One-Dish Meal

Nutritionally speaking, this one-dish meal "picks a wallop." Cook 1/2 pound of macaroni in boiling, salted water over a high flame for 8-10 minutes. Shred 1 cup sharp cheddar cheese and butter in a 1 1/2 baking dish while the macaroni cooks. Put a layer of macaroni on the bottom of the casserole, cover with a layer of cheese and repeat until both macaroni and cheese are used. Sprinkle 1/2 teaspoon of salt and a bit of cayenne over the top, then drizzle a tall can (1 and 2/3 cups) of evaporated milk over all. Cover the top with buttered crumbs. Bake in a gas oven, preheated to 375 degrees until the casserole bubbles and the crumbs are brown, about 25 minutes. Serve with thick slices of fresh tomato, assorted relishes and a fruit cobbler baked at the same time.
