

Springfield Mayor Elected President Of Oregon Cities

Eugene—The League of Oregon Cities Tuesday elected Springfield Mayor Edward C. Harms Jr., 34, new president.

Harms an attorney, succeeded retiring Salem Mayor Robert White. White is a state senator-elect from Marion county.

Tillamook Mayor Loren McKinley was named vice president. New directors elected were Mayor Terry D. Schunk of Portland; Mayor Lee Price of Milton-Freewater; Mayor Dick Maeyart of Coquille; Mayor Dick McRae of Prineville, and Mayor-elect Russell Bonesteel of Salem.

San Francisco Mayor George Christopher was the key speaker at the Tuesday night banquet. Christopher, president of the American Municipal Association, said it has been one of his purposes as AMA president to call the attention of state and federal leaders to the plight of cities that is posed by urbanization.

Delayed at Medford His plane was delayed for three hours by stormy weather at Medford and he arrived just in time to address the banquet.

Governor-elect Mark Hatfield addressed the group at a noon luncheon and told the delegates that newly-designated city officials should not forget to seek advice of veteran and retired public employees whom he called a "great reservoir of help."

Romania Threatens To Call U. S. Names

United Nations, N.Y.—(UPI)—Romania has threatened to start calling the United States names if U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge continues to refer to East European nations as Soviet satellites.

Silvin Brucan, Romania ambassador to Washington, told the U.N. political committee Tuesday.

"If he continues to use this language then he should bear in mind that we can do likewise and that the conquest by force in the last century of Texas and Hawaii, of Cuba and Puerto Rico and the Philippines and most recently in Lebanon and the Formosa Strait, fully and abundantly provides us with a historic background to call the United States names."

Tyrone Power's Airplane Grounded

Boston—(UPI)—A plane carrying the body of actor Tyrone Power, grounded here Tuesday night by bad weather, was expected to take off today for New York.

The coffin will be transferred there to another plane for the last leg of the journey to Los Angeles.

Accompanying the body of the 44-year-old screen star, who died in Madrid, Spain, of a fatal heart seizure while making a motion picture, were his widow, Deborah, and his secretary, Bill Gallagher.

Caril Fugate's Murder Trial Nearing Jury

Lincoln, Neb.—(UPI)—The almost month-long murder trial of a 15-year-old school girl drew near its end today with prosecution and defense attorneys delivering their closing arguments.

The prosecution charges Caril Ann Fugate helped her boy friend, Charles Starkweather, 19, slay at least one of his 11 victims last winter—Robert Jensen, 17. She is as guilty of murder as though she fired the fatal shot, according to the state.

Face Death Penalty

If found guilty she faces the same death penalty as was imposed on Starkweather for the same slaying; a conviction that he has appealed to the State Supreme court. However, County Attorney Elmer Scheele was not expected to indicate until the last moment whether he would seek execution for Caril.

The defense maintains Caril was merely a frightened child. She accompanied Starkweather through nine murderous days in the belief that this would save the lives of her family and herself, according to Caril's story.

Judge Harry A. Spencer set no time limit for the closing arguments, but the attorneys agreed with his suggestion that they confine their remarks to the five-hour court day, to be divided equally.

Under rules of the court, Scheele was to lead off, using no less than half his allotted time. Defense attorney John McArthur was to come next, followed by Scheele's final argument.

Spencer will deliver his instructions to the seven-man, five-woman jury Thursday, after which the jurors will retire to decide Caril's fate.

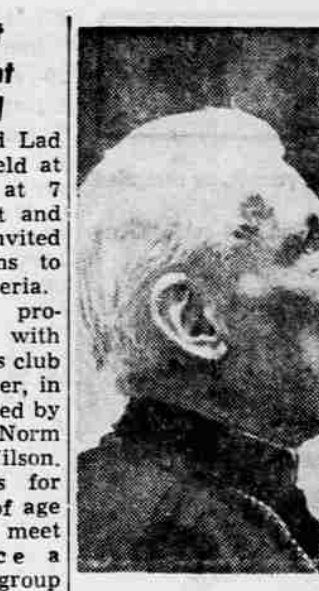
