### Two Arraigned on Larceny Charges

Jack Kenneth Lytle, 25, of Willow Tree court, Central Point, and Merle Franklin Hinds, 19, of Hayfork, Calif., were arraigned in district court Wednesday afternoon on charges of grand larceny.

The men waived the right to counsel and preliminary hearing and were bound over to the grand jury by Judge James M. Main with bail set at \$5,000 each.

The men were arrested Tuesday evening by Central Point police on a disorderly conduct charge and later during questioning by Central Point police and state police officers admitted several burglaries in the county and northern California.

Burglaries that the men admitted participating in according to police were the entering of Jacksonville High school Sunday night when \$850 was taken from the safe; \$11.50 from the Central Point Junior High school cafeteria; and \$170 from a safe in the Lucas and Howard furniture store, Central Point.

Medford city police reported that Lytle admitted several burglaries in the city. Two of them included Morse Motors, \$180 on July 30, and Bruce Bauer Lumber company, which was entered Sept. 2, with \$86 in cash and \$912 in checks reported taken.

### Mothers Protest Lack of Signal

Portland—UPI—A group of mothers today formed a human chain across southeast Powell Blvd, before school opened today to protest lack of a traffic control signal light at the intersection at 47th st.

The mothers, wearing raincoats and kerchiefs, formed a double line and the children crossed the busy intersection between the rows. Two fathers also were present.

The mothers said they formed the line because a permanent traffic light or some alternate safety measure had not yet been installed at the intersection. They had threatened last week to do so.

## Merger Ban Taken In Stride by Market

New York—UPI—The stock market took the Bethlehem-Youngstown merger ban in stride today with prices mixed in moderately active trading.

The federal court order blocking the merger unsettled the list at first but order was restored in a short while. Youngstown regained half of its early loss and was down about two points. Bethlehem, down three-quarters at its low, was off one-quarter.

The merger ban put a damper on the proposed merger of Norfolk and Western and the Virginian Railway as far as traders were concerned. Norfolk and Western fell more than seven points but regained about half the loss in later dealings. Virginian was up a fraction.

Metals were leader in the industrials with Aluminum, Alcoa and Magma Copper all up more than a point. Richfield Oil featured an otherwise steady oil group with a rise of two.
