Stocks Turn Strong After Nervousness

New York—(UPI)—Stocks turned strong late in the session today after some nervousness during the earlier trading.

Steel shares assumed a strong position when U. S. Steel rose more than a point. American Telephone slipped back more than two points when directors declared the usual \$2.25 quarterly dividend. A few days ago the stock had been given a whirl on stories the dividend might be raised or the stock split. It also regained its poise and moved up from the day's low. Automobile shares failed to generate any enthusiasm, and the metals slipped after a rise. But new buyers came into the market and the list improved near the end of the session.

Priority List of Historical Sites

Ashland—A "priority" list of historical sites to be marked by bronze plaques for the Centennial year was adopted this week by the Ashland Centennial committee.

Chairman Frank Pinnock said they were chosen from a tentative list of 31 such sites. Those chosen are the old Chautauque building (now the Shakespearean theater), the Old Ashland Academy (where Briscoe school now stands), the site of the old Normal school at Siskiyou blvd. and Peachy rd., the old Ganiard opera house on the northeast corner of Pioneer rd. and East Main sts., and the first store building in Ashland (Hargadine's) beside the present city hall.

Locations of many historic buildings which once stood in what is now Lithia park will be shown on a permanent map at the entrance to the park, Pinnock said.

He said the Shakespearean Festival association will devote a portion of its 1959 program to the Centennial theme and that the associated Tudor Guild also will place emphasis on local history, with photos and models in its display booths.

Gold Hill Woman Hurt in Accident

Elizabeth C. Hoffman, 62, of route 1, box 182, Gold Hill, was reported in fair condition in Sacred Heart hospital today following a one-car accident last night at Gold Hill, hospital attendants reported.

She is being treated for shock and bruises her physician said.

The Hoffman car struck a telephone pole, knocking it down, in front of the Albert Sporting Goods in Gold Hill, state police said. Police estimated the car was damaged beyond repair.

Mrs. Hoffman, who was alone in her car at the time of the accident, told Gold Hill police that she was blinded by lights of two oncoming cars.

Ashland—Bids for construction of an addition to Walker school, Ashland, will be opened at 2 p.m. Nov. 26 in the school administration building.

Basic proposal calls for an addition of six classrooms and for installation of a partition in the office area of the existing building. Construction will be a single-story frame on slab with cedar siding.

Unit ventilators will be installed with the existing system, and light will be fluorescent.

Myrtle Creek Area Highway To Open

Salem—(UPI)—Six miles of four-lane interstate freeway between Myrtle Creek and Ford's bridge north of Canyonville will be opened on Thursday at 2 p.m., the State Highway department announced today.

The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce and officials from several other cities in the area will conduct a program and ribbon cutting ceremonies which will mark the completion of uninterrupted high-standard highway from Eugene to Grants Pass.

The 140-mile route will have highways either to full freeway standards or improved two-lane highways with passing lanes.

The new section, including the Myrtle Creek bypass, was built at a cost of \$4,572,000.
