Standard Time Started in Nation 7 1/2 Years Ago Today

New York—(UPI)—The nation went on standard time 7 1/2 years ago today, ending years of confusion. Until the adoption of standard time—pushed by the railroads—the country got along on sun time, figured on the basis of when the sun reached its highest point over an agreed-on landmark.

Sun time resulted in a cross-country traveler to change his watch about 20 times.

Standard time divided the United States into four time zones.

Christmas Seals Rapped by Church

Johannesburg, South Africa—(UPI)—A spokesman for the Reformed Church asked its congregation today not to buy Christmas seals this year because of the "disguised Roman Catholic propaganda in the stamp's motif."

The stamps, which show the Virgin and child, are sold to help the National Tuberculosis Association, which insists it is totally interdenominational. The Rev. A. H. Jeffrey James, secretary of the Protestant Association in South Africa, said the stamps had "consciously or unwittingly become an instrument for popularizing the Roman Catholic dedication of the Virgin Mary."

WORK ON TIARA

Bergamo, Italy—(UPI)—Artisans here have begun work on a tiara for Pope John XXIII, a native of the Bergamo diocese.

Hollywood—(UPI)—Singer Erin O'Brien and her husband of seven years have agreed on a trial six-month separation on the advice of a marriage counselor, according to a spokesman for the couple. The dark-haired singer's husband, singer Jimmy Fitzgerald, moved out of the couple's home Sunday night on Miss O'Brien's return here from an entertainment tour. They have two sons.

Bendix Aviation Employees Strike

Detroit—(UPI)—The United Auto Workers Union today called out on strike 13,500 workers at Bendix Aviation Corp. when negotiators failed to reach agreement on a new contract.

The UAW represents Bendix workers at eight plants in New York, New Jersey, Michigan, Indiana and California.

Bargainers were closeted in a downtown hotel meeting in a marathon session that began early Monday.

Picket lines were thrown up at some plants after the midnight deadline expired.
