THE CITY OF MEDFORD DOTH ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That it is the intention of the Council to cause the construction of a sanitary sewer on Temple Drive from Crater Lake Avenue to Gary Avenue in accordance with the hereby adopted and identified plans and specifications on file in the office of the City Manager, at the City Hall, Medford, Oregon, to which plans and specifications reference is hereby made for details and estimated costs thereof, and to assess upon each lot, or part thereof, adjacent to and benefited by such improvement its proportionate share of the cost of said improvement as provided by the Charter of the City of Medford.
Section 2. The Council will meet in the Council Chambers at the City Hall on the 4th day of December, 1958, at 7:30 P.M., at which time said place the owners of said adjacent property are hereby called upon to appear before said Council and show cause, if any, why said improvement should not be constructed and why said property should not be assessed for the construction thereof.
Section 3. Bradley, Former Army General, Holds Down Two Important Jobs

Editor's note: This is the fifth of six dispatches telling the stories of noted U.S. military leaders who have moved into high posts in industry and have become "Tycoons Out of Uniform."

New York — (UPI) — "I just couldn't quit being active — and do nothing." So says retired Gen. Omar N. Bradley, one of America's greatest military figures, in explaining why, at the age of 65, he keeps busy holding down two important jobs with the Bulova Watch Company by whom he has been employed the past five years.

One of Bradley's jobs is that of chairman of the board. He was elected last March 27 after the death of Arde Bulova, son of the late Joseph Bulova who founded the firm in 1875.

Bradley's other job is board chairman of Bulova Research and Development Laboratories, Inc., a subsidiary corporation. He took that one when he finished his tour of duty as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff on Aug. 15, 1953, after being in active Army service for 42 years.

Happy in Work
"These two jobs keep me busy in a constructive way," said the retired General of the Army. "They are interesting and challenging, and I'm very happy in my work."

Bradley's office is in the Bulova building near New York's LaGuardia Airport. He lives in Washington, D. C., with his wife, the former Mary Quale of Moberly, Mo. They have one daughter, Elizabeth Bradley Beukema. He shuttles between Washington and New York and keeps in touch both ways by telephone.

"I don't count the hours," said Bradley when asked how many hours he works a week.

I asked Gen. Bradley why industry seems so interested in hiring military leaders to administer non-military organizations.

"They realize we have had vast administrative and organizational experience in the armed services," he replied. "When I ran the Veterans' Administration, for example, we spent a lot of money. I had to organize staffs and correlate personnel, etc."

"It's the same in industry. General Motors is always talking about their line and staff organization, the same as in the services. We in the military got a lot of experience choosing personnel and placing the right men in the right places."

Leadership Needed

"In both the military and industry leadership is necessary in the delegating and assigning of authority and responsibility and the carrying out of the job."

Gen. Bradley said the thing a man is apt to miss when he moves from the military to a civilian career is his past associates. However, the fact that Bradley lives in Washington enables him to see his old cronies quite often — usually on the golf links.

The General is fond of golf and plays a sharp game. He is an eight-handicap man. The day he signed up with Bulova five years ago, he went out to the Burning Tree course in Washington and shot an even par for the first time since he was a young officer. He then reported to the Bulova headquarters at Woodside, Long Island.

The Bulova company's diversification program includes the development of new products, such as the electronic watch. This timepiece, it is state, will for the first time harness electronics to assure accuracy surpassing that of any mechanically energized watch.

Bulova is also engaged in producing components for most of the missiles being developed for the United States Armed Forces.

Gen. Bradley recalled that as far back as 1930-32, when he was a major at Fort Benning, Ga., he was interested in scientific matters. He was then in charge of the weapons section and worked in the Infantry School.

Job Suited Him
When the Bulova laboratories wanted him as chairman in 1953 the job suited Bradley to a T. In the laboratories at Woodside he has some 25 scientists working on such things as guided missiles and rocket components.

He is keenly interested in the Joseph Bulova School of Watchmaking because it enables him to carry on his work in behalf of disabled veterans. It is a unique rehabilitation and educational center located at Woodside. The student group includes paraplegics, amputees, cardiac cases, tuberculars and persons with other serious disabilities.

Gen. Bradley's military background is almost without precedent. Successively, in World War II, he commanded first a division, then a corps, an army and finally a group of armies.

His last command, the 12th United States Army group in Europe, numbered more than 1,300,000 combat troops and was the largest body of American soldiers ever to serve under one commander.

Bradley was born in Clark, Mo., Feb. 12, 1893. He was graduated 44th in the West Point class of 1915. At 65, the tall, slim ex-soldier shows no signs of slowing up.
