

Fourth - Period Touchdown Gives Bruins 7-3 Upset Victory Over Oregon Ducks

Los Angeles—UPI—Weak-passing UCLA called on their ace kicker, Kirk Wilson, to throw Saturday and the big tailback set up a fourth-period touchdown to give the Bruins a 7-3 upset victory over Oregon in a Pacific Coast Conference game.

After Wilson completed passes of 26 and 27 yards to wingback Phil Parslow, fullback Ray Smith broke through the Oregon line for eight yards to score.

The Webfoots broke up a scoreless deadlock that lasted until late in the fourth period when fullback Dave Powell sparked an 28-yard drive to the UCLA 12 where place-kicker John Clarke kicked a field goal from the 17 to give them a 3-0 lead.

Brilliant Willie West alternated with Powell in leading the Webfoots up and down the field but fumbles and interceptions nipped their efforts to put over a touchdown.

Capt Jim Steffen of UCLA was a key man in the Bruin defense by recovering two Oregon fumbles and intercepting a pass.

The victory was the first at home this season for UCLA and only their third win of 1958 against six losses. But the jubilant Bruins carried Coach Bill Barnes off the field in their joy over winning at home.

Neither team was able to score in the first half although Oregon moved the ball well but fumbles and pass interceptions cut short their efforts.

The Webfoots in the opening period drove 65 yards to the UCLA 9 when fullback Marlan Holland fumbled and Steffen recovered on the 6.

The next time Oregon got into UCLA territory, quarterback Paul Grosz pass was intercepted by Steffen.

UCLA in the second period moved as far as the Oregon 26 when the Bruins ran out of steam and lost the ball on downs.

Neither team could get a real drive going in the third

period, most of which was played in Oregon territory. But when Powell came in to spark the Webfoots on their best drive of the day, climaxed by Clarke's field goal. Wilson then took over with his two long passes and Ray Smith pushed over the touchdown.

Bout Won By Anthony

New York—UPI—Tony Anthony, the top light heavyweight contender who snapped Sonny Ray's winning string Friday night, will launch his campaign for a shot at the heavyweight crown in Madison Square Garden in January, probably against Willie Pastrano.

That's what matchmaker Jack Barrett said Saturday after a quick huddle with Anthony and Manager Ernie Braca.

Tall, slender Anthony of New York, who came from behind Friday night at the Garden to register his seventh straight victory on a unanimous decision over Chicago Ray, said, "I can weigh about 180 pounds as a heavyweight, and be real strong at that figure."

Tony scaled 177½ against Ray's 172¼ as he ended bullshouldered Sonny's winning streak at nine bouts, after taking the last three rounds on all three official score sheets with terrific barrages to body and head.

The scoring favored Anthony on rounds: 6-3-1, 7-3, 5-4-1.

For seven rounds, Ray threatened an upset against the 4-1 favorite as he forced Anthony about the ring with a bulldozer attack directed principally at the body.

Last Quarter Touchdown Gives OSC 24-16 Victory

Stanford, Calif.—UPI—Oregon State kept its faint Rose Bowl hopes alive Saturday with a last-quarter touchdown that beat Stanford 24-16 and nullified a great passing performance by Dick Norman, third string Indian quarterback.

Leading 16-0 after the first 20 minutes of play, the Beavers were numbed by Norman's aerial performance, tying the score at 16-16 going into the last quarter.

During that run, Norman completed 17 out of 22 passes and at one stretch, en route for the second Stanford score, clicked on seven in a row.

But the overall Beaver ground strength, aided by fumbling Stanford men, paid off—although a surprise aerial toss accounted for the winning touchdown.

With the score deadlocked midway in the last quarter, third down and a foot to go, full back Nub Beamer took a handoff and passed 44 yards to end Roger Johnson for a touchdown.

The game had started out as a rout. Stanford fumbled four times during the first quarter and one of these, recovered by Bruce Hake for Oregon State on the Stanford 36, led to a touchdown. A 15-yard penalty put Oregon State back on the 44, but Beamer broke over center

and went for the distance. Oregon State picked up another score early in the second quarter when Earnel Durden riced around end from the 10, but here Coach Jack Curtice reached down among the reserves to pull sophomore Norman off the bench and it was a battle the rest of the way in.

Stanford went 67 yards in 15 plays with Norman completing seven of nine aerials. The payoff was a 6-yard pass to end Chris Burford.

Stanford tied it up in the third quarter with a 69-yard touchdown drive again sparked by Norman. The score came when Gil Dowed plung-

ed over from the one. The Indians had a chance to go ahead in the fourth when Norman passed 51 yards to Irv Nikolai on the Beaver 13. But the Oregon State defense stiffened and a fourth-down field goal attempt by Skip Face was blocked.

A slim crowd of 22,500 watched the game, which was regionally televised, in chilling 50-degree weather.
