He is a good blocker, tough on defense and averages about 45 yards per punt. . . Carl Kammerer, College of Pacific—topnotch linebacker who is hailed as one of the best by Coach Jack Myers. . . Ken Kerr, Arizona Tempe State—already tapped by the Los Angeles Rams, he weighs 260 pounds and looks like a solid pro. . . Bob Grottkau, Oregon and Jim Brackins, Oregon State also have numerous campaign managers. . .

Centers: Ken Antle, Southern California—only weighs 185 but is a solid performer and has way of firing the squad up. . . Bob Peterson, Oregon—noted for his fine defense. Helped hold Oklahoma to one touchdown victory. . . Merl Hitzel, Washington State—excels as linebacker and on pass defense. . .

Quarterbacks: Joe Kapp, California—had trouble learning split T last year and has run it like a master this season as the main cog in the Bears comeback. . . Stan Jackson, Cal Poly of Pomona—a cool passer who has led the nation's small colleges in total offense. . . Well-Known Cardinal Man Dies

Little Rock, Ark.—UPI—Mort Cooper, who teamed with Walker Cooper to give the St. Louis Cardinals one of the most famous brother acts in baseball history, died Monday night at the age of 45. . .

Cooper, a three-time 20-game winner, died of a lung condition in St. Vincent's infirmary, where he was admitted Oct. 31. The body was shipped to Independence, Mo., but funeral arrangements are incomplete. . .

The Cooper brothers were acquired by the Cardinals' late Sam Breadon for a mere \$75 in 1937 and went on to lead the Redbirds to National league pennants in 1942, 1943 and 1944. . .

Walker, who joined the Cardinals in 1940, caught Mort in the "glory years" of 1942, 1943 and 1944 before entering the Navy in 1945 for service in World War II. . .

Mort had a total record of 9-4 with the Cardinals and Braves in 1945 but never recovered his previous effectiveness after the operation was sold to the New York Giants in 1947. . .

Walker also was sold by the Cardinals when he returned to them from the Navy in 1946, going to the Giants for an estimated \$175,000 in one of the largest transactions in baseball history. . .

Mort is one of six pitchers to win Most Valuable Player awards in the National league and in 1943 pitched successive one-hit shutouts against the Brooklyn Dodgers and Philadelphia Phillies. . .

Cooper is survived by his widow, Mrs. Viola Dee Cooper, a son, Lonnie Morton Cooper of Houston, Tex., his mother, Mrs. Verna Cooper of Kansas City, Mo., four brothers and one sister. . .

The meeting will be at 8 p.m. at Medford Senior High school. There are few referees in this area whom Class A-1 schools will agree to use. . .

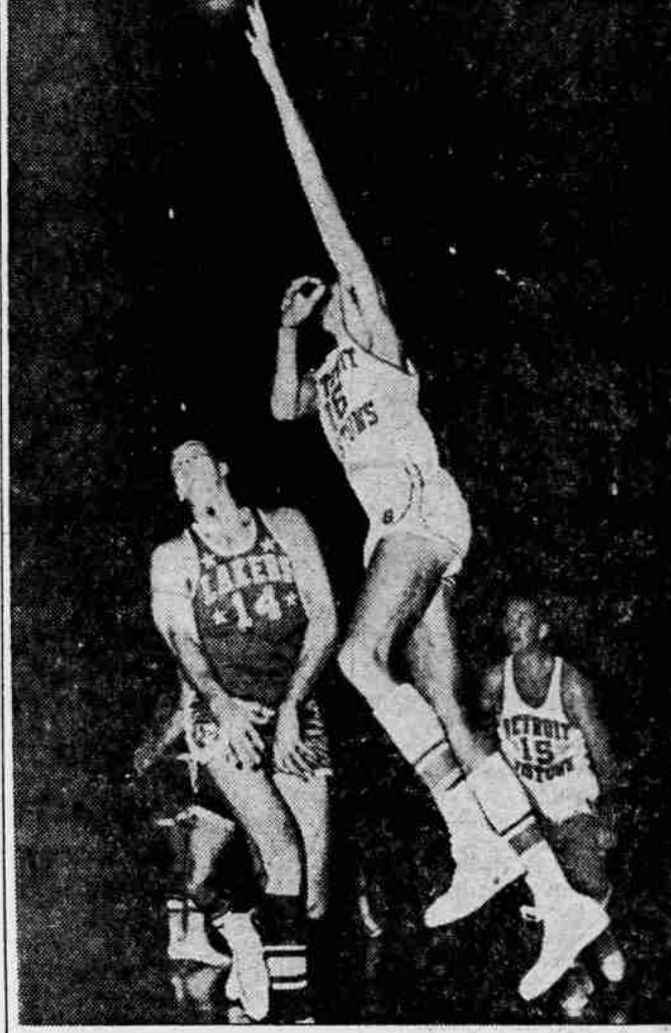
An effort is being made to have Klamath Falls and Roseburg representation at the meeting. Coaches of A-1 schools particularly are invited to attend. . .
