology, said Bruce's behavior showed jealousy and resentment.

"You can't do much analysis in a case like this without weeks of work, but a guess would be that there was a sibling rivalry here," Centers said in response to questions put by United Press International.

Has Neurotic Tendency

"Bruce was jealous of Ted. Ted displaced him as the baby in the family. Bruce didn't feel he was getting enough attention. He had a pronounced neurotic tendency, but there's much more to it than just that."

"The boy said in his statement that he put his fingers over his eyes for several weeks in school. This is a withdrawal indication and a schizoid reaction."

"His words suggest strongly that he feels he was displaced in the family and that he was resentful. He blames his family for not getting a tutor for him—again, resentment."

Centers stressed that only extensive clinical work could bring about a complete analysis of Bruce's ailment. He noted that a psychiatrist who treated Bruce from December, 1956, to November, 1957, said this condition is a major psychosis characterized by withdrawal from reality—a desire to live in a shell.

Relates the Details

Bruce related details of the killing last Wednesday in the family's home in nearby Altadena. He told sheriff's deputies Ted—his real name was Edward—was an inferior person who had bad manners and had to be killed.

Friday Bruce was arraigned in Pasadena Municipal Court on a murder charge and ordered held without bail pending a preliminary hearing Dec. 5.

Bruce shot Ted with a .22 he had bought secretly from a mail order house. He shot Ted when the younger boy came home from school. The

parents were both out at the time.

"He had no tears for us or for Ted," said the father, 50, a church deacon and water firm employee, after he and his wife, Ruth, 45, visited the boy in jail. "He even said he wasn't sorry and that

he'd do it over again.

"He's my son, and I love him. We're going to back him all the way."

"I had 18 wonderful years with Bruce, and I had 14 wonderful years with Ted."

"He was a good boy, an All-American boy, and had lots of friends."

"I'm a man. I've done wrong. Why couldn't it have been me? Give Bruce your prayers. He must have your prayers."

Questioning Continues

Sheriff's investigators continued to pore over statements made by Bruce:

"I had to kill Ted. He was an inferior personality. He just had to die. I couldn't stand the thought of his being married and having children. Everything he did was bad. He played TV too loud."

"I'm not sorry a bit. Ted was always troubling good people."

"My parents didn't realize how serious things were. They used poor judgment and made poor decisions. They made a poor decision in having Ted. They weren't strong hereditarily. I don't think they should have ever gotten married. They seemed to crumple under pressure."

"I'm not really hating them. Their hereditary weakness comes down through me, but I think I turned out a little bit better than they did."

"I don't know where I'll be kept, but I'll get the gas chamber at 21," he said.
